

JAPAN TO FILE PROTEST OVER CHINESE OUTRAGES

Bandits Put Sub-Consulate of
Chientao to Torch

MISSIONARY FILES CHARGE

Says Japan Has Sent Army into the
Region with Intention of Wiping
Out Christians

(By the Associated Press)
Tokyo, June 29.—Japan is preparing to file a protest to Peking against the burning by Chinese bandits of the Japanese sub-consulate near Chientao, a town in Manchuria just across the Korean border. Special dispatches from Seoul, Korea, report three Japanese killed at Chientao and the hospital and 40 houses burned.

Earlier advices from Seoul had reported the Japanese consulate at Chientao destroyed by the bandits, but advices from the foreign office denied this, stating that it was a sub-consulate near Chientao which had been attacked and burned. The foreign office advices added that buildings adjoining the sub-consulate also were put to the torch.

Missionary Files Charge
One of the missionaries said that China under the strongest protest has sent more than 2,000 men into this region with the avowed intention of wiping out of existence the whole Christian community.

To these charges, Lieut. Col. Hata, of the Japanese foreign office replied that some villages had been burned, but only those in which the majority of the inhabitants were known to be bandits. He said that the Japanese troops had been sent to Chientao to protect the border. Chinese bandits and Russian bandits.

Chientao has been a thorn in the side of the Japanese and the seat of frequent trouble between them and Chinese bandits for some years.

The last serious trouble reported from that region occurred early in 1921, when Japanese sources charged Chinese "thugzines," or bandits, with raiding across the border and killing and wounding a number of Koreans in a Chinese.

China promised to send extra police forces into the troubled territory and Japan agreed to withdraw her troops which she had been using there, according to Tokyo, to maintain order in the absence of Chinese police. Neither promise appears to have been kept.

In December, 1921, Canadian missionaries stationed in Korea and Manchuria created a sensation by charging the Japanese troops with committing a series of systematic atrocities in the Chientao section. Hundreds of the Chinese villagers were shot by the military's soldiers without trial, according to the missionaries' accusations, numbers of villages were reduced to ashes and crops destroyed.

BEST IN ITS CLASS

Eugene Daterman's Heifer Displaces
Princeton Animal for Most
Milk and Butterfat

A new champion for Oregon has been announced by the Holstein-Friesian association of America in the 245-day division of the junior three-year-old class. She is Mercedes Beauty Alcatraz, owned by Max Arp of Eugene. She made 29,421.8 pounds of milk and 709.41 pounds of butterfat, equivalent to 134.8 pounds of butter.

This cow displaced by this record Fairview Pearl Johanna Korndyke, owned by Henry McCall, Princeton, Ore., whose record is 29,422.5 pounds of milk and 618.78 pounds of butterfat, equivalent to 119.5 pounds of butter.

The state record for 245-day production of all ages is held by Star-bop Belle Johanna, owned by H. G. Mullenhoff, of Gresham, Ore., whose record is 32,453.8 pounds of milk and 932.95 pounds of butterfat, equivalent to 1,242.4 pounds of butter.

MANY EDUCATORS ENROLL

SUMMER SESSION HERE HAS
LARGE REGISTRATION

More Than Seventy-Five Per Cent of
Students on Local Campus Are
Engaged in School Work

More than 75 per cent of the 324 students enrolled in the Eugene branch of the University of Oregon summer session are school superintendents and teachers, according to the figures in the registrar's office, which show that 276 are engaged in some form of school work. The principal's club, made up of principals and superintendents, has nearly seventy members, including representatives from most of the larger towns of the state. The total enrollment, in Portland and Eugene, is now more than 800, with the prospect that the 550 mark will be reached or passed by the late registrants.

Graduate students enrolled number 80, and more than twice as many upper division courses—for third and fourth year students and graduates—are taken than lower division—for freshmen and sophomores. This is accounted for by the administration, largely by the greater number of teachers and graduates enrolled than usual.

"There is a notable unity of purpose on the part of the members of the session, and a lack of interest in athletics," said Dean Colin V. Dymond, director of the summer term on the campus, "and an effort to do seriously the graduate work, in many cases with the view of obtaining a master's degree."

Most of the undergraduate work is being done in Portland this year, and many of those enrolled there are regular university students and those preparing to enter in the fall.

MANY DRIVERS NEGLIGENT

PROPER PLACING OF LIGHTS
URGED BY OFFICERS

Motorists that fail to observe the traffic laws that deal with the proper placing of lights on their machines are being warned by the traffic officers that many of them are negligent in regard to the placing of the spotlights on their cars. The beam of the light, according to the road code, should be six feet to the right of the car and 75 feet ahead. Many motorists are also driving with only one of the headlights burning, according to Rodney Roach, local traffic officer, and numerous warnings have been given that this practice is dangerous to the safety of drivers, he states.

BIG ENGINES WILL GO ON

S. P. HAS NEW EQUIPMENT FOR
MOUNTAIN DIVISION

The first of the Southern Pacific's 35 new heavy locomotives assigned to the mountain division between

Oakland and Dunsmuir will be placed in freight service in about ten days and within two months all will be operating, according to announcement by F. L. Burckhalter, assistant general manager. Recently these locomotives came west as a special prosperity train in sections.

"Freight traffic is picking up on the Shasta route," said Mr. Burckhalter. "The preponderance of the loads moving south is twice that of the north bound movement, which necessitates a large movement of empty cars through Ashland to haul Oregon products south."

"Passenger business is increasing and it has been necessary to put on an extra north bound train in addition to the four regular trains to take care of the large tourist movement from California to Oregon and the points north."

CAMP LOCATION CHANGED

Y. M. C. A. BOYS TO HOLD EVENT
ON ROW RIVER

Excellent Swimming Facilities Are

Change of the location of the annual Y. M. C.
