Intelligence tests, handling of defective children, ratings of teachers, and the question of the reorganization of teachers' institutes are among the matters of interest to be handled at the annual conference of superintendents and principals to be held at the university Friday and Saturday. The attendance is expected to exceed 50, many of whom are doing special work in the summer session of the university.

Among the University of Oregon people who will participate in the sessions are President Campbell, Colin V. Byrant, dean of the college; Dr. H. W. DeBuck, professor of education; Miss Ruth Montgomery, specialist in educational tests; and Dr. H. D. Rhedden, dean of the school of education.

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SUMMER SCHOOL OPENED

ENROLLMENT FIRST DAY IS APPROXIMATELY 250

Of First 100 Registered 50 Are Graduate Students and 70 or More Expected

First day enrollment on the campus for the University of Oregon summer session, approximately 250, though no exact figures were obtainable last evening. By 4 o'clock, an hour before the registrar's office closed, the number had reached 200—a figure which, according to Earl Kilmister, general director for both Portland and Eugene sessions, is more than had registered at the corresponding hour on the opening day of last year. The indicated total, he believes, is at least 350 for the session here. The enrollment in Portland is expected to exceed the campus enrollment by approximately 100.

Of the first two hundred enrolled here, approximately fifty are graduate students, and Dr. E. S. Conklin, acting dean of the graduate school, estimates that the total registration of advanced students will be seventy or more. In the list already are graduates of twenty-one colleges and universities besides the University of Oregon. The institutions represented are Yale Divinity school, Hiram, Luther college, Oregon Agricultural college, University of Wisconsin, College of Saint Joseph, Pacific university, Willamette university, Lincolnton college, Washington State college, Kansas State college, Whitman, California, North Dakota, St. Mary's college, University of Montana, Purdue, Williams, Denver, Albany and Hartford theological.

Sixty Courses to Be Given

A total of sixty courses are given in the Eugene summer session, including romance languages, chemistry, economics, education, German, history, journalism, library methods, mathematics, music, physics, political science, psychology, drama and the speech arts, sociology, physical education, botany. The faculty of more than thirty members is drawn from a wide range of colleges, including the University of Iowa, University of Minnesota, University of Pennsylvania and other institutions of high rank.

Daily assemblies are to be held. The assembly this morning will be given up to a musical hour provided by the summer faculty of the school of music. George Payson Hopkins, piano; Miss Alberta Potter, violin; and Madame Rose McGrew, soprano, are on the program for musical numbers. The general public is invited to all the assemblies, which this week will be held in Villard hall. Vieuxtemps, Moskowski, Kreisler, Chopin, Curran, Romad and Teresa del Rigo are represented on the program for today.

President Campbell to Speak

President Campbell's subject for tomorrow morning will be "Advancing Standards." This week an assembly will be held on Saturday, since Saturday classes are to be held to make up for the loss of Tuesday. The speaker Saturday will be O. C. Pratt, city superintendent of schools in Spokane, who is giving education courses in the summer session. Mr. Pratt's subject is "Attitudes and Ideals in Teaching."

A bulletin-newspaper, "The Summer Sun," is to be issued by the students in Journalism. The first number appeared yesterday. This will be the medium of official announcements and of a considerable part of the campus news.

Regarding the sportsmen's exhibit being maintained by Lane county during the rose festival, Mr. Chadwick says that it is attracting a great deal of attention. Lane county has a booth seven and a half by 24 feet, and it depicts hunting and fishing on the McKenzie river. Fish and pheasants are shown and in the center of the booth is a large placard with the inscription, "Lane county. Visit us. You will like it."

CARLETON TALKS AT O. A. C.

ADDRESSES BOYS AND GIRLS AT SUMMER SCHOOL

Lane County Represented by Class of 40 of Which Wendling School Sent 10

Lane county has about 40 boys and girls at the summer school of the Oregon Agricultural college, said E. P. Carleton, city school superintendent, who addressed the children at yesterday's session. Superintendent Carleton, while in the state department of education at Salem, had charge of the boys' and girls' club work at the state fair and has met during the past few years many of these children now at O. A. C. He was given a hearty greeting when he appeared before them yesterday. Of the Lane county schools, Wendling sent 16 boys and girls, six are from Blachly, Pleasant Hill sent a group and a number of other communities are represented. Klamath county sent 41 pupils and they drove the entire distance of 224 miles in cars. The 15 from Mulheur drove 420 miles and other groups drove long distances. Multnomah, represented by 48, has the largest delegation.

Mr. Carleton said that each county group has a yell leader and their yells and stunts are a daily feature and there are two yell leaders for the entire group. He says the work is very interesting and is entirely practical. The boys are taught stock judging and other things pertaining to farm life while the girls learn sewing and cooking.
