LAW UPHOLDING IS TOPIC

AMERICANISM IS EXTOLLED BY KLANSMAN SPEAKER

Rev. L. E. Burger Delivers Second Address on the Order of the Ku Klux Klan and Its Aims

Dealing with the aims of the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan and their efforts for the upholding of Americanism, Rev. L. E. Burger of Walla Walla, Wash., last night addressed a Eugene audience concerning the tenets of the organization and its program for the protection of American laws and government from the attacks of its enemies. Dr. R. H. Sawyer, who was scheduled to speak, was unable to be present.

During his address Mr. Burger read the oath that he stated every klanman must take before enrollment in the organization and he declared that no true American need be ashamed to swear and abide by the words that are spoken before the cross of Christianity and the flag of the United States.

Denying the allegations of the enemies of the klan that the organization hoped to gain its ends through unlawful means, the speaker declared that the one infallible weapon that is in the hands of every member of the Ku Klux Klan was the ballot and that this and this alone is the powerful factor that will preserve the sanctity of the laws of the United States from those who would destroy the government that is built on an ideal of true Americanism.

In concluding his address the speaker quoted the phrase of General George Washington, "Put only Americans on Guard Tonight," and added that this guardianship of the fundamental principles of the United States was a duty to be realized through the earnest and loyal efforts of those who believed in white supremacy and Protestant Americanism.

DIVORCE CASE DISMISSED

MRS. ALPHA McALLISTER FAILS TO GET DECREE

Judge Hamilton Says Evidence Does Not Show Adultery But That She Was Indiscreet

The divorce case of Mrs. Alpha B. McAllister against Sir H. McAllister, which was heard before Judge J. W. Hamilton, of Roseburg, in circuit court here a short time ago behind closed doors, was dismissed yesterday, the judge having sent a decree to that effect.

Judge Hamilton says in his findings and facts in the case that it does not appear from the evidence that there is truth in the charge of the defendant of adultery but it does appear, he said, that the plaintiff has been indiscreet in her association with other men, particularly true since being a resident of Eugene. The judge says that the defendant became jealous and suspicious of plaintiff regarding said conduct and for which attitude of mind the plaintiff by her acts and conduct is in a measure responsible. That the accusations made by the defendant were without malice on his part but under the belief that the plaintiff was guilty; that the plaintiff's suit be dismissed and the divorce should not be granted.

The case of Reginald C. Conley against Jane Henderson was dismissed by Judge Hamilton.

W. P. Reed is plaintiff in a suit against R. H. Field to recover the sum \$354.14 alleged due on a promissory note together with eight per cent interest from June 7, 1922, and \$100 attorney fee.

BUILDING PERMITS MANY

TOTAL COST OF STRUCTURES NEARLY \$200,000

Twenty-one New Residences Started During Past Month and Many Are to Be Remodeled

Building permits in June totaled higher than for any month since the University of Oregon took out permits for a number of large structures two years ago, according to W. H. Alexander, city building inspector. The total estimated cost of buildings for which permits were issued during the month is \$192,733.

The largest permit was for the erection of a three-story concrete hospital building of the Eugene hospital association. One permit was issued for a \$15,000 residence to be erected by W. J. Johnson, one for a \$15,000 apartment house to be erected by Mrs. Evelyn Patton, one for a dormitory to be erected on the campus of the girls' college of the Eugene Bible university at a cost of \$3770, one for an \$8000 residence to be built by H. E. Morris and one for a \$6000 residence to be built by J. B. Bell. The total number of permits was 49 of which 21 were for new residences and 18 for remodeling residences. Permits were issued for two warehouses, one mattress factory building, one shed, one shop and a number of lesser structures.

APPEAL MADE TO S. P. MEN

SHIPMEN ADDRESSED BY GENERAL MANAGER OF ROAD

If They Strike They Have All to Lose and Nothing to Gain, Says Dyer in Statement

There is no indication at the local yards of the Southern Pacific company that the shipmen here will strike today. The number employed here is not large, and according to railway officials if they should walk out their places could be filled easily. The following statement was issued yesterday by J. H. Dyer, general manager of the company, and received here by local employees:

"Southern Pacific ship and car-department employees. Reports are to the effect that the leaders of your labor organizations may attempt to require or influence you to quit work and go on strike at 10 a. m., Saturday, July 1, the proposed strike being against decisions of the United States railroad labor board, which as you know, was created by the transportation act of 1920 for the express purpose of deciding disputes between the railroads and their employees as to wages and working conditions. The provisions of the decision against which you may be asked to strike will be just and reasonable after full consideration of all the facts having a bearing upon the points at issue. Therefore, the proposed strike will be in violation of federal law and against your government, because the labor board is the government under the law. You accepted the increased wages and improved working conditions awarded by the railroad administration and the labor board during the period of high prices caused by the war and should now in all justice contribute your part towards the necessary return to normal conditions."

"Let me assure you that employees who remain loyally at work if the strike is called and the new men come in to help will be fully protected in their work and rights. Those who should have the full knowledge that they have nothing to gain and everything to lose because the actions of the labor board will be upheld by public opinion and there are many good men among the ranks of the unemployed who are ready to take their places. The strikers will lose their jobs, seniority, pension and other privileges and in most instances their families will be forced to suffer with them. Let me suggest that you now give very serious consideration as to the action you should take as an individual in event of strike and its probable effect upon the future of yourself and family after which all of the firm belief that you will decide that it is to your best interest to remain in the service of the company."
