

## NATRON CUTOFF WILL BE FINISHED, SAYS SPROULE

Tells Employees of Plans of Southern Pacific Company

### WANTS TO GET MONEY OUT

Construction Will Be Resumed if Lines Are Allowed to Stand as They Are Now Says Executive

If the Northern Pacific lines are left as they are at present and are not separated from the lines of the Central Pacific according to the recent decree of the United States supreme court, the company will build the Natron cutoff to connect with the Klamath Falls branch, said William Sproule, president of the company, to a committee of Southern Pacific employees in Portland a few days ago. This is the news brought to Eugene yesterday by Sam Veatch and Frank J. Connolly, veteran conductor and engineer, respectively, on the R. P. lines in Oregon.

Mr. Veatch and Mr. Connolly are making a tour of the lines in the state, representing the employees of the company, sounding out public sentiment regarding the proposed unmerging of the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific lines.

"Mr. Sproule told us," said Mr. Veatch, "that the company has already invested \$11,000,000 in the Natron cutoff and that it will take \$12,000,000 more to complete it. He said that the work will be done if the lines are left as they are at present in order to get the \$11,000,000 out of it."

Mr. Veatch and Mr. Connolly interviewed many business men of Eugene yesterday and found sentiment almost unanimous against unmerging of the two systems. They were much pleased at the recent action of the chamber of commerce in the matter. They said that the Albany chamber officials had agreed to take the question up at its next meeting and were assured that similar action would be taken there.

Honolulu tourists are rather rare at the Eugene camp but a party composed of Mr. and Mrs. J. Although the California couple has but little time to look over Oregon owing to their eagerness to land at the national playground, they state that on the return round a more leisurely schedule is to be maintained in order to provide an opportunity for a more thorough survey of the Willamette valley.

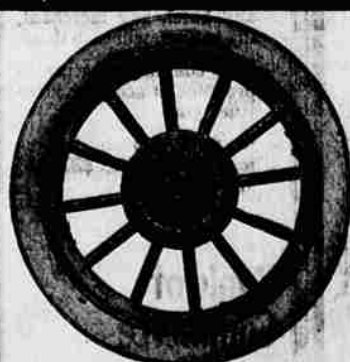
