WILLARD STARTS TRAINING

EX-CHAMPION HOPES FOR RETURN BOUT WITH DEMPSEY

LOS ANGELES, June 27.—Jess Willard, formerly world's heavyweight boxing champion, began training here today for what he hopes will be a return match with Jack Dempsey, who wrested the title from him at Toledo.

He termed his work today "light signal practice" as it consisted of rope skipping and shadow boxing and told the small army of sports writers and camera men from newspapers and motion picture news weeklies that he would "get down to hard work tomorrow."

"I'm in dead earnest about this," he said. "I want to meet Dempsey again because I believe I can beat him. If I get another chance I'll try to prove it was only a lucky punch that gave him victory over me before."

GAME FARM WORK STARTS

OVER \$7,000 TO BE SPENT ON IMPROVEMENTS

Work has been started on the new addition to the present pens at the state game farm southeast of the city. The work is being done under the direction of Gene Simpson, superintendent of the game farms and John Paden is foreman of construction. According to Louis E. Bean, state game commissioner, the materials and work will cost the state about \$7,000. It requires \$2,400 worth of wire netting and \$2,700 worth of lumber. The pens will be increased to more than twice the present capacity.

have contracted shop and track work at various points along its entire system. No answer was filed by the board.

PHILADELPHIA, June 27.—Announcement was made late today by the Pennsylvania railroad that agreements on reduction of wages have been reached between the management and the elected representatives of 42,500 of its employees. The settlements affect the maintenance of way department, embracing 39,400 men, and the employees of the telegraph and signal department, numbering 3,100 men.

The revised scales become effective July 1. They involve reductions which have been mutually agreed upon in conformity with the lower cost of living, the general conditions of employment throughout the country and the demand of the public for cheaper transportation, as expressed in the interstate commerce commission's order, issued last week, reducing the announcement stated.

COMMISSION TO CLEAN UP HIGHWAY BID LETTING

SETTINGS TO BE HELD TODAY AND WEDNESDAY ON ROAD PLANS

One of Most Important Jobs on Today's List That of Rocking of 12.0 Miles of Loop

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27 (Special to the Register).—Bids will be received tomorrow for 22.9 miles of road work and Thursday bids will be opened for 31.1 miles. These 54 miles of work will be the last big letting that the state highway commission is likely to make for some time to come, as finances are running low.

One of the most important jobs up for consideration tomorrow will be the rocking of 12.0 miles of the Mount Hood loop in Clatsop county. This rock surfacing is necessary to save the grade which the commission completed last year.

Two sections of the coast highway are to be bid on, one 2.7 miles of grading in Curry county between Sixes river and Elk river, and the other three miles of rock surfacing north of Rockaway in Tillamook county. On the LaGrande-Enterprise highway bids are asked for the Wallowa hill section and the 4 miles of rock surfacing and the Lostine-Enterprise section, 7.9 miles of grading and rocking. A bridge across the railroad tracks and the Grand Ronde river is also to be let.

SEVERAL PROJECTS ON PROGRAM

On the Pendleton-Cold Spring road from Holdman to Harp ranch, three miles of grading and rocking are advertised on the old Oregon trail also in Unmatta county, the commission is advertising 13.3 miles of grading and rocking from Deadmans Pass to Kamela. In Douglas county seven miles of road surfacing are wanted on Canas mountain on the Roseburg-Coos Bay highway.

A number of bridges will be advertised. The most important is a seven-arch concrete bridge across the Neven-Umpqua river near Myrtle Creek.

Three wooden bridges are to be let on Siletz river in Lincoln county and one across the John Day river between Gilliam and Sherman counties.

Four concrete bridges are advertised between The Dalles and Dufur on The Dalles-California highway. Wagner Gets Commission Job. SALLIE, Ore., June 27.—The Oregon public service commission has appointed H. B. Wagner, Jr., of Portland as assistant secretary of the commission at a salary of \$200 a month. His work will be in the automobile transportation department. No one has held the office for about two years. Guy M. Harris, telephone engineer of the commission, has resigned, it became known today. His work temporarily will be taken over by C. J. Green, chief engineer of the department.
