BUILDING MAY BE BOUGHT

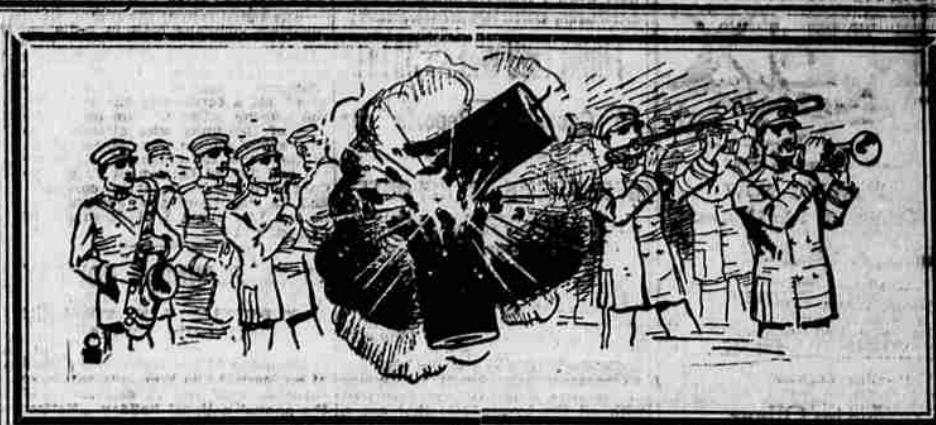
EUGENE GRANGERS' WAREHOUSE PLANS TO INCREASE

Two-Story Plant of Concern Is Matter of Negotiation Between Owners and Warehouse Concern

Negotiations are under way by the Eugene Grangers' Warehouse association for the purchase of the building on Charnelton street now occupied by the firm. The building is of two-story and basement brick construction. It has a 40-foot frontage and a depth of 110 feet and is owned by A. C. Jennings' estate. It has been leased by the warehouse concern for the past five years. The lease also includes an option on the property and this expires about July 15. The deal for the purchase is now pending between the owners and the warehouse concern.

If the property is purchased another story will be added to the structure in the near future, according to W. R. Lord, manager of the association, who states that the increase in the total storage space is needed for the firm has necessitated the expansion of facilities by the addition of the upper floor space. The building is one of the best built warehouses in the city, being supported with concrete piers and having been specially designed for the storage of grain products.
