ALL VIOLATORS OF CAMP FIRE LAW TO BE ARRESTED

Drastic Action to Be Taken By
Forest Officials

EXTREME CAUTION URGED

Several New Blazes Reported by Supervising Warden Oglesby in Western Part of County

All national forest employees have strict instructions to arrest any person who leaves a fire burning or even a spark of a fire at his camp in the Cascade national forest during the dry period, according to Nelson F. Macduff, who has just returned to Eugene from a trip of several days through the forest.

Mr. Macduff said as he came along the McKenzie highway yesterday he saw a camp fire still burning between two logs and that it was quite apt to spread. He reported the fire but as it was outside of his territory he said he did not look for the campers who left it there.

The state law provides that all camp fires shall be built in a safe place and that all inflammable material shall be cleared off the ground around the fires. Mr. Macduff said that if this section of the law is not complied with arrests may be made.

The supervisor assisted the different rangers in starting their fire fighting crews and lookouts to work and while on Hardesty mountain spotted a fire over on Hills creek. The atmosphere was so smoky he was unable to see very far.

More Fires Reported

Carl V. Oglesby, supervising warden of the Western Lane County Fire association, who was in the city yesterday, said that a fire is burning in the timber on the west side of Triangle lake and that a new fire has been discovered on the headwaters of Wolf creek eight or ten miles south and west of Eugene. This fire, he learned, had spread over a territory covering about 50 acres.

The fire in the vicinity of the Stevens-Farris mill at Shannon is under control, said Mr. Oglesby, and there seems to be no further danger of its spreading.

No Green Timber Burned

There is still another fire below Beecher Rock, on the old Stuslaw stage road, but it has practically burned out, according to the warden. He said it came near destroying a donkey engine in the logging camp of Boring and Graves, but by hard fighting the crew saved the equipment.

No green timber is being destroyed, said Warden Oglesby. The fires are entirely on the ground but naturally the young trees are killed or badly damaged.

Mr. Oglesby asks if anyone discovers a fire in the western part of the county to telephone to the Stuslaw Timber company, 164.

MERCHANTS TO ENTERTAIN

CROWD OF 8000 PREDICTED FOR ANNUAL PICNIC

Grocers and Butchers Planning for Big Community Gathering at Cottage Grove for August 3

Preparations are to be made to entertain at least 8000 visitors at the annual grocers' and butchers' picnic to be held at Cottage Grove August 3, according to the estimate of various committees of the organization that held a meeting last evening at the chamber of commerce to outline the plans for the big event and make arrangements for the financing. The committee submitted a budget of approximately \$1000 and this sum will be raised among the merchants to provide the entertainment fund for the annual show.

Music will be provided by a band of 12 pieces in addition to an orchestra that will play for the afternoon and evening dance program. An all-day concert is promised and plenty of musical action will be provided for the picnic gathering is the announcement of the committee in charge of this part of the arrangements. The affair will be in the nature of a mammoth community meeting, state officials in charge of the event, and the merchants from Springfield, Cottage Grove, Creswell and Junction City will all participate in the annual event.

That there will be plenty of food on hand for the guests of the merchants is indicated by the report of the barbecue committee which has made provision for five steers to be roasted for the open-air banquet which will be one of the attractive features of the outing, according to the merchants.
