HOME OF A. T. O. FRATERNITY TO BE REMODELED

Student Organization Will Move to New Building Under Construction Near University Campus

Extensive reconstruction of the concrete residence on Oak street between Eleventh and Twelfth avenues east now occupied by the Alpha Tau Omega fraternity of the University of Oregon has been announced by the new owners of the property, Miss Sue Dorris and Miss A. M. Smith, who recently purchased the house from Mrs. J. E. Kuykendall. The plans include the rebuilding of the structure and provide for eight apartments to be equipped with all modern improvements and contractors are now bidding on the work. The plans for the building are under the direction of Robert Prescott, who handled the deal for the property.

The Alpha Tau Omega fraternity will move in the near future to its new home at the corner of Thirteenth avenue east and Kincaid street which is nearing completion. The organization has closed a three-year lease on the property at a yearly rental of \$1800. The purchasers of the present home of the A. T. O. fraternity also owned the house on Alder street between Thirteenth and Fourteenth avenues east occupied by the Tri-Delt society and have just completed the sale of the property to Dr. G. P. Winchell.

The plans for the Oak street apartment building also include the construction of a small bungalow at the rear of the property. Work on the remodeling will start as soon as the house is vacated by the student organization, Mr. Prescott announces.

RIGHT-OF-WAY IS OBTAINED

McKENZIE HIGHWAY TO BE WIDENED AT SEVERAL POINTS

Motorists Are Warned to Lookout for Rolling Trees and Rocks While Work Is Going On

Right-of-way is being obtained for the widening of the McKenzie highway at O'Brien's point at Overhill and other places where it is to be improved. M. H. Harlow, county commissioner, P. M. Morse, county engineer and J. C. McLeod, of the state highway department's engineering force yesterday made a trip over the several sections of the highway to be rebuilt by the state and county this summer to look after right-of-way matters.

Mr. Morse said that crews are at work clearing the trees and brush from the right-of-way at O'Brien's point, at the power plant grade and at shell rock grade. He said that motorists should be careful in driving along these points as big trees and rocks occasionally roll down the side of the mountain along the road.

Engineer Morse reports that on Wednesday the crusher crew on the Cloverdale highway got out 200 yards of rock, which is a big day's work. Good progress is being made on this project. A. C. Matthews yesterday started spreading crushed rock on the Elmira-Franklin highway. Myers' grading crew is two miles or more ahead of the rock crew.

POWDER EXPERT SENT FOR

DIFFICULT BLASTING OPERATION IS REQUIRED

For the purpose of superintending a difficult blasting operation on the Camp creek road project, J. Murphy, powder expert, representing the DuPont powder concern of Seattle, arrived here yesterday and today and tomorrow will assist in the operations which require the blowing out of a ditch for the purpose of draining a

section of the ground where the road crews are at work.

According to local powder dealers the blasting work that will be demonstrated by the DuPont expert has several unusual angles that will be of interest to those who use explosives in agricultural and industrial work and a small group of powder men are planning to make the trip today to the scene of the demonstration.

FACULTY CHANGES MADE

NUMBER OF ADDITIONAL INSTRUCTORS ANNOUNCED

Eyer Brown of Eugene Appointed to Architecture Department—Miss Montgomery Leaves

A number of additional changes in the faculty of the University of Oregon made by the regents at their meeting this week have been announced. Aside from the appointment of Walter R. H. Williams, as professor in the department of architecture, Eyer Brown of Eugene has been appointed as instructor in that department. Mr. Brown fills the place of Louis C. Rosenberg of Portland, who has been abroad for the last two years studying etching, in which he is now specializing. Mr. Rosenberg desires to remain in the east for another year for further development in his specialty. Mr. Brown was graduated with honors from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology this year.

