

SEVERAL STARS FALL IN GOLF TOURNAMENT PLAY

George Von Elm Survives By Heroic Recovery of Form

HILL CREST COUNTRY CLUB, KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 23.—Two rounds of match play in the western amateur golf tournament today produced some of the greatest contests ever seen in any titular competition and closed with several stars eliminated and several others remaining in the contest only through breaks in luck.

Harrison Johnston of St. Paul, Minnesota, state champion and a popular favorite to go through to the semifinals at least, fell before Francis Calmes of Omaha, Nebraska, after he seemed to have the Nebraska well in hand, and "Chick" Evans had two narrow escapes, being forced to go 21 holes to eliminate Eddie Held of St. Louis.

Two other matches went into extra

holes and several were not decided until the 18th green was reached.

Von Elm Has Close Call

George Von Elm, of Salt Lake City, Utah, after winning his 21-hole morning match from Henry Decker, through 20 to 40 puts when he seemed sure of defeat, started badly in the second round, being behind Reuben Bush, Jr., of New Orleans, most of the way. The trans-Mississippi and Pacific Northwest champion again pulled through by a great comeback, however, winning 2 to 1.

Dave Heaton, of Chicago, the former national amateur champion, did not have a hard day, although he defeated Roy Quimet, of Kansas City, brother of the great Francis, only 1 up.

The western junior champion, Burton Mudge, Jr., of Chicago, was out at the 18th hole in the second round before Clarence Wolff, of St. Louis, two up, when he conceded the hole after being faced with the necessity of holing a 20-foot stroke to square the match. Wolff's ball hung on the green, but Mudge previously had beaten A. M. Bartlett, of Otrumwa, Iowa, three times state champion, in 22 holes.

RECORD TIME PREDICTED FOR LOCAL TRACK EVENT

Motorcycle Races Will Be Held July Fourth

Some of the fastest half-miles ever turned on a Eugene track by a motorcycle is the expectation of members of the Eugene Motorcycle association who will direct the race, which is to be held at the Lane county fair grounds July 4. The track is in fine condition and local riders who have been practicing for the race meet have several times bettered the record for the local track which is 37 1/2 seconds for the half-mile oval.

The northwest championship on the half-mile track for both sidecar and singles will be decided at the meet. Bill Davis, of this city, is the present holder of the title for the sidecar class, and "Shorty" Spencer of Portland, holds the honors in the solo class. Both of these riders will be entered to defend their claim on the title.

The first race will get under way at 1 o'clock in the afternoon and plenty of action is promised by the race officials with ten events scheduled with six riders in each class. Many visiting riders are expected to be here for the title matches as the meet will be the only motorcycle race in the Willamette valley July 4.

Between track events the spectators will be entertained with a special motorcycle polo game with two teams of four riders each providing the thrills. Several special races are also to be arranged. Earl Moses will be referee and will select the timers and judges for the meet.

FOUR REMAIN IN SINGLES PHILIP NEER OF STANFORD SURVIVES FIFTH ROUND

PHILADELPHIA, June 23.—Two middle westerners, one easterner, and one Pacific coast representative remain in the singles championship tournament of the inter-collegiate tennis association as a result of the fifth round of play today at the Merion cricket club.

The survivors are Walter Westbrook, Michigan; Wray Brown, Washington university, St. Louis; Philip Neer, Leland Stanford and L. E. Williams, Yale.

Brown caused the first big upset of the tournament when he took the measure of James Davies, Stanford. The match went three sets 6-1, 1-6, 6-4.

Andrew Morgan, captain of the University of Pennsylvania team, put up a hard battle against Neer, the present champion but lost 6-6, 6-5. Westbrook entered the semi-final round by eliminating C. W. Sanders, Jr., captain of the Dartmouth college team in straight sets 7-5, 4-2. In the other fifth round contest Yale scored a win over Harvard when Williams defeated Morris Duane 3-6, 6-1, 6-2.

CHRISTY PUTS PERFECT STRIKE TO HOME PLATE

Ovation Greets Matty, Who Has Won Fight Over T. B.

SARANAC LAKE, N. Y., June 23.—"Big Six" Christy Mathewson, idol of the baseball fans the country over, for the first time since he came here three years ago, his life despaired of, walked out to the mound today, wound up and tossed a perfect strike across the plate, while thousands who had gathered for the occasion, cheered themselves hoarse.

