DAILY MARKET REPORT
OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., June 23.—Very stagnant here showing for chickens in the local trade with lightweights especially inclined to show depression and a dragging market. Receipts of chickens have not been more than moderate of late, but there has been no snap in the trade.

Killers have bought their full requirements a week in advance of use and have been slow to move a large percentage of the time, except when snags are available.

BUTTER SITUATION IS QUIET
Very quiet situation is shown in the local butter trade. Outside markets are not inclined to change prices generally, with the exception of the extreme value on butter fat, makers are unable to sell for less without actual loss.

EGG TRADE HOLDS ABOUT SAME
Practically no change is shown for eggs here during the Friday trade. Receipts and demand are about equal. Hogs are no longer buying eggs here because of the complaints of poor quality of mixed colors sent there recently.

VEAL TRADE CONTINUES GOOD
Very good trade continues in the market for country-killed calves here. There is no further change in prices generally, with the bulk of the best stuff around 15c a pound. Hogs are not so firm because of a recent drop in the livestock market.

GOOD CHERRIES WILL BETTER
While the market continues slow for small sized and off stuff, demand for the better grade Royal Ann and Bing cherries is improved. Some very good Anna from the Italian sold at 10c to 15c a pound, with Bing at 15c to 20c. Small stuff weak at 8c to 10c.

GREEN AND WAX BEANS LOWER
Both green and wax beans are quoted lower in front street trade, with increasing supplies offered from The Dalles and even from local places. Wax beans are selling at 15c to 16c with green at 15c to 20c a pound.
