THOUSANDS ARE COMING

TOURISTS ON WAY FROM CALIFORNIA TO OREGON

Sydney B. Vincent, Manager of Oregon Tourist and Information Bureau, Returns

PORTLAND, Ore., June 27. — Thousands of tourists are headed for Oregon from California, according to Sydney B. Vincent, manager of the Oregon Tourist and Information Bureau who has returned from Sacramento where he attended the annual convention of the National Park-to-Park Highway association.

Nine of the 11 western states were represented at the convention with a total of about 60 delegates and plans were formulated for broadening the scope of the organization to make it a medium for attracting tourists to the western states. Portland was selected as the 1923 convention city and the meeting will probably be held here during the rose festival.

Vincent returned to Oregon by way of Klamath Falls where he established a branch of the tourist and information bureau in connection with the chamber of commerce. He said the chamber is co-operating with the state organization in every possible manner and that signs are being placed calling attention to the branch office. He found the roads through Northern California and through Central Oregon fairly good for mountain roads, but suggests that motorists be careful to fill their radiators and gasoline tanks at every available point.

He said tourist travel over the Dallas-California highway is increasing. The Bend Commercial club is posting many signs calling attention to attractive points of interest throughout that section.
