

### COTTAGE GROVE TEAM OUT OF UPPER VALLEY LEAGUE

#### Junction City May Enter to Continue Season

Cottage Grove has officially withdrawn from the Upper Valley Baseball League and negotiations are underway for the substitution of Junction City in the schedule for the remainder of the season. Officials of the Cottage Grove team who attended a meeting of the league directors held here last night stated that they were not prepared to continue for a winning team and that rather than continue with a loser that the team would be withdrawn and forfeit the deposit which each team has posted to finish the schedule.

A meeting will be held at Junction City tonight according to Hagedorn, who represents the Junction City team, and that the proposition would be discussed with business men for the financing of the club and a decision will be reached as to entering a team in the league.

The team to replace Cottage Grove will start the season with a percentage of 1900 but the present schedule of games will continue, according to the announcement of the directors. A fund of approximately \$500 will be awarded to the pennant winner at the end of the season, according to the financial report made at the directors' meeting.

### GLAND TRANSPLANTATION IS McORMICK OPERATION

#### HEAD OF HARVESTER FIRM IS SOON TO LEAVE HOSPITAL

#### McORMICK'S FRIENDS ARE ASSURED THAT OPERATION PERFORMED BY FAMOUS SURGEON SUCCESSFUL

CHICAGO, Ill., June 20.—Harold F. McCormick, multi-millionaire chairman of the executive committee of the International Harvester Corporation, may be able to leave Wesley Memorial hospital by Wednesday or Thursday of this week. After a brief rest at home, it is thought he will go to Europe for an extended visit.

McCormick's friends were assured that the gland transplantation had been successful, and it was said he

observed for the first time that the nature of the operation had become public. He sent out for papers and after reading some of the accounts, gave order that it was not to be discussed by any one in the hospital. McCormick was stationed around that section of the hospital which has been walled off for him. His surgeon, internes and nurses, with instructions to turn away all but members of the family.

It is said the youth who sold one of his glands to McCormick had disappeared. The suggestion was made that this man had not been in the hospital at all, but that the gland was removed in a surgeon's office nearby and kept on ice until it was transplanted.

### BABE RUTH ESSAYS NEW ROLE OF UMPIRE-BATTER

#### Angered Over Suspension Ruth Threatens Bill Dineen

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 20.—Angered because of his suspension by President R. B. Johnson of the American League, "Babe" Ruth, baseball's most famous batsman, threatened Umpire Bill Dineen and only prompt interference by members of the Cleveland Indians averted a clash between the two prior to today's game between New York and Cleveland.

Ruth's suspension followed his expulsion from yesterday's game by Umpire Dineen because of abusive language used toward the arbiter. The champion batsman was informed of President Johnson's ruling today, after participating in practice with his team. Ruth encountered Dineen at the Cleveland dugout while on his way to the clubhouse.

"If you ever put me out of a game again I'll fix you so you will never umpire again, even if they put me out of baseball for life," Ruth is alleged to have said.

Dineen retorted, "No one ever accused me of being yellow." Dineen retorted. Further words passed between the two during which Ruth is alleged to have called Dineen a vile name and to have invited the latter to accompany him beneath the grandstand, at the same time doubling up his fists, and walked toward the umpire.

Dineen thereupon threw down his mask and prepared for action, but before any blows were struck Manager Speaker, Steve O'Neill and "Stuffy" McInnis intervened and persuaded Ruth to go to the clubhouse.

#### WILLARD TO OPEN TRAINING

#### EX-CHAMPION TO PREPARE FOR GO WITH DEMPSEY

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 20.—Jess Willard, former heavyweight champion pugilist, announced today he would start training within a week for a return match with Jack Dempsey, to whom he lost the title. He stated he has accepted an offer to use the gymnasium of the Hollywood post number 43, American Legion, for preliminary work.

Willard recently issued a deft to Dempsey, after which Jack Kearns, manager of the champion, stated his charge was ready to meet Willard whenever his terms could be arranged with a reputable promoter, adding that the veteran Pacific would take into unfriendly hands and that the good relations of the Union and the Southern Pacific systems would be jeopardized through the necessity of the latter again to substitute with the Rock Island of some other line was

#### Not Seeking Other Line

The Southern and Central Pacific systems have so fused into one system that the name Central Pacific has been virtually lost sight of, Mr. Sprule said. In the event of a separation the Central Pacific would have to connect up its separate lines and rearrange its terminals in order to continue profitable operation, and the Southern Pacific would have to do the same. Both would involve considerable expense which the public would derive no benefit, he said, and after it was all over there would have been no betterment of the service. The train runs would become "miscellaneous" and as the separation would be without relation to present division and train arrangements there would be the likelihood of great and costly confusion.

#### HOUSE LEADERS CONDEMN FORD'S SHOALS PROPOSAL

#### REPORT MARKS A NEW DIVISION IN MILITARY COMMITTEE

#### Document Stresses Importance of Getting to the Country an Unbiased Statement of Facts on Offer

WASHINGTON, June 20.—Eight Republican leaders of the house military committee today signed a report, submitted to the house by Representative Kearns of Ohio, denouncing Henry Ford's offer to purchase and lease the government's project at Muscle Shoals, Alabama. Their action increased to four the number of reports emanating from the committee and marked another division of opinion among the 21 members over the question of Muscle Shoals disposition.

The eight members were Representative Kearns, Ohio; Moran, Idaho; and Haysley, Pennsylvania; Carter, New York; Hill, Maryland; Parker, New Jersey; and Frothingham, Massachusetts.

None of the signatories to the report was willing for congress to accept the Ford offer.

#### Wants Country to Know Facts

The Kearns report stressed the importance of getting to the country a clear, fair and unbiased statement of opinion among the 21 members over the Ford offer in a way that left none of its provisions free from hostile criticism.

The report also asserted that the Alabama Power company, which submitted an offer to develop the power project at Muscle Shoals, had "always dealt fairly with the government" and was offering \$2,500,000 for its interests in the steam plant at Gorgas, in accordance with the terms of