Fully 2,000 persons including friends of the great pitcher who had come up here to see for themselves the fruits of the great fight against tuberculosis that Matty had waged and won, crowded the field. He looked well and gave no signs of having been through his recent illness.

After a procession headed by a band, players on both teams that opened the season, local officials and fans had escorted Matty, his wife and Christy, Jr., piloting the car, in which they rode, to a point behind the home plate. Matty left the machine and to the lusty cheers of the crowd walked slowly but very firmly to the mound. There he straightened to full height, raised the ball aloft wound up and then rubbed his shoulder—he had been sent in "cold."

As he tossed the ball to the catcher, an ovation was accorded him that continued until he had returned to his car and was driven slowly to center field, where he watched the game.

LAND OFFICES RETAINED BILL PASSED IN HOUSE AFTER AN ALL-DAY FIGHT

WASHINGTON, June 23.—After an all-day fight the house tonight passed a bill to continue certain public land offices which under legislation enacted this session would have been closed July 1. The house by a vote of 118 to 98 amended the senate bill to continue the offices at Bellefourche, South Dakota; Waverly, Washington; Dickinson, North Dakota; Del Norte and Sterling, Colorado; Clayton and Fort Sumner, New Mexico; Harrison and Camden, Arizona, and Alliance, Nebraska.

It struck from the bill the provision by the senate for the continuance of the offices at Timber Lake and Lemmon, South Dakota; Williston and Minot, North Dakota; Broken Bow, Nebraska; Durango, Colorado, and Springfield, Missouri.

After having in committee of the whole, adopted an amendment which would have reduced the offices to be continued to Bellefourche, South Dakota; Del Norte, Colorado; Waverly, Washington, and Alliance, Nebraska, the house reversed itself by adopting the senate bill as reported by the house committee on public lands.

SERVICE BODY MOVES TO LOWER TELEPHONE RATES

Newly Elected Officials Plan to Restore Schedule

WOULD VACATE TILT ORDER

Kerrigan Introduces Resolution Which Would Cut Rates and Restore Cash Difference to Patrons

PORTLAND, Ore., June 23.—Newly elected public service commissioners, are planning to take action to restore the rates of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company which were in effect before they were raised by the action of the former commission.

Kerrigan introduced today a resolution before the commission which will have this effect and which will also enable patrons of the telephone company to recover in cash the difference between the charges that they have paid under the new rates and the charges that they would have paid had the old rates remained in effect. The steps leading up to the present rates follow:

The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company filed a petition for leave to increase its telephone rates. The public hearings were held and many cities and towns and telephone patrons were represented by attorneys.

The public service commission then issued an order granting the telephone company permission to increase its rates and they went into effect and were continued after the second hearing.

Suit to Vacate Started Robert G. Duncan, leader of the recall forces, and two citizens began suit before the expiration of the 90-day period as provided by law to set aside and vacate the order of the commission. This suit is in the nature of an appeal from the decision of the commission and is now pending in the circuit court of Multnomah county, which has jurisdiction.

An answer to the suit of Duncan et al was filed by the old public service commission a day or two before the newly elected recall commissioners took office.

The circuit court of Multnomah county has the power either to affirm the decision of the commission raising telephone rates or to set aside and vacate the order.

Vacation of the order would automatically establish the old rates.

If the order raising rates is vacated, the patrons of the company would also be allowed to collect the difference between what they have paid under the new rates and what they would have paid under the old rates.

This would be a large sum of money, several hundred thousand dollars.

Resolutions Introduced The resolution which Commissioner Kerrigan introduced before the commission provides:

First—That the public service commission make no further defense in the pending suit of Duncan et al.

Second—That the public service commission withdraw its answer to the Duncan suit and request I. H. Van Winkle, attorney general, to withdraw the answer already filed and to file an amended answer admitting the allegations of the Duncan complaint.

The circuit court then could render only one decision, which would have the following effect:

First—To vacate the order raising telephone rates.

Second—Automatically to restore the former rates.

Third—To give to patrons of the company the right to recover the difference between the charges paid under the new rates and what their charges would have been under the old rates.
