FAILING ORATORY PRIZE WON BY ELAINE COOPER

Beekman Award Is Given to
Wilbur Hoyt

MARGARET SIMONTON THIRD

Addresses Deal With Government and
World Peace Problems; More
Protection Is Plea

Miss Elaine Cooper, of Portland, three years a winner in intercollegiate debate, brought her forensic career in the university to a glorious close last night by winning the Failing prize of \$150 for oratory. In the annual contest held in Villard hall, Wilbur Hoyt of Hood River captured the Beekman prize of \$100 for the second best oration. Miss Margaret Simonton, of Wendell, Idaho, who came to the university this year from Stanford, was a close third.

Addresses Are Parallel

By a coincidence, Miss Cooper and Mr. Hoyt paralleled each other in a part of their addresses, both of which were appeals for greater respect for law. Miss Cooper's subject was "Democracy on Trial." In an appeal for enforcement of law, she assailed the "invisible government" of the Ku Klux Klan as something to be stamped out as an un-American. "Violators of the 18th amendment," said Miss Cooper, "are in the same class with those who would attempt to hold slaves in this country."

Both Miss Cooper and Mr. Hoyt deplored the laxity of the enforcement of the prohibition laws. Hoyt laid to the judicial system a good share of the blame for the growing contempt for law and pleaded for less leniency in court for the criminal, less romantic sympathy for the lawbreaker, and more protection to the law-abiding.

Appeals for Peace Plan
Miss Simonton's address was an appeal for the adoption of an international plan for the preservation of peace. A league of nations to preserve the peace, with complete ostracism, economic and diplomatic, for any breaker of the obligation, was urged as a means of protecting the world against the horrors of a new conflict.

The contest was judged by Mrs. Frank Jenkins (Oregon 1911), Professor Charles B. Mitchell, of the Oregon Agricultural college, and George O. Goodell (Oregon 1902). The university orchestra, directed by Rex Underwood, opened the program with Nicolai's overture, "Merry Wives of Windsor." Miss Bernice Yeo, pianist, played Chopin's Ballade in A flat, and Miss Vera Price, contralto, sang "Till I Wake" by Woodford-Plinden. Both the young women are students in the university school of music. President Campbell introduced the speakers.

PRETTY PAGEANT TONIGHT

ANNUAL FLOWER AND FERN
PROCESSION TO BE HELDEvent Held Each Year by Alumni
Women to Welcome Seniors Into
Alumni of University

The 22nd fern and flower procession, the annual event given by the alumni women of the university in welcoming the graduating women into the alumni, will be held on the campus tonight at 7:30. The custom was originated by Professor Lucile Clay Carson and at her suggestion the class of '95 planted ferns along the east side of Villard hall in the hope that in future years such a custom would be established. The first procession, however, was not held until 1900 and from that time it has become one of the established traditions of the university.

The procession will be formed at both ends of "Hello lane," the alumni members forming a double line at the library steps and the members of the class of '22 double line at the steps of Deady. Both lines will march toward each other to the music of the university orchestra and when they meet the alumni line will divide and the graduates pass along between the women of the alumni. In this method they are welcomed into the alumni. The graduates then follow the alumni to the west steps of Villard where the women form the traditional university "O" and are joined by the glee clubs in singing Oregon songs.

This ceremony is followed by an open air program in the twilight by both men's and women's glee clubs. According to John Stark Evans, director of the clubs, the program given will depend on the weather. If the evening is nice he expects to give an extensive program of practically all the songs used by the clubs this year. There will also be a number of special quartets, duets and solos.

Mrs. F. L. Chambers, a member of the class of '25, is in charge of the fern and flower ceremony. She hopes that all women graduates of the university who live in Eugene will be in attendance to welcome the graduates of this year's class.

ROCK CRUSHERS GOING IN

MACADAMIZING ON LOW PASS
HIGHWAY TO START AT ONCEA. D. Kern and Company Preparing
For Summer's Activity on Eugene-Blachly Route

A. D. Kern and company, who have the contract to surface the new grade built last year over the low pass on the Eugene-Florence highway between Bear creek falls and Blachly, are now setting up two crushers three miles west of Blachly today and rock for the surfacing of the entire 11 miles of new road will be taken from there, according to J. C. McLeod, assistant state highway engineer, who was in Eugene yesterday after having gone over the route.

TWO LOS ANGELES LASSIES ON
WAY TO ASTORIAManage to Make About 50 Miles a
Day by Catching Rides in
Passing Automobiles

"We've found walking far more romantic, healthier, and lots more fun than touring by automobile or riding on hot, dusty trains," said Miss Pearl Penner, yesterday, who, with her companion, Miss Lucile Brown, has hiked here from Los Angeles. They will leave tomorrow for Astoria, where they intend to spend the summer. The trip so far has taken a little over three weeks, and the girls have earned their expenses by working for an advertising firm while on the road.

