DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 9.—Market for butter continues to reflect much strength.

Leaders of the trade are now inclined to believe there will be no drop in the price, at least for the immediate future, if at all this season. With the greatest output on record in this territory there has been a general clean-up of all available offerings.

It is said that some of the leaders of the creamery trade who were previously inclined to believe that values in the market here would receive a setback, are today storing every cube they can get out of their own manufacture.

EGG TRADE CONTINUES STEADY

Local egg trade continues on a fully steady basis with no further price changes for the day. While some parties are dubious about prices being maintained, others have liberal orders to fill at extreme values.

SUGAR ADVANCE IS IN EFFECT

Advance of 20¢ forecast in the sugar market Thursday, took effect at the opening of

the Friday trade. Extreme strength is continued in both the coast and Eastern markets and further rise is considered likely.

STRAWBERRY MARKET HIGHER

Strawberries made a further advance Thursday. On the East Side Farmers' market, values were made from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per crate, with the general run of good stuff around \$1.00 to \$1.25. On front street sales were made from \$1.75 to \$2.50 for the better class of berries.

GOOD BREAD SEARCH ON STREET

Good quality breads are by no means plentiful about front street, but the trade has been unable to force any advance in the price. Veals are considered just about steady around the prices quoted. Lambs weaker and lower.

CHEESE PRICES ARE STRAIGHTER

Prices of several varieties of butter fat and butter, the price of cheese is holding somewhat steadier here. Most of the leading brands are making 25¢ a pound for yellow Swiss triplets and although Oregon district stocks are selling at 22¢ to 23¢.
