COAST ROAD IS NOW OPEN

SAND HILL IN WEST LANE HAS BEEN ELIMINATED

Forest Crew Has Finished Section of Highway Between Ten Mile and Big Creek

A crew of forest road workers has just completed a stretch of new road three-fourths of a mile long between Ten Mile creek and Cape creek, in the western end of Lane county along the ocean, thus eliminating a sand hill that always has been a big-bear to motorists and which this year has practically stopped all traffic on the road. The new road is now open and cars are passing over it, according to R. S. Shelley, supervisor of the Stuslaw national forest, who has just returned from a trip to that section. This announcement, it is believed by Mr. Shelley, will be received with a great deal of satisfaction by motorists who desire to seek out untraveled spots for their tours and their summer outings. Many cars, during the past few years, have passed over this road which is a part of the proposed Roosevelt highway, but traffic has never been heavy. Now, it is believed, after the news of the completion of this section of road has spread, the traffic along the coast will be heavier.

The road crew that built the detour around this hill has been moved to Big Creek where a section of half a mile of road will be built around another stretch of sand. This piece of road will connect with a new county bridge built over Big Creek last summer.

JUBILEE TO BE HELD AT OWEN THOMPSON PLACE

Herd on Lake Creek Has Gained Nation-wide Reputation for Milk Production

The Jersey cattle breeders of Lane county are planning a jubilee and trip to Owen A. Thompson's farm on Lake creek near Healy, July 29, according to announcement of Ira P. Whitney, county agricultural agent. The tour will be under the auspices of the Lane County Jersey Cattle club, of which T. Q. Green, of Colburg, is president and Frank K. Taylor, of Thurston, is secretary.

Since Mr. Thompson's herd of Jerseys has gained a nation-wide reputation and has made one of the greatest records for a 19-cow herd in the United States, it was thought by the Jersey breeders of Lane county that
