PADDOCK MAKES FINE
NEW WORLD'S RECORDSCinder-Path Speed Marvel Per-
forms at Santa Barbara

ALSO EQUALS 100 RECORD

World's Greatest Sprinter, in Excel-
lent Form, Making Famous
Leaping Finish at the Tape

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., July 4.—Charles Paddock, California's super sprinter, made five new world's records here today in competition at a sanctioned track meet over a measured track. They were: This elapsed 1-5 seconds from the start, 125 yards, 12-5 seconds, a gain of 1-5 of a second. 50 yards, 7-5 seconds, a gain of 1-5 of a second. 75 yards, 7-10 seconds, a gain of 1-10 of a second. 60 yards, 6-1-5 seconds, a gain of 1-5 of a second.

Paddock also equaled the record of 2-3 for the 100-yard dash and 2-5 for the 75-yard dash. He brought the time first in every distance of every race except the 50-yard distance of the first sprint, in which Eddie Sudden led with a time mark of 2-5 seconds, not a record, and the 55-yard dash of the third race, which Sudden also won.

The races were run over a track that many years ago was a fair race course and had been worked and built and rebuilt until with the passing years, according to Paddock, it has become the best course he ever ran over.

The day was ideal, there being only a light breeze and that quartering the track so that it did not retard or aid the sprinters. The officials were all men of experience, headed by President Robert Weaver, who had been in the sport since 1908, and in the phenomenal sprints in which Paddock clipped 1-5 seconds from the world's record in the 175-yard distance, three official timers and two unofficial timers, all experienced men, caught the time alike at 17 seconds flat.

Sprinter in Excellent Form
Paddock was in fine condition and warmed only briefly before the first race, when he was merely rested and regained his stamina. He made his famous leaping finishes at the final tape in each dash, throwing himself forward so that in each case he clipped a fraction from his time. In the 175-yard dash especially, where he got away out in front and stayed there, he took a magnificent leaping stride at the finish, in which he widened the distance between himself and Eddie Sudden, his nearest competitor, as if Sudden had suddenly lost his stride, although the latter was also getting over the ground in rapid fashion.

Sudden from the Olympia club of San Francisco, was pacemaker for the various events and gave Paddock every assistance, subordinating his own chances to help the champion. He displayed wonderful form and, not only got away even with Paddock or ahead of him, but he headed him at the 50-yard mark in the first race, where he won by one second behind the world's record.

MURPHY WINS ANNUAL
AUTO SPEEDWAY CLASSICCovers 250 Miles at Rate of
97.6 Miles an Hour

TACOMA, SPEEDWAY, TACOMA, Wash., July 4.—Jimmy Murphy, sensational automobile race driver, added to his laurels here this afternoon by winning the fourth annual auto speedway classic. Murphy covered the 250 miles at the rate of 97.6 miles an hour.

Tommy Milton took second place after leading Murphy nearly all the way.

Milton went into second place at the 225th mile when he was forced to go to the pits and change a tire. He was unable thereafter to regain the lead. Roscoe Surles took third place with Jerry Wonderlich fourth and Harry Hartz fifth.

Murphy's time for the 250 miles was two hours 33 minutes and 55-5 seconds while Milton was less than six seconds behind him.

The 97.6 miles an hour speed made by Murphy broke the track record for 250-mile races. The previous record was made by Milton last year and was 96.4 miles per hour.

ROCKY KANSAS GETS

came in with left and clinched. Leonard missed right to stomach. Kansas swung two lefts to the jaw and Leonard danced away. Kansas landed two light lefts to the head and missed a right. Leonard sent left to stomach and Kansas sent back a similar blow. Leonard blocked light left to head and Kansas hooked light left to stomach. Leonard missed right swing to head at belt.

Round two—They missed left to head and in the exchange Leonard had the better of it. Leonard backed Kansas to the ropes and sent right to groin. They fought at close quarters and Leonard hooked solidly to body.

Round three—Kansas missed a left and fell down and Benny nailed him with a right to the chin, making him back away. Leonard landed a light left to the head and Kansas missed a left to stomach and stretched out. Leonard with left to chin. Both missed lefts. Leonard drove Kansas into the ropes, landing two lefts and a right.

Round four—Kansas was short with a left to the stomach and Leonard jabbed twice to nose. Kansas again missed a left to stomach. They traded lefts to the head and Leonard danced away from a left. Leonard hooked solidly to stomach and the champion landed a right high to the head and uppercutted Kansas. He came in and Leonard landed another uppercut. Kansas came to a ropes. He slowed up the challenger with another smash to the stomach.

Round five—Leonard landed a light left to head and Kansas missed with left to head. Leonard feinted Kansas into leading and checked him on the chin with left. Leonard traded lefts to the head and Kansas missed with left to stomach. Kansas landed a blow that looked foul, but Leonard did not protest. Leonard hooked a right and left to body and Kansas was short with a left. Kansas missed another left and received a bolt on the chest. Leonard put a left to the body and landed a right and left to the head. Kansas was unwilling to open up and Leonard rocked him with three rights and lefts as round ended.

Round seven—Leonard landed three lefts to nose without harm. He hooked a left to Kansas chin and Kansas backed away as the champion shot his left to the challenger's face. Kansas was short with a left and Leonard hooked lefts to stomach and head. Rocky tried two lefts and received a right and left to the chin.

Benny drove him to the corner, land-
ing a right and left to head. Kansas
was bleeding at mouth from Leon-
ard's left jab. Leonard missed a left
hook.

Round eight—Leonard backed Kansas around the ring and feinted for an opening. Both missed lefts and Leonard stuck his left into Rocky's mouth twice. They traded lefts to head and Leonard hooked right to stomach. Leonard hooked right to chin and Kansas missed two lefts. Leonard drove Rocky to ropes and had him groggy from a series of right and left hand jabs. Leonard rushed. Kansas to ropes, hooking viciously with rights and lefts to jaw. Kansas, groggy and bleeding rushed to opposite side of the ring, seeking refuge in the corner. Leonard hooked with left and rights to the face, and the beaten challenger started to collapse when Manager Dan Rogers tossed the sponge into the ring.

KANGAROO A NATURAL BOXER

Youngsters Are Taught by Their Parents and Acquire Efficiency

Kangaroos are natural boxers. The younger kangaroo is taught to defend himself in this way as soon as he is old enough to hop about. Naturalists who have watched the animals in their native surroundings say it is very funny to see the mother giving the youngster his first boxing lessons. Afterward the father takes up the teaching, with much gentleness and patience trains him to box.

When kangaroos box they back off and rush in and prance about very skillfully. Each one watches for an opportunity to strike, and at the same time tries to prevent the other from striking. They cleverly try to move about so as to get the enemy below

them on the slope of a hill. The resounding blows they give with their hind legs can be heard far away.

The kangaroo fights like a gentleman. He is a good sportsman even when he is fighting with his enemy. The animals strike with the flat of the foot, and never use against each other their terrible ripping claws.

Word "Lot" of Puritan Origin

The use of the word "lot" to designate a field or plot of land, is universal in the United States. It had its origin among the Puritans, and was the product of their strict adherence to Biblical customs.

Among the early settlers of New England the extensive salt-marshes from which the salt-hay was cut, were owned in common, every man helping himself to as much hay as he wished. As the population increased

this condition could not prevail with general harmony, and it was agreed to divide the marshes equally among all the families. This was done by the Biblical fashion of lot, and the portion which fell to each man was known as "his lot." In a short time the word came to apply to any piece of land, and finally reached the meaning of any great quantity.
