

EUGENE TO SEND LARGE NUMBER TO O. N. G. CAMP

Members of Both Local Companies Equipped for Trip

MORE RECRUITS SOUGHT

Men Will Entrain Here at 11 P. M. June 14 and Leave for Camp Lewis Early Next Morning

About 125 officers and men of the 162d Infantry, Oregon national guard, of this city, will leave early Thursday morning for Camp Lewis, Wash., for a two weeks' period of training. Company C, Captain Lawrence P. Jensen commanding, will take along about 70 men, and the battalion headquarters company, Lieutenant V. H. Stratton commanding, will be about 35 strong. In addition to the officers and men of these companies, Major W. G. White and his staff will attend.

Lieutenant Stratton said last night that the personnel of the headquarters company as it will appear in camp has not yet been completed. The company is still open to recruits before leaving for camp, he said, and 12 men have been enlisted during the past two days. The new men are showing a great deal of interest in the work, said the lieutenant, and all are anxious to attend the camp.

The headquarters company is fully equipped with engineering outfit and signal corps apparatus, except a radio which will be taken to camp and work in this line will be part of the duty of the men while there.

The men will entrain at the Southern Pacific station here at 11 P. M. Monday night for the 14th and leave for the north about 3 A. M. the next day, arriving at Camp Lewis at 1 or 2 that afternoon.

TAKEN INTO FRATERNITY
Oregon Man Who Is Self-Educated
Writes Short Stories for the
Different Magazines

Charles Alexander, editor of the Albany Sunday Democrat and one of America's successful short story writers, Thursday evening was initiated as an honorary member into Ye Tabard Inn, the University of Oregon chapter of Sigma Upsilon, national literary fraternity. Mr. Alexander has been recently broken into the short story field, but during the past year has won renown as a writer of animal stories. At present he is writing

for the Blue Book, an all-fiction publication.

In a brief talk to the 15 members of the local chapter of the writer's fraternity at the banquet held in the Varsity Thursday night, Mr. Alexander expressed his belief that the ability to write good stories could be acquired by any person willing to apply himself to the task. He emphasized the importance of originality in short story writing and advised the members of Ye Tabard Inn to use their own individual styles of composition instead of modeling their work on that of a successful writer who already occupies a particular field.

Mr. Alexander is a self-educated man, having attended neither high school nor college.

The Oregon chapter of Sigma Upsilon now has two distinguished American short story writers as honorary members. Edison Marshall and Charles Alexander, Marshall, while a student at the university, was instrumental in installing the chapter of the fraternity there.

EUGENE BOY IS IN MANILA
LETTER RECEIVED FROM
GEORGE LUNDY BY MOTHER

George Lundy, son of Mrs. A. True Lundy, of this city, is in the air service of the army and is at present stationed at Manila, P. I. In a recent letter to his mother, he writes:

"We left Fort McDowell, San Francisco, March 21, and arrived at Honolulu, March 28. The buildings in Honolulu are very pretty but small, the largest about like McMorran's or the Hampton building.

"Waikiki beach was a big disappointment as there is not much beach but bathing is fine. I got a surf board and went in. The porpoises are as playful as kittens, will swim ahead, but if I got ahead he would take a sneak. We took 290 head of horses on board, which was more fun and excitement than work, and sailed for Manila at 3 o'clock p. m. April 6. Had a wonderful sunset, one I will never forget. Entered Manila bay April 11, at 10:30 p. m. We docked next morning and unloaded the horses, which was more fun.

"We rolled our packs and went up to Fort McKinley. Some of the fellows went on to China. They were in the 15th infantry. The aviation gang was sent to Camp Nichols, where we are now. The sea voyage was pleasant, weather summery and ocean smooth.

"Manila is quite a place, the most wonderful hotels, big parks and many caremets and Ford's. A caremet is a sort of a rickshaw, but instead of a man, a horse, pulls it.

"There is not much doing at this field yet. There are hangars to build, fields to level, etc., before flying begins. We start on Sunday, and I think we will have a bunch coming. I intend to put on for insurance and attend a business college here. Tell Fred and Wayne they are doing the right thing by going to school."