Several other appointments have been made in other departments. In each case filling vacancies made by resignation, and some reorganizations of departments and changes of personnel have been made. Dr. George Tobie, dean of the graduate school and director of the Portland center of the extension division, has been granted a year's leave of absence for the purpose of travel and study in Europe. During Dr. Tobie's absence Dr. Edmund S. Conklin, professor of psychology, will be acting dean of the graduate school, and the Portland center of the extension division will be directly under the supervision of the director of the division, Earl Kilpatrick.

Thomas J. Bolitho, professor of accounting, who has been giving half of his time to Portland classes, will be in Portland full time next year. Vernon E. McEwen, another member of the faculty of the school of business administration, has resigned to return east and his place will be taken as professor of accounting by J. J. McKnight, certified public accountant of Albany.

In place of Eldon Griffin, professor of history, who has taken a year's leave to do advanced study, Donald Barnes, graduate of Nebraska in 1915, who has since taken his master's degree at Harvard and studied at Pennsylvania and is now at Cambridge university, in England, has been appointed.

The position now occupied by Miss Ruth Montgomery as instructor and specialist in educational psychology, will be filled by Miss Ann Hardy, a graduate of Stanford. Miss Montgomery has resigned after a most successful year.

Dr. E. R. Bates, now professor of philosophy and head of the department of rhetoric, has been transferred at his own request to the philosophy department, with the rank of professor of esthetics. With Norman T. Byrne, a graduate student, he will conduct the work in philosophy next year. The three departments of English literature, rhetoric, and drama and the speech arts have been combined in the department of English with Professor H. C. Howe, head of the department of English literature, at the head. Mr. Howe will continue to do active teaching in literature.

SCHOOL MEN MEET TODAY

ANNUAL CONFERENCE TO TALK OF EDUCATION PROBLEMS

President Campbell, O. C. Pratt, of Spokane and Dr. DeBusk Will Make Addresses

President Campbell's address on "Advancing Standards," in Guild Hall at 11 o'clock this morning will open the annual conference of school superintendents and high school principals which will continue through Saturday afternoon. Subjects of special interest to school officials will be discussed, and an attendance of 60 or more is expected.

Following is the program for today. Guild hall, 1:30 p. m., Colin V. Dyment, dean of the college, presiding: "What Can We Expect from Intelligence Tests and Efficiency Tests as Practical Aids Toward Better School Work?" Dr. B. W. DeBusk, professor of education in the university. Discussion by E. F. Carleton, superintendent of schools, Eugene; Daniel McElde, superintendent of schools, Burns; Paul Irvine, principal of union high school, Redmond.

"Special Work for Defectives and Unusual Children," O. C. Pratt, superintendent of schools, Spokane. Discussion by W. J. Misher, superintendent at Grants Pass; Oren W. Hays, superintendent at Cottage Grove; C. G. Springer, superintendent at Dufur. "Examination of School Children in Certain Oregon School Systems" will be discussed by Miss Ruth Montgomery of the University of Oregon school of education faculty. Discussion will be handled by Omar N. Bittner, superintendent at McMinnville and Aubrey G. Smith, superintendent at Medford.

This evening at six the principals' club will hold the first dinner of this summer session at Friendly hall. Dr. H. D. Sheldon, dean of the school of education, will be the speaker of the evening. This dinner will be followed by a reception given by Miss Elizabeth Fox, dean of women and Mrs. Clara Lynn Fitch, secretary of the summer session.

The assembly address Saturday will be made by O. C. Pratt, superintendent of schools at Spokane. The conference will end at 4:30, when the principals and superintendents will join in the hike to Spencer's creek.

HOSPITAL BID IS CHANGED

PORTLAND FIRM WILL BUILD STRUCTURE HERE

A. W. Frazier, contractor, of Portland, will have charge of the construction work of the new Eugene hospital, according to Dr. William Kuykendall, who returned last evening from Portland after a conference with the member of the building firm. The contract for the building was recently awarded to E. M. Drew, of Eugene, but the bid of \$55,250 was later withdrawn. The new bid of the Portland firm is \$81,000, exclusive of \$4000 for the installation of the elevator.

The excavation work, which has been held up for some time will probably start today, according to Dr. Kuykendall.
