

BACCALAUREATE SERMON TO BE DELIVERED TODAY

Rev. H. L. Bowman of Portland
Will Be Speaker

CONCERT THIS AFTERNOON

Graduation Exercises to Be Feature
of Monday; Idaho University
President Speaker

The baccalaureate sermon at 11 o'clock this morning, to be delivered in the First Methodist church, and the commencement concert this afternoon at 4:30, under direction of the university school of music, will be today's events of the forty-sixth commencement season of the University of Oregon. The sermon will be delivered by Rev. H. L. Bowman, pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Portland. His subject will be "More Than Conquerors." John Stark Evans, professor of organ in the university, will preside at the organ, and Madame Rose McGrew and the university choir will give the vocal music.

The concert at 4:30 this afternoon in the woman's building, to which all friends of the university are invited, is in charge of the faculty of the school of music.

Exercises in Woman's Building
The commencement exercises will be held for the first time in the auditorium of the woman's building, at 4 o'clock Monday morning. The address will be delivered by Dr. A. H. Upham, president of the University of Idaho. His topic will be "Gentleman and Scholar." Degrees will be conferred on 251 students. Of these, twenty-six will receive advanced degrees. For the first time the graduates of the University of Oregon school of medicine will come to Eugene to receive their diplomas. This year's class in medicine contains ten members, three of whom are women.

He also has the distinction of having earned three university degrees without having missed a single recitation, two of which degrees he received from the University of Oregon. He has now accepted a position there at the University of Illinois.

John B. Siefert to Leave—John B. Siefert, of the University of Oregon school of music, will meet his parents at Portland this week when they arrive from their recent home in Pennsylvania on the way to Southern California, where they will reside. Mr. Siefert will accompany his parents on a motor trip to their new home from Portland and will be accompanied by Charles Dawson.

Gifts Are Appreciated—The shipment of garments from the Lane county chapter of the American Red Cross to the ex-service men now confined at hospital 77 at Portland is highly appreciated by the members of the organization according to a communication received here at the Red Cross headquarters. The officials of the Veterans' Social service have conveyed their thanks to the members of the women's club of county who have contributed the gifts.

Copies of Booklet Requested—A request for 50 copies of the "Heart of Oregon," has been received by Eugene Chadwick, secretary of the chamber of commerce, which has sponsored the publicity publication, from E. J. Adams, secretary to United States Senator Stanford, who writes that the booklet has received high commendation as a means of advertising the scenic and industrial and agricultural advantages of the county. Representative W. C. Hawley has also written an approving letter after receiving a copy of the publication from the local chamber.

Henry Howe Gets Position—Henry V. Howe, son of Professor H. C. Howe of the University of Oregon, has been appointed to the chair of history in the state university of Louisiana. Mr. Howe, who graduated from the University of Oregon in 1916, with the highest honors in rhetoric, has taken his Ph. D. this spring at Stanford university, his doctoral thesis being "The Micmacs of Clatsop and Lincoln Counties, Oregon." He has been asked to report to Baton Rouge, the seat of the University of Louisiana, and begin work the first of July.

Harold Cate Wins Honors—Harold Cate, son of Judge and Mrs. W. M. Cate, of Portland, has been graduated with honors from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, according to word received by the family. Mr. Cate received a master's degree in electrical engineering. Mr. Cate is a graduate of the old Portland academy and of the University of Oregon. He is a member of the Phi Gamma Delta fraternity. Judge Cate attended the commencement exercises and expected to motor back to Portland with his son.

Chamber to Have Ad on Red Book—The McKenzie river highway will be featured on the back of the "Red Book, Scenic Tourist Guide," to be issued soon, covering the Pacific highway between Eugene and Medford. One of the books was recently issued, covering the highway between Portland and Eugene. E. E. Chadwick, secretary of the chamber of commerce here, has prepared an ad with a picture of the McKenzie river highway to be printed on the back of the new issue.
