

MOSS STREET PAVEMENT IS BONE OF CONTENTION

Opponents of Improvement Appear Before Council

ASK FOR POSTPONEMENT

Charge Muds That Property Owners on Heights Are Seeking to Put Job Through

Arguments for and against the paving of Moss street were presented at the adjourned meeting of the city council last night and the arguments favored at several different times of a personal nature, showing that there has been engendered some ill feeling over the project. Quite a number of property owners on the street attended the meeting and their spokesman, John L. Marsh, told the council members that most of them could not afford the improvement at this time, he said that those who signed the remonstrance felt that it would be a great burden and that furthermore Moss street was a pretty good thoroughfare as it now stands. He said it was in as good shape as any unpaved street in the city.

Others who opposed the improvement charged that the circulation of the petition worked secretly and that the opponents of the plan knew nothing of its circulation until a majority had been obtained. It was further charged that those favoring the improvement do not live on the street but have property on the heights above there and simply want a paved driveway built at the expense of the others.

Railway Wants to Wait

T. L. Billingsley superintendent of the street railway company, asked that the improvement be postponed for a year as the company has been put to great deal of expense already this year in improvement work and will have to pay for the Franklin boulevard pavement besides. Mr. Billingsley said that the company has paid out \$55,000 this year in improvements.

Dr. D. P. Seafie said that no one was trying to put anything over on those who opposed the pavement. He said that for eight years he and a number of others have been trying to get this street paved and he thought everybody knew of the circulation of the petition. He declared that they were making an honest effort to improve that part of the city and to enhance the value of the property.

Carl G. Washburne said the people on Moss street would be able to sell their property much more readily and at a higher price after the pavement is laid. Mr. Seafie also spoke in favor of the improvement, declaring that Eugene would never go forward if its citizens stood in the way of public improvements.

Councilman Parks, president of the council, who presided in the absence of the mayor, said that the matter will be finally decided at the next meeting of the council, June 26, when it is expected that the mayor and

several members of the council who were absent last night will be present.

Firemen Resign

Under the head of reports of committees the fire and water committee reported that Guy Whitley had resigned as member of the fire department and J. O. Bristol had been appointed in his place.

A. R. Gray was granted permission to erect an open shed on the vacant lot next to his grocery store on Seventh avenue east.

C. W. Stewart, representing the asphalt department of the Standard oil company, asked to be allowed to present specifications on asphalt so that contractors who handle asphaltic pavement may be allowed to bid on different pavement jobs in the city.

The petition to pave Fifth avenue west between Blair boulevard and Polk street with concrete was presented and referred to the street committee.

An ordinance was presented prohibiting the stringing of wires for radio aerials across the streets and providing for the issuing of a permit for the erection of any aerial.

An ordinance providing for the construction of a sewer in the alley between Sixth and Seventh avenues and extending from Polk street to Almaden street and one for a sewer on Alder street between Ninth avenue and the mill race were passed.

The ordinance approving the plans and specifications of the pavement to be laid on Longview street, an ordinance levying the assessment for the grading and graveling of Eighteenth avenue between Alder street and Harris street and one levying the assessment for the grading and graveling of Jackson street between Eighth and Eleventh avenues were passed.

A resolution to condemn the partially burned dwelling house at the east end of Thirteenth avenue was adopted.

The Eugene Sand and Gravel company was given the contract to macadamize Twenty-Third avenue between Willamette and McMillan streets, its bid being \$167,500. A. C. Mathews' bid was \$189,352.

Official notification of the S. P. company's application to increase its street railway fares to six cents inside the city and 12 cents to Springfield was read. The new fare schedule will go into effect June 20.

HOME FOR NURSES BOUGHT

OSBURN PROPERTY ON WILLAMETTE CHANGES HANDS

Eugene Hospital Acquires House and Lot Across Alley from New Building Site

The Eugene hospital yesterday announced that it had purchased the residence property on Willamette street across the alley from the new hospital site as a home for the hospital nurses.

This is known as the Osburn property and was owned for many years by the late Frank W. Osburn, banker. It was occupied later by E. O. Potter and family and afterward by R. A. Smith and family. It has been owned for a number of years by W. T. Gordon, vice-president of the First National bank.

The lot on which the house stands is 60x155 feet in dimensions and the residence is a large and roomy with modern appointments, containing a fireplace upstairs and one downstairs, also two baths, one on each floor. Possession of the property will be given in July.

Work on the new hospital is expected to start within a few days, according to members of the company. The starting of the work is awaiting the signing of the contract. E. M. Drew was the lowest bidder.

THREE BIG BEAR KILLED

The petition sets forth that the claims against the mill amount to \$20,000, that the mill is built on ground leased from Thomas F. McGlynn and that the rent is unpaid. Mr. Maglady was appointed receiver September 3, 1921, when action was taken by W. F. Gibson against N. K. Pennington.

NEW BUILDINGS PLANNED W. H. SMITH TO ERECT SMALL CONCRETE STRUCTURE

A. R. Gray Says He is Thinking Some of Building on His Lot on Seventh Avenue

W. H. Smith, of this city, is planning to erect a small concrete block building on N. R. Gaylord's Eugene hotel property for a book store. He appeared before the city council last night to apply for a special permit to remodel a portion of the old hotel building to be used in connection with his new building, but the councilmen were not inclined to grant such a permit. It was suggested that he build a wall of concrete blocks in the rear of his building, providing a doorway between it and the old structure, thus precluding the necessity of changing the latter, and he agreed to this plan.

Another new building is in prospect for next fall. A. R. Gray, of the Cash and Cary store, is applying for a permit to erect a shed alongside the building he now occupies on Seventh avenue east, said he was thinking of erecting a building on this lot in the fall.

UPPER ROAD IS SMOOTHED CARS CAN TRAVEL SECTION ON SOUTH BANK OF RIVER

The road up the south bank of the Willamette river, extending a distance of five miles from the Lowell bridge, has lately been smoothed and it is now in good condition for automobile travel that far up, said A. T. Miller, of Trout, road patrolman for that district, who was in Eugene yesterday.

LARGE CLASS OF APPLICANTS FOR CERTIFICATES

Expected to Reach 100, Says County Superintendent—Only Eight Men Among Them

Ninety applicants for certificates appeared at the teachers' examination at the courthouse yesterday and E. J. Thursday afternoon—Grammar, geography, stenography, American literature, physics, typewriting, methods in language, thesis for primary certificate.

Friday forenoon—Theory and practice, orthography, physical geography, English literature, chemistry.

Friday afternoon—School law, geology, algebra, civil government.

Saturday forenoon—Geometry, botany.

Saturday afternoon—General history, bookkeeping.
