EUGENE STRIKERS ARE RETURNING TO JOBS

All But One of Round House Men at Work

CAR REPAIRERS COMING

Seven o'clock Today Is Time Set for Railway Employees to Return or Lose All Rights

Fifteen of the 21 car repairers and inspectors in the local yards of the Southern Pacific company here are expected to be back on their jobs this morning, according to railway men, and it is possible, they said, that a full crew may be at work. All but one of the roundhouse men here are back to work and this one may return today, it is asserted.

Twenty-four men were at work in the roundhouse and yards yesterday and it began to look like a normal crew again. It is said that there has been a sentiment prevalent among the employees who struck for a number of days past that the best thing for all concerned will be to report for work at 7 o'clock this morning which is the time set by the company for all strikers to return to their jobs or lose their pension and seniority rights. After this time those who returned to work would have to start at the bottom.

The following message was received yesterday by Ernest Stroud, trainmaster here, from E. L. King, superintendent of the Oregon lines:

"At seven a. m. today, 30 old employees in all departments at the Brooklyn shops returned to work. Have advised from others they will report before noon and be on hand tomorrow a. m. You should give this information out to men on strike as it clearly indicates these men recognize they belong to no union now as the wage board abrogated the organization to which they belonged, therefore their organization is not recognized although this company will abide by the rules, working conditions and wages covering those crafts in effect and the recent resolution of the labor board was to effect new men should form a new organization in order to secure representation before the labor board. I mention this because undoubtedly leaders have misinformed these men as to their status and in order that they as well as their families will not suffer the usual hardships following such unauthorized actions they should avail themselves at once of the opportunity to return because we will positively not consider their reinstatement or re-employment after time limit set by the general manager."

AERO PATROL IS FAVORED

OFFICERS STATE PLANES MAY RETURN NEXT YEAR

Timber Guarding Work Is Excellent Training for Air Pilots in Opinion of Army Men Who Stop Here

Resumption of the aerial forest patrol in the timber areas of Oregon is a possibility for next year, according to the opinion of a party of aviation corps officers that are in the city on their way to Camp Lewis for duty with the R. O. T. C. organizations now in training. The aero party is composed of Captain A. Herold, Lieutenant R. E. Sleff and Lieutenant W. R. Maxwell, who was stationed here last

summer with the 91st aero squadron. The army officers state that throughout the aerial service the officers are firm in the belief that the forest patrol work is the best form of training for air pilots and that earnest efforts are being made to have the military planes assigned to this work in order to provide the necessary training for the personnel of the service.

One of the planes that was damaged while landing here Tuesday will be left at the local aviation field as it will probably be ten days before the arrival of a new radiator and propeller that are needed for the repair of the machine, according to Captain Herold. The other planes will probably leave for the north today and the officers state that they expect to return toward the Presidio at San Francisco the latter part of the month. This is the first visit of Lieutenant Maxwell to Eugene since leaving for the south last fall with the 91st squadron.

WILLAMETTE PASS IS OPEN

PAIRTY MAKES FIRST CROSSING OF YEAR

Bird Rose and Family Report That the Route Is Now Feasible for Light-Powered Machines

Driving a light-weight car, Bird Rose and his two daughters, of this city, are the first motorists to make the Willamette pass trip this year. They came over the road Monday on their return after a four-week motor trip through California, and report that the route is in fair condition for machine traffic. Mr. Rose, hearing in the South that the pass was still closed by the drifts, took on provisions for ten days and intended to camp at Crescent lake and wait for a more favorable time to make the venture, but on their arrival they decided to press on and they negotiated the snow blockade successfully.

Mr. Rose and his family are now at McCredie Springs for a visit before returning to their home here. Several parties have already attempted the crossing of the Willamette pass this year by motor, but the huge snow barriers have proved too much of a handicap. The warm weather of the past two weeks has cleared the route and the trip is now feasible for light-powered cars, according to Mr. Rose. While camped at Crescent lake, the local tourist states that a mass invasion of mosquitoes was one of the determining factors that resulted in the decision to make the attempt at the crossing. While in California the Eugene party planned a motor trip into Mexico, but were advised not to make the attempt, owing to troubled conditions there at the present time.

NEW MILK LAW IN EFFECT

LICENSE FEE NOW REQUIRED OF ALL THOSE SELLING

Measure Passed by City Council to Safeguard Health of People of Eugene

The milk peddlers' license ordinance went into effect July 1 and already several dealers have paid their license fee, said Judge Alta King yesterday.

The ordinance passed by the council a number of weeks ago provides for the payment of a fee to provide proper inspection as to sanitary conditions in order to safeguard the health of the people. The fees as fixed by the council are as follows:

Producers, producers-distributors and distributors who sell 10 quarts or less each day, \$1 a year; restaurants and hotels, \$1 a year; those who sell from 10 to 25 quarts a day, \$5 a year; 25 to 50 quarts a day, \$10 a year; 50 to 100 quarts a day, \$17.50 a year; 100 or more quarts a day, \$25 a year.

The measure was passed at the instance of the dairymen. They brought forth the argument that there are one and two-cow dairies that do business here that should be regulated as to sanitary conditions. The larger dairies are state inspected and are compelled to come up to certain standards.

BATHER LOSES HIS WALLET

BLODGETT RESIDENT THINKS BOYS STOLE IT

E. R. Wiese, of Blodgett, Benton county, says the boys of Eugene are not to be trusted. He went swimming in the mill race at Ninth avenue east July 4th. He left his clothing on the bank, and although he saw a couple of boys not far away, he thought nothing of their presence, and proceeded to enjoy himself in the cool waters of the stream. When he put his clothes back on he missed his pocketbook which contained a check for \$50, a \$10 bill and a \$5 bill. He reported to the police.

Sam Rubinstein says he is going to some coast or mountain camping place and find a new tent, two camp chairs and a folding cot that were stolen from his place on Eighth avenue some time Tuesday night. He thinks some Eugenean preparing to go camping broke in and helped himself to these necessary pieces of camping paraphernalia, or perhaps some passing tourist, being short of these articles, committed the theft. The sheriff's force and police are working on the case.

BARN FIRE LOSS \$10,000

M. H. STEWART LOSES BIG BUILDING AND HAY

The fire west of the city mentioned in yesterday morning's Register, as occurring just before press time, destroyed the large dairy barn on M. H. Stewart's farm across the road from W. O. Cook's brick works. The loss was \$10,000, according to the estimate of Mr. Stewart, and he carried but little insurance.

Over 100 tons of new hay besides considerable farm machinery and dairy equipment and the milk house adjoining the barn were burned. The cattle were all out of the barn at the time.

Mr. Stewart said he is at a loss to account for the origin of the blaze. He said that the family was awakened by the light and at that time the roof was nearly ready to fall in.

The fire could be seen for many miles and it appeared to be closer to the city than it was.

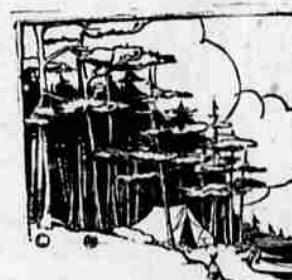
