

RAIL DIVORCE IS OPPOSED

WILLAMETTE LUMBERMEN'S ASSOCIATION ON RECORD

Central Pacific Separation From Excess Would Not Serve Best Interests, Says Resolution

On June 23d the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association declared itself as opposed to dissolution of the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific lines.

This organization includes the manufacturers of lumber at various points in Western Oregon. The resolution reads as follows:

Resolved, That after a careful consideration of the subject, in the opinion of the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association, whose membership is composed of shippers and manufacturers of lumber located in the Willamette valley in the state of Oregon, the disintegration of the Southern Pacific system and the separation from it of the lines of the Central Pacific railway would not be in the public interest and such interest would be served best by the continued operation for the future of the Central Pacific railway company's lines as an integral part of the Southern Pacific system.

Resolved further, That the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association approves the suggested consolidation of the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific as outlined in the tentative plan of the interstate commerce commission, and respectfully requests that when hearings be held thereon, some of such hearing be held at points on the Pacific Coast.

Resolved further, That in view of the uncertainty created by the decision of the supreme court in its recent decision respecting the merger of the Southern Pacific and Central Pacific systems and of the very great importance of the subject to the Pacific Coast and its producing and shipping interests such hearings be held and the matter determined at an early date.

Resolved further, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the secretary of the interstate commerce

PEACE PLAN IS ADVOCATED

CHAUTAUQUA SPEAKER URGES NATIONAL FRIENDSHIP

The United States and Great Britain Could Prevent War States Norman Allan Turle to Local Audience

For the maintenance of the peace of the world a firm friendship between the United States and Great Britain is necessary, in the opinion of Norman Allan Turle, who spoke last evening to a Eugene Chautauqua audience on the subject of "Working Together for Billions," and pointed out the power for preventing national conflicts that lies in a perfect understanding between America and the British empire that would react for the benefit of all mankind.

In advocating this international friendship Turle would be a preventative of war the speaker drew illustrations from the historic part of both nations to indicate the outstanding features of the historical record that the peoples of the British Isles and America have contributed to the well-being progress of the world. Magna Charta, the bill of rights, the Declaration of Independence and the United States constitution, were among the documents he stated were as stones in the foundation of the progress of civilization of the world.

Stainless Iron Held Great Invention Stainless iron, which is already on the market in the form of golf clubs, cutlery, small metal parts, shop fittings, sheets for turbine parts, and for other machinery parts specially liable to corrosion through exposure, is steadily being made cheaper by the manufacturers in Sheffield. Its high cost at present is the chief obstacle to its general use. When people recognize its intrinsic value, stainless iron will be used very extensively, says a steel maker. At present the development is in its infancy, and the closest investigation is necessary before unqualified claims can be made, or before the discovery can be fully exploited. Stainless iron was regarded as one of the most important metallurgical developments of 1921. A great future is prophesied for it in engineering construction. It is expected that eventually it will replace

copper, brass, and nickel in the manufacture of a wide variety of articles.

Long-Lived Scottish Farmer The oldest farmer in West Scotland, John Gray, has just died, breaking an unusual record of longevity. Five farming brothers, all well over

80, attended the funeral, which took place at Tarbolton, Ayrshire, under the shadow of the Inn in which Robert Burns was made a Freemason. Mr. Gray's death is the first in the family for over 60 years.

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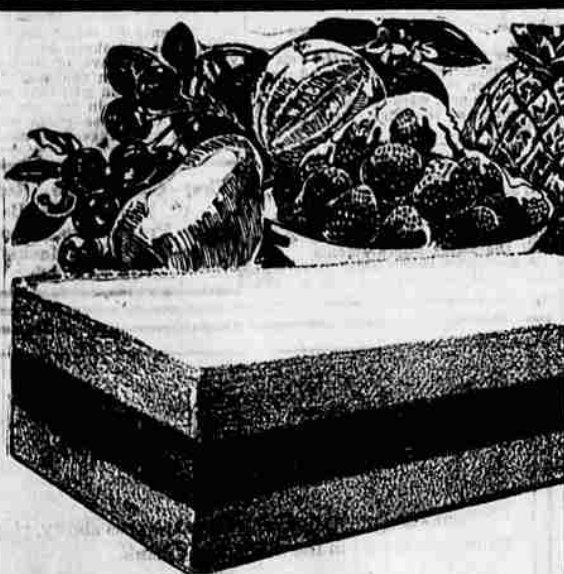
