PHASES OF CHURCH WORK DISCUSSED BY DELEGATES

Episcopal Convocation Holds Meeting Here
SCHOOL PLAN ADVOCATED

Education, Social Service and Church Extension Taken Up During Session of Central Oregon District

Three phases of the church program of the Episcopal diocese of Oregon were taken up at the annual convocation of the central district held here yesterday at the St. Mary's Episcopal church. Religious education, social service and church extension were the topics of the visiting church members including an address by Right Reverend Bishop Walter Taylor, Sumner of Portland and Archdeacon J. C. Black of the diocese of Oregon.

During the discussion on religious education Archdeacon Black submitted the report of the convention of the national board of the church recently held at Chicago where he was a representative from Oregon. The report contained the outlined plan of religious education that is to be advocated by the church officials which includes week-day school classes to supplement the regular public school work of the children in addition to the Sunday school classes of the church. This plan has met the approval of the school officials of several states and communities, according to the archdeacon and the plan will be started at Portland in September with the sanction of the school officials of that city.

Student Problems Discussed
Rev. F. G. Jennings, rector of the Eugene church, addressed the delegates on the subject of the establishment of national student council units and Lytle Bartholomew, past president of the University of Oregon student body, spoke on the relationship between church and student body. Rev. E. T. Simpson told of the work among students of colleges and universities.

In a discussion of social service and other problems Karl Kilpatrick, director of the extension division of the University of Oregon spoke on the need of providing a different program for social service work in the west than that necessary in the eastern states. Many of the problems that confront the eastern leader in the social service work are absent in the western part of the country notably slum conditions, which Mr. Kilpatrick, who also touched on the special rural problems that are a part of the work in the northwest.

Several of the visiting church workers were on the evening program which took up the topic of church extension. Rev. W. E. Couper spoke on the extension of diocesan activity and made a plea for cooperation between parish and diocese in the solving of the common problems of the church. The part of women in the church extension was touched upon by Mrs. Wilson Johnson who told of the active efforts of the feminine members of the Episcopal church in the extension plans of the organization.

WOOD INDUSTRY IS URGED

DR. GEORGE WINCHELL ADVOCATES MANUFACTURING HERE
Kiwanis Members Hear of Possibilities for Lane County for Utilization of Timber Resources at Home

Lane county should distribute its great natural timber resources in the form of finished products and not as raw material for other communities to reap the benefit of the manufacturing, according to the opinion of Dr. George Winchell, of the Eugene hardware factory, who yesterday addressed the members of the Eugene Kiwanis club at the luncheon of the organization. In advocating the utilization of the raw material for home industries Dr. Winchell cited the case of Michigan where timbering and manufacturing are both major activities of the state and but little of the cut lumber is sent out in its original form.

The speaker in pointing out the advantages of building up an industry to absorb the vast timber output of Lane county quoted figures from his own plant in this city where he declared the demand for the manufactured product was greatly in excess of the supply and that at the present time many manufactured products of wood are shipped into Oregon from as far away as Maine while the Northwest has practically an unlimited supply of the raw material. This awaits only the establishment of factories to turn it into articles that are now brought in from outside sources, states Dr. Winchell.

TREES FALL ON HIGHWAY

EUGENE PEOPLE DELAYED IN REACHING MCKENZIE BRIDGE

A large number of people of this city, numbering perhaps several hundred, were prevented from attending the dedication of the pioneer marker at McKenzie Bridge Sunday afternoon, by two big trees falling across the highway at Shell rock grade, where contractors are now clearing the right-of-way preparatory to widening it.

The fire set to burn the brush that had been cut was allowed to spread and considerable timber in being burned. One tree that had been burning for some time crashed to the highway just before most of the Eugeneans on the way to the bridge reached the point, and shortly afterward another tree fell across the road behind them, compelling them to remain in the hot sun for two or three hours until the trees were cut away. Axes and saws were procured and occupants of the cars had to do the work.

Mrs. T. G. Hendricks and others in her car had a narrow escape. One of the trees fell immediately in front of her car and the driver had difficulty in stopping it in time to prevent plunging into the tree.
