Events Will Be Staged Here
July Fourth

Motorcycle races for the Northwest championship in the single and sidecar classes over a half-mile track will be held at the race course of the Lane county fair grounds July 4. The program will be under the direction of the Eugene Motorcycle association and will include a series of special events in several classes in addition to the championship races. Many prominent riders of the Northwest are expected to participate in the events here and starting next Sunday the local association will place the track in condition for the scoring of record time in the events.

As an added feature of the race program the association officials announce that something new for Eugene thrill lovers will be provided in the way of a motorcycle polo match. The race program includes two single cylinder events, two sidecar races and a special Cleveland event. A special match race is planned between Bill Davis of this city riding a Harley-Davidson and an unknown rider riding an Indian. The unknown has challenged Davis and will ride a single cylinder Indian solo against the twin sidecar Harley-Davidson.

SIFT OF ALIEN CUSTODIAN OFFICIAL AFFAIRS URGED

REPRESENTATIVE WOODRUFF
CASTS DOUBT ON MESSAGE
Declares Report Discloses Value of Property Held Quarter of Billion Dollars Short of Expectations

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Demand for a congressional investigation of the office of the alien property custodian was made in the house tonight by Representative Woodruff, Republican of Michigan, who charged that the aggregate value of the properties held by the custodian as shown by his latest report was "nearly a quarter of a billion dollars less than we might reasonably expect to find there."

Only an impartial investigation, the Michigan representative declared, would disclose how much of this shrinkage is due to depreciation through maladministration, how much to sale of properties below their reasonable value, how much to practical gifts to officials, friends and favorites of the custodian's office.

Woodruff Submits Resolution
Mr. Woodruff introduced a resolution for an investigation, declaring that maladministration, discrimination between alien enemies and American citizens whose property was seized and payment of excessive fees to attorneys "have been so frequent as to create a condition which cannot be ignored without grave injury to the good name of our country."

Prompt denial was made tonight by Thomas W. Miller, the alien property custodian, of Mr. Woodruff's charges that disproportionate fees had been paid to counsel, that trusts had been disposed of at unreasonably low prices and that enemy property had been released while property to which American citizens hold title remains sequestered.
