LUMBER PLANT IS BURNED
DAUGHERTY CO. MILL AT CURTIN IS DESTROYED

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., June 24.—Fire, which entailed a loss of \$100,000, Friday morning, destroyed the W. H. Daugherty Lumber company's mill at Curtin, 11 miles south of here. The blaze, which is supposed to have been of incendiary origin, broke out about 1 o'clock. Two hundred thousand feet of lumber, all of which was contracted for and one-half of which was cedar, was also burned.
All possible precautions against fire had been taken according to officials of the mill. W. H. Stroud, foreman of the mill, said that he heard an automobile leave the mill yard but thought it was Mr. Daugherty leaving early on a business trip. A few moments later he was aroused by employees at the cook house, who discovered the flames when they arose to prepare breakfast.

FLORENCE CHEESE PLANT
PRODUCTS REACH MARKET
Sixty Cases Put Out By
Grassley and Sons
FINE FUTURE IS INDICATED
Factory So Built—That Capacity Can
Be Increased to 40,000 Pounds
of Milk Per Day

FLORENCE, Ore., June 24.—Lane county's initial bid, through the fact that her empire on the lower Stuslaw and coast country is coming into the cheese market, is 60 cases of full cream cheese from the plant of Grassley & Sons, here.
Andrew Grassley has established the "Daisy Brand" plant for his cheese factory, said to be the only one in Lane county, and the Daisy Farm is the home of the product. The factory is equipped at present to handle one vat of milk but is so built that there can be added two additional vats and can be run 40,000 pounds of milk a day.
"We are the first in this part of the country in this line," says Mr. Grassley, "and we hope to be the forerunner of another Tillamook. Our factory is brand new, recently completed, equipped throughout with the latest new machinery and we have our own water system, fresh from a mountain spring, our own electric plant with a modern barn and all buildings equipped for lighting. The Daisy ranch consists of 300 acres of bottom land and the grass is now a foot high.

400 Cows in Valley
"In this valley alone there are 400 cows. If we secure all these and spread cheese propaganda among our milk producers—which they very much favor—we can put a boat on the Stuslaw river and secure another 200 or 300 cows."
"Every store that has tried the 'Daisy Brand' of cheese compliments this product from the Stuslaw. We are ready to entertain sample orders and they are beginning to come in. We very much want to grow and even half baked opinion has been in this new country the best of opportunities and unsurpassed, and it is all for the taking. Until we get our product tickling the palates of a sufficient number of people we will be held back by lack of capital. Was it not Swift who said that he liked to see young men go into debt for business' sake? We expect Swift would admire us if he were around. Our shippers of butterfat are just getting their butterfly statements and after that we predict they will all see 'Daisy Brand' grow."

Associated Industries to Help
The Associated Industries of Oregon, Manager Dan Freeman writes to Mr. Grassley, will cooperate with the Daisy Brand people in making known its product. He says the Stuslaw river and estuary, with its wonderful chain of lakes on the shore line of the Pacific ocean, are not only green material things but natural glories in the shape of the variegated rhododendron reaching their highest perfection. The hills and valleys are covered with the bloom of this shrub in the spring of the year.
The Stuslaw valley as it develops will abound with agricultural prosperity. Creameries and cheese factories will multiply and the native wealth; the Stuslaw river is fringed with the finest berry and garden land. Along the main river and especially the north fork are splendid dairy farms. Clearing is not entirely difficult. It is a section where the cost of living is not a factor. In addition to the agricultural opportunities, there are great possibilities for the production of special crops such as celery, asparagus, onions, cranberries and early vegetables.

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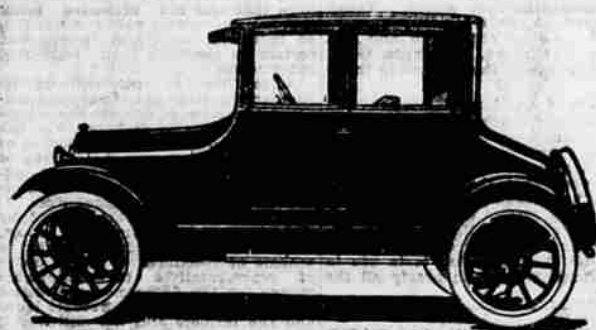
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
