NEW CROSSING IS GRANTED

PUBLIC SERVICE BODY APPROVES APPLICATION

The public service commission has approved the application of the Lane county court for a grade crossing over the main line of the Southern Pacific a short distance north of Creswell for the proposed Ricketts road that will provide a shorter route for a number of farmers on Camas swale to the highway. This application was made some time ago but the commission was averse to granting a crossing unless one below was abandoned. This was done and word was received yesterday that the application had been granted. The Ricketts road will now be built.

County Engineer Morse announced yesterday that Morse and Lane, who have the contract to macadamize the Eugene-Crow-Hadleyville road built last year, have their second crusher in operation and they expect to make good headway with the contract. Hadley and Maudslayi, who had the contract to build a stretch at the further end of this highway, have about completed their work. A number of

slides that occurred during the winter will be cleared away by a county crew.

Greenwood and Dann, contractors on the Cottage Grove-Lorane highway, have three crews at work and all are progressing.

LIGHT SHOWERS DO GOOD

SEVENTEEN HUNDREDTHS OF AN INCH REQUIRED

Seventeen hundredths of an inch of rain fell in Eugene yesterday, according to the gauge at the weather station kept by Leo Gotschius.

While this was not enough to do a great deal of good to crops the farmers and fruit men welcomed it and are hoping for more because certain crops are in need of more moisture. Some grain is looking bad because of the dry warm weather and the strawberry crop will be short unless there is a greater amount of rainfall within the next few days.

Light sprinkles occurred in Eugene at intervals yesterday, beginning early in the forenoon, and there was a heavy shower during the afternoon.

LOOK OUT AT YREKA, CAL.

GET RICH QUICK SCHEME IS HATCHED IN THAT CITY

Sign in Big Letters Says "Speed Limit Is 20 Miles an Hour" and in Tiny Letters "45 Miles Through City"

Yreka, Cal., has a new get-rich-quick scheme. Oregon automobilists are to be the chief victims. Eugene motorists driving to California are warned to travel under a slow bell as they move through the sleepy streets of old Yreka.

This ancient mining town is said to be in need of funds much to the regret of a Eugene motorist who recently took the gasoline route to the Golden state. This man left a few days ago. He was fined for going through Yreka at a calm rate of 20 miles an hour thinking he was obeying the law. He has sent back the following warning to fellow motorists:

"At the outskirts of the Yreka city limits is a large sign that reads: 'Speed limit 20 miles an hour.' This warning is printed in big letters and is all a fellow notices. But underneath in very small type is another sign: 'Through the city 15 miles an hour.'"

"There are a lot of old jaspers hiding around the corners to grab fellows who didn't see the small sign. I was one of the victims. It cost me thirty bucks."

FOREST CAMPS DISCUSSED

ASSISTANT DISTRICT FORESTER HERE FROM PORTLAND

C. J. Buck, assistant district forester, was here yesterday from the district office in Portland conferring with R. S. Shelley, supervisor of the Siuslaw national forest and Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor of the Cascade forest, regarding land exchanges and the development of recreational areas in the national forests.

Improvement of camping grounds on the McKenzie river was discussed at length by Mr. Buck and Mr. Macduff. Last year the latter started a project to provide for a large auto camping place on the McKenzie a short distance west of McKenzie bridge but lack of funds necessitated a halt in operations. It is necessary to build a short stretch of road leading from the McKenzie river to the tract and to do some clearing before the park is opened.
