## SERVICE IDEAL ATTITUDE

BASIS OF TEACHERS' SUCCESS, SAYS SUPT. PRATT

Spokane Educator Addresses University of Oregon Summer School Assembly

"Service is the ideal attitude of every teacher of today," said O. C. Pratt, superintendent of schools from Spokane, in his address to the university assembly in Guild hall yesterday. "An ideal old but always new for every teacher and every student and the principal basis of their success."

## DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE AGENT SIFTS MINE FIGHT

Hugh Willis, Union Board Member, Gives His Version

QUIET PREVAILS IN REGION

General Foreman After Investigation Recommends That No Troops Be Sent and Units Are Disbanded

WAUKEGAN, Ill., June 24.—Troops held in readiness to proceed to the scene of the mine massacre in Williamson county in case of a renewal of the disturbances were ordered demobilized tonight by Governor Len Small. The governor said that his information indicated that law and order had been restored by the local authorities and that the situation was quiet.

HERRIN, Ill., June 24.—An investigator for the United States department of justice, tonight obtained a statement from Hugh Willis, board member of the Heroin district of the United Mine Workers of America, in which Mr. Willis gave his version of the events leading up to the killing of more than twenty non-union strip miners and mine guards on Thursday, June 22.

The department of justice agent tonight told the Associated Press correspondent that he had virtually completed an investigation of the tragedy from all angles. He expects to leave tonight or tomorrow.

It is understood that wounded men undergoing treatment in the hospital here have given their version of the storming of the mine and of the slaughter of their companions and that the complete report will be transmitted direct to Attorney General Harry M. Daugherty in Washington. The department of justice agent explained that the relations of the department rendered it impossible for him to discuss his forthcoming report but indicated that it was satisfactory and complete in detail.

HERRIN, Ill., June 24.—With the departure of Governor Small's special military commission headed by Major General Milton J. Foreman, and the announcement of his recommendation that no troops be sent into Williamson county at the present time, and that those national guard units which had already been mobilized and held in readiness, be ordered home, the situation in the coal fields was easier tonight.

General Foreman, after an active day of investigation, declared he was satisfied that no good purpose would be served by calling out the troops at this time. In his statement he declared he believed that the disturbed condition in the county had been permanently relieved and that it would not recur. The only thing, he asserted, which would cause a recurrence, would be a renewed attempt to mine coal and this he did not believe would be done.

**Mines to Remain Closed**  
None of the old and established coal companies favored attempting to open the mines at this time, the general said. He said that his conclusions today when he toured the county and upon talks with state's Attorney Delos Duty, Sheriff Thaxton, Coroner McCowan, Hugh Willis, district board member of the mine workers of America, and nearly a score of merchants, bankers and mine superintendents.

General Foreman declared he did not believe that the inequest to be held some time tomorrow was likely to provoke further disturbance. The general and members of the military commission declined to say whether or not they believed that the civil authorities of the county had done their duty in attempting to cope with the disturbed conditions which led up to the killings Thursday.

Tomorrow's inequest was expected to end at least for the time being, the official investigation of local authorities into the details of the mine massacre and the mine guards.

**"Persons Unknown" Held Accountable**  
The indications are that the persons who will be officially accountable for the deaths and it appears improbable that the identity of those responsible will be known.

Southern Illinois is inclined to include grimly and with finality another chapter in the long hostility of strife and violence which has been recurrent here during the last thirty years.

There is something of the grim privacy of a clan feud about the thing and the fierce conviction of those who tacitly admit interest in the struggle is theirs and no one else's and reference should be legitimately excluded from "outside of the state."

Charges of broken faith on the part of the operators of the southern Illinois property are reiterated by the miners.

"They double crossed us and we showed 'em," is the general attitude.

**WAGON MINES CLOSED DOWN**  
Strike Sympathizers Swoop Down on Digging and Workers Revamp

KNOXVILLE, Iowa, June 24.—The first demonstration of union sympathizers in Iowa since the coal strike started nearly three months ago today resulted in the closing down of approximately a dozen small non-union wagon mines.

Early this morning, following a mass meeting last night of striking miners at the nearby mining town of Pershing scores of automobiles loaded with strike sympathizers started out visiting all the non-union mines operating within a radius of approximately twenty miles.

Workers in the non-union mines were told to quit work in all instances, according to the operators, who were immediately complied with.

**Many Operators Close Mines**  
In a number of instances, operators of the non-union mines learned of the coming visit of the strike sympathizers and closed their mines.

In several instances the working miners ran for their lives when they saw the many automobiles loaded with the strike sympathizers headed for the mines in which they worked.

Members of the party decline to say who acted as their spokesmen or leader. All of them say, however, that there was no violence. It is estimated that there were approximately 400 men employed in the non-union mines within a radius of 50 miles of Pershing where the agitation to close these mines appears to have had its origin.

The total output from all the non-union mines in this vicinity is estimated at about five carloads a day.

**Man Killed for Thirty Cents**  
PORTLAND, Ore., June 24.—Edward Cushman, 54-year-old piano

finisher, died at a hospital early today from a fractured skull, suffered as a result of being knocked down in a fight following an argument over a 30-cent difference in his pay check last Monday, according to reports to Deputy District Attorney John Mowry. George Kern, 22-year-old bookkeeper, of a local music house, who was alleged to have struck Cushman, left the city but his attorney has advised Mowry that he will return and place himself at the disposal of the authorities.

## BOXER INDEMNITY IS DUE

FUNDS USED TO AID CHINESE STUDENTS IN JAPAN

(Correspondence of the Associated Press)

TOKIO, May 31.—The government will propose at the next session of the diet that the money due Japan from China under the Boxer indemnity agreement shall be appropriated to assist Chinese students who wish to study in Japan. Many of these are now without funds owing to the failure of the Peking government to forward their remittances and the refusal of the Japanese banks to advance any further sums to them, on the ground that there is no security available.

According to the government, the amount of indemnity due is yen 47,800,000 and what will be due by 1940 amounts to yen 70,000,000. The government's plan is to set aside for the above purpose one million yen out of the annual installment amounting to 2,500,000 for the aid of the Chinese studying now and those who study in the future and to appropriate the remaining 2,500,000 yen per annum for the benefit of those Chinese students who are coming to this country for study after 1940.

## Striking Union Miners Shot

Denver, Colo., June 24.—Two striking union miners were shot in an altercation with Colorado rangers at Frederick, Colo., a small town in the heart of the northern Colorado coal mine region shortly after 7 o'clock tonight, according to a dispatch to the Denver Post.

## NEGRO FARMERS GET YIELD

MUCH COIN ACREAGE

(Correspondence of the Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, June 23.—More than 14,000 negro farmers in North Carolina, Texas and Virginia who raised 90,000 acres of corn last year under the advice of county agents employed collectively by the department of agriculture and state agricultural colleges, obtained average yields of 25 bushels an acre. The average for all farms in these states ranged from 17 to 25 bushels an acre, the department said today.

In Virginia nearly 5000 of the negro demonstrators planted pure seed and about 3000 selected seed for their 1932 crop. All these demonstration plots of corn were harvested except 87 acres, which were "hogged

down." It is estimated that 70 per cent of the negro farmers in Virginia are following methods of growing corn taught by extension workers.
