COLORADO GUARD UNDER ARMS TO QUELL TROUBLE

Orders Follow Burning of Rail Bridges and Mines

STATE RANGERS RECRUITED

Mines of Colorado Fuel and Iron Company Cut Off From Rail Comm. by Bridge Losses

DENVER, Colo., June 29.—Nine companies of Colorado national guard are under orders to mobilize tonight in seven cities and towns of the state following the burning of two railroad bridges and the damaging of mines in Northern and Southern Colorado coal fields last night and early today.

Orders for the mobilization of the guard and for the recruiting of the state ranger force from its present strength of 50 men to a total strength of approximately 400 were issued late today by Colonel Patrick J. Hamrock, state adjutant general, following a conference with Governor Oliver H. Shoup.

First reports of the burning of bridges and mines in the coal fields were received at the adjutant general's office this morning. Within an hour Governor Shoup, who had been at his home in Colorado Springs, was on his way to Denver. In less than an hour after the conference between the governor and the adjutant general telephonic orders were being dispatched to commanding officers of the various guard units.

The principal outbreaks which led up to the events of today occurred near Walsenburg, in Huerfano county, in the Southern Colorado coal field. Two railroad bridges, one near the ideal mine of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, and the other at the Rouse mine of the same company, were burned between midnight and six o'clock this morning. Four mines pump was torn from the Red Ash mine are cut off from railroad communication by the burning of the bridges. In addition the tipple of the Stella May mine, a small property near Walsenburg, was fired during the night and was partially destroyed.

One outbreak was reported from the Northern Colorado coal fields. The pump was torn from the Red Ash mine at Louisville, in Boulder county, and water pipes leading into the mine were broken.

Outbreaks today from both Huerfano and Boulder counties stated that quiet had prevailed during the day. County authorities expressed confidence that they would be able to handle the situation without help of state troops.

DEMPSEY ACCEPTS WILLS' CHALLENGE FOR TITLE GO

Commission Tells Jack He Must Fight or Lose Crown

(By the Associated Press) NEW YORK, June 29.—First steps in negotiations which it is believed eventually will bring Jack Dempsey and Harry Wills, negro pugilist, into the ring for a titular match for the heavyweight crown, were taken today when Dempsey formally accepted Wills' challenge. This acceptance was announced by the New York state boxing commission.

This body officially acknowledged receipt of the challenge and deposit of \$2,500 and later issued a proclamation, that unless Dempsey, before July 10, accepted under reasonable conditions, his title would be declared forfeited as far as New York state boxing territory was involved. In accepting the challenge, Dempsey, through his manager, Jack Kearns, requested that a conference between the principals be held soon, so that conditions governing the proposed bout might be considered.

It is understood the managers of the two heavyweights will meet and arrange the necessary preliminary details within the next week or ten days.

The secretary of the boxing commission, in issuing the formal statement, said that if the match did not go on for such a contest, Dempsey, having fulfilled his part of the contract by accepting the challenge, would remain in possession of his title in the state. If however, the boxers should refuse what the boxing commission considered a reasonable offer, both would lose their status.

riers and unbearable burdens upon the public.

Means Industrial War

Such a statement simply means industrial war and this will result in disaster to the parties and the people.

"The board is vigorously condemned, first by one side and then by the other. The labor controversies have always been rather violent and they have not degenerated into pink teas since they were thrown before the railroad labor board.

"The able men representing the employees put their whole souls into their contentions and the questions they handle are of momentous human importance. They are doubtless often harassed by the apprehension, as are all public servants, that their constituents may not fully understand their efforts.

"It is quite natural that they should delve deeply to heart even a partial failure to attain the full measure of benefits which they seek for those they so loyally represent.

"No Just Cause for Complaint

"But it is evident to every student of the situation that the railway labor organizations have no just cause for serious complaint at the treatment they have received at the hands of federal wage tribunals during the war period and since.

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paid the wages fixed by the various succeeding government tribunals. Now that the decreases have come, the employees should be good sports and accept the reductions.

More Pay When Justified

"If a change in conditions should at any time justify increased wages this board will most cheerfully respond to the situation. Moreover, if it should at any time be made to appear to the board that any injustice has been done to any class of employees by any rule or wage decision, under a continuation of present conditions, it would be the duty of the board to correct such mistakes.

"Let it be understood, however, that the board is convinced at this time that it has made no mistake and committed no injustice of any noteworthy magnitude, in its recent decision on rules and wages. The board has endeavored to conform to the requirements of the law and has established a schedule of wages higher than those prevailing, as a result in other industries. It is useless to repeat statistics on this subject.

"The employees do have one substantial grievance against certain of the carriers and that is the contracting of railway employment to so-called independent contractors. This is not simply a labor grievance, it is a public grievance. This policy carried to its legitimate end destroys the labor articles of the transportation act, treats the United States congress with contempt, deprives the public of lawful protection from railway labor troubles and grievously imposes upon the employees.

Some Discard Contract Policy

"It is highly gratifying, however, that several of the carriers have withdrawn from the contract policy this week and it is hoped that all the others will follow.

"Let both the carriers and the employees deal fairly with each other and both can come by the court of public opinion with clean hands.

"Neither need have any fear that the public will permit injustice to be done to them by the railroad labor board. If the board does not effectuate a substantial degree of justice both to the carriers and the employees, it will be wiped out by congress.

First and most important of all, neither the railroads nor the men.



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should ever overlook the fact that the interest of the people at large in the country and cities must be considered in the solution of all railway problems."
