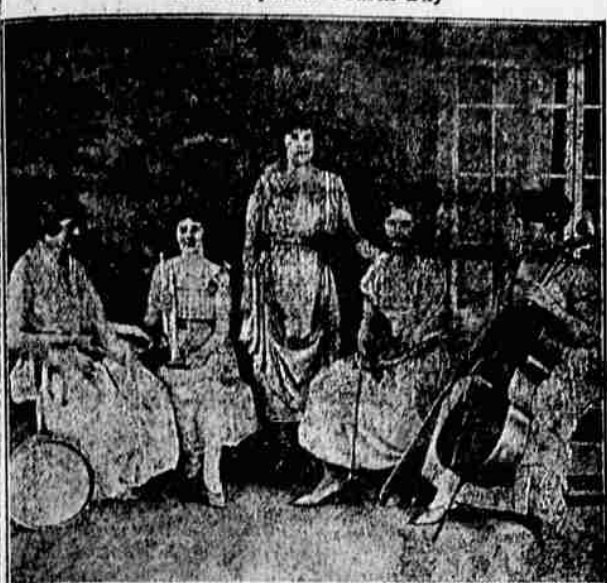

RAIL HEADS SAY DEMANDS OF SHOPMEN IMPOSSIBLE

Officials Feel Little Leeway Is Left to Avoid Strike

ONE FAINT HOPE HELD OUT

Possible Loophole Lies in Chance of Conference Between Union Leaders and Rail Executives

CHICAGO, Ill., June 28.—Two possible means of warding off the threatened rail strike of 400,000 shop men suggested themselves to railroad circles tonight following what H. M. Jewell, head of the shop unions, termed the "last word" to the railroads in the union ultimatum sent to the association of railway executives last night.

The executives, by coincidence, were scheduled to meet in Chicago tomorrow afternoon and local railroad executives today said the shop men's proposal of a truce pending further negotiations on wages and working conditions, would undoubtedly receive attention.

President Jewell's telegram last night to T. Jewett Cuyler, chairman of the executives, left little leeway for avoiding the strike; it was felt by railroad officials. They characterized the union demands that the \$69,000 wage cut ordered by the railroad labor board be stayed, that rules abolished by the board be restored and that farming out of railroad work be discontinued as "impossible" and "unreasonable."

Two Possible Loopholes Left

The certain rejection of the union proposal therefore left, in the opinion of railroad men, but two possible loopholes to avoid issuance of the strike call.

One was that a conference between the union leaders and the executives might be called tomorrow and if no agreement was reached, a technical dispute might be announced, over which the railroad labor board, acting under authority of the transportation act, could take jurisdiction, as it did in the big four brotherhoods' strike last year and act to prevent a walkout.

The other was that if the strike is called the board could also take jurisdiction under the act, on the ground that the strike would interrupt commerce and order the status quo maintained—in other words, order the men back to work.

Ben W. Hooper, chairman of the board, refused to comment on these two possibilities tonight. The action of the board in the threatened strike last October was interpreted as representing the board's position on the first possibility, and since the board has never had occasion to act in any strike of consequence, the chairman declined to state what the federal body's interpretation of the transportation act on that point would be.

PLAN TO CURB TRAFFIC TIEUP

Railway Officials and Public Officers Go Ahead With Plans

NEW YORK, June 28.—Railroad officials and public officers went ahead today with plans to circumvent any tying up of traffic and necessary food supplies of greater New York in the event the railroad shop men go out on their threatened strike next Saturday.

Confidence was expressed at the offices of the 11 railroads entering New York City that all traffic would be moved and no food shortages would result for the metropolis because of the strike. Rail executives also said passenger schedules would not be interrupted. City authorities made plans to supply New York with milk and perishable foodstuffs by motor truck if necessary.

Labor leaders estimated that more than 125,000 workers would be involved in Greater New York in a strike of the car repairmen, maintenance men and clerks.

Secretary of the Treasury Andrew W. Mellon, who was here today with other members of the cabinet, inspecting possible new sites for a postoffice, said that he did not think there would be a strike and that Washington did not feel alarmed over it.

GUARD UNITS TO RETURN

EUGENE COMPANIES EXPECTED BACK TONIGHT

Big Military Parade Will Be Held Today at Portland When Oregon Troops Will Be Reviewed

The Eugene units of the Oregon national guard are expected to be back here this evening after their two weeks of military activity at Camp Lewis which will culminate this afternoon at Portland with a grand review of all of the Oregon state units. The parade at Portland, according to reports, will be one of the largest military events in the city in several years and a special welcome has been planned for the citizen-soldiers including a greeting to the troops by Mayor Baker and city and county officials.

The members of the two Eugene organizations, Company C and the headquarters company, are all in fine condition after their strenuous period of military activity at the annual instruction camp, according to word received from officers and men of the command, who state that everything in the way of war-time field service has been provided for the guard units under the direction of regular army officers.

The exact time of the arrival of the Eugene guardsmen here has not yet been determined so no official plans have been made as a home-coming welcome but it is expected that many friends and relatives of the local troops will be at Portland today to witness the results of the heavy program of soldiering that has just been completed by the two local companies.

STORLI QUILTS MINISTRY

CLOSES ACTIVE CAREER OF 40 YEARS IN CHURCH

Pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church Will Retire on Account of Poor Health

Next Sunday morning, Rev. K. O. Storli, for the past five years pastor of Trinity Lutheran church of this city, will deliver his farewell sermon to his congregation here as well as his final address as an active minister of the gospel. He announces that he has decided to quit the ministry on account of poor health after 40 years of active service to the church.

Rev. Mr. Storli began his work as

minister of the gospel at Bryan, South Dakota, in 1911, remaining there for eight years. While there he acted as a missionary, serving 13 congregations in seven counties during that time. From South Dakota, he was called to a pastorate at Portland, Maine, where he worked for 10 years, then was called to North Dakota, where he remained six years. He returned to Portland, Maine, and remained six years, from there going to Texas and two years later to Seattle. Remaining in the Washington metropolis three years, Rev. Mr. Storli accepted a call to the Eugene pastorate.

It is expected that the local church will obtain a new pastor by fall. A call was made to a minister a short time ago but he did not accept. Rev. Mr. Storli and family will remain in Eugene.

The minister will deliver his farewell sermon to the congregation at the Spencer creek church Sunday afternoon. He closed his work at the Glendale church last Sunday.

COTTAGE GROVE WOMAN GIVES BIRTH TO TRIPLETS

PORTLAND, Ore., June 28.—(Special to the Register.)—Triplets, the aggregate weight of which was 18½ pounds, were born to Mr. and Mrs. Carl F. Palmer of Cottage Grove at the home of Mrs. Palmer's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Adam Derr, here today. They were said to be among the largest triplets on record in this county. The babies, all boys, were named Robert, Richard and Rollo. They weighed 6¼, 6¼ and 6¼.

The caller was naturally quite shocked at the child's literal and mercenary acceptance of her favorite author's jocular way of referring to his labors.

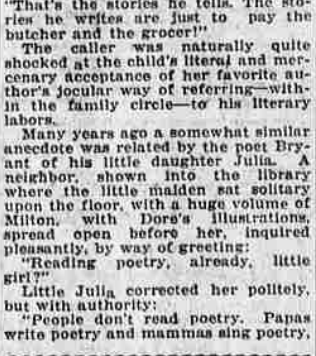