BANK OF ENGLAND HAS CUT ITS DISCOUNT RATE

THREE AND HALF PER CENT IS
NEW REDUCTIONNew Rate Established by Banking
Firm Is the Lowest Since
Before War Period

(By the Associated Press)
LONDON, June 15.—The Bank of England today lowered its discount rate to three and one-half per cent, a reduction of one-half per cent from the figure established on May 13 last. The bank took Lombard street by surprise in making the reduction. Its action is believed to have been due to a desire to bring the rate more in line with the short loan market, which recently has had large funds unemployed at from one to two per cent while the bank rate stood at four per cent.

Treasury bills were also available at easier rates, and as conditions in the United States were easier the retention of so high an official rate here was regarded as unwarranted.

Another reason given for the change is that the authorities wish to assist the new Indian loan of 12,500,000 pounds which is being floated today.

The reduction was welcomed by the trade who felt that coming as it did just when trade was picking up, it would considerably assist expansion.

The bank rate established by the Bank of England today is the lowest since before the war. It was three per cent in January, 1914, and on July 30, of that year, stood at 4 per cent. With the outbreak of the war it was advanced to 10 per cent, but five days later was reduced to six per cent at which rate it was maintained throughout the hostilities. In 1920, the rate was raised to seven per cent. Since then it has been falling steadily. Before the war the bank rate was sometimes as low as 2½ per cent, at which figure it stood at times in both 1908 and 1909.

JAIL DOORS CLOSE ON WARD

WEALTHY BAKER'S SON
CHARGED WITH MURDER

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., June 15.—Walter S. Ward, wealthy baker's son, was lodged in the county jail tonight following his arraignment in supreme court today on a charge of indictment charging him with murder in the first degree, growing out of the death of Clarence Peters, former sailor, the morning of last May 16.

The indictment was found by the May grand jury today after more than a week spent in investigating his story that he killed Peters in self-defense when the former sailor tried to intimidate him on a lonely road near Kenilworth.

Ward was arrested in New York and was brought to White Plains. It was decided that the pleading on the indictment should be taken to court today. Ward was sent to jail. No request for bail was made after Justice Morchauer declared it was not a bailable offense, and that he would entertain no motion to that end.

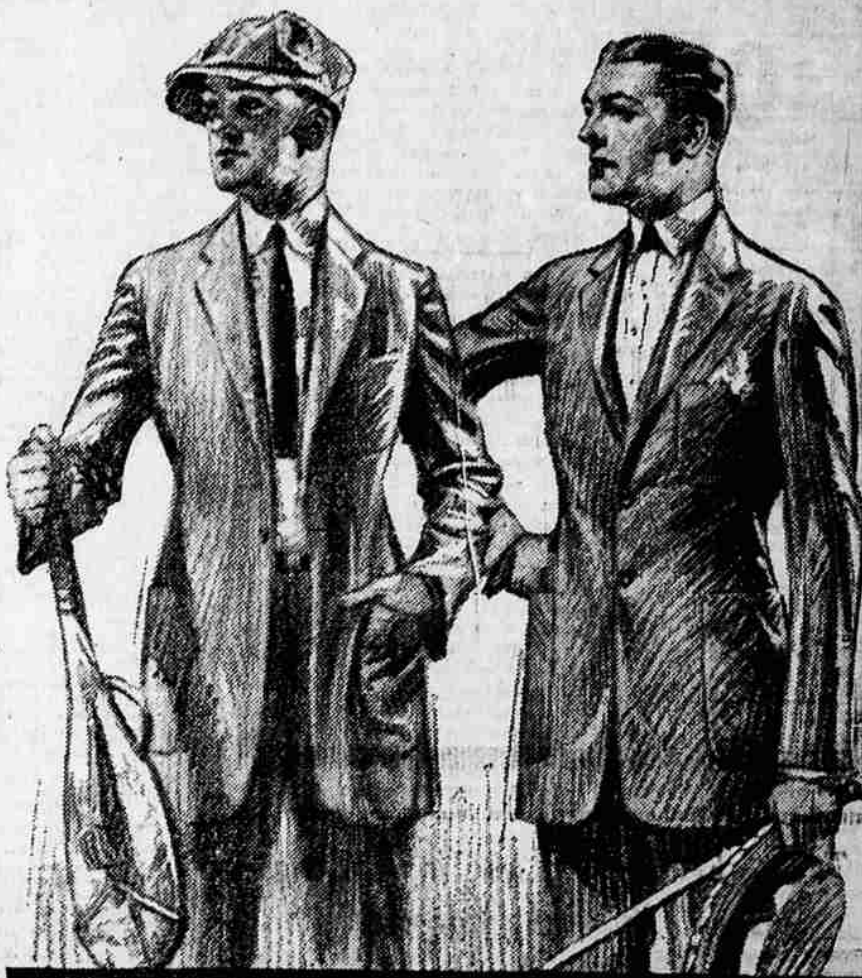
