Lie Detector Clears Murder Suspect

submitting himself to the "sphygmo-
nometer," or, in plain language,
the "lie detector," invented by Dr.
John A. Larson, professor-police-
man, of Berkeley, Cal., police depart-
ment. The lie detector records the pulse
vibrations of suspects under police
examination, and it informed the po-
lice that Wilkens was telling the truth
about the murder of his wife by two
auto bandits. The police suspected
Wilkens, because he told them he had
never seen the bandits before, when
he had actually been a foreman over one of them for months, and a nation-
wide search was instituted for Walter and Arthur Castor. They further
suspected him because his wife had filed a separate maintenance suit and
because he had often threatened suicide because of his grief. But the lie
detector freed him.
