TWENTY-FOUR CAR REPAIR MEN REFUSE TO GO BACK

Decide at Last Moment to Stay
Off of Jobs

NEW HANDS NOW SOUGHT

Agent Gillette of S. P. Company Seeking Men to Take Place of Local Strikers

Twenty-four former employees of the Southern Pacific company here, who walked out when the strike was called the other day, have forfeited all privileges as old employees and if they are ever employed again by the company they will have to start at the bottom, declare the officials.

These 24 men refused to return to work yesterday morning at 7 o'clock, which was the hour set for all strikers to return or cease to become employees of the company. In the roundhouse department there is a full crew at work.

At a meeting of car repairers and inspectors held last night it was voted 100 per cent not to return to work, according to members of the union who were present at the meeting. It had been predicted that at least 15 of them would return to their jobs yesterday morning. A. J. Gillette, agent of the company here, said that he had a promise to that effect.

Mr. Gillette is now seeking new men for the vacant jobs and said he preferred to employ Eugene residents. A call was issued yesterday afternoon for 15 car repair men and inspectors. The local committee from the federated crafts yesterday issued the following statement:

"At the regular meeting of the local federated crafts of striking railway shop men it was decided by a 100 per cent vote to stay out; not a man voting to return.

"We learn that the following places have taken the same action as we have: Marshfield, Ashland, Portland and Roseburg.

"All members are very optimistic as to the outcome.

PETRARCH ERA DISCUSSED

INFLUENCE OF ITALIAN WRITER IS DETAIL

Historian States that Medieval Scholar Was Initiator of Renaissance Movement in Literature

Petrarch rather than Dante was credited by Dr. S. B. Harding, professor of literature in the University of Oregon, in his lecture in Guild hall yesterday morning on the Renaissance, with being the real initiator of the Renaissance in letters and learning. The third lecture of the series will be given this morning on "The Spirit of Humanism," and the series will continue next week, Monday and Tuesday. The public is invited.

"Dante on the whole, looked backward instead of forward," said Dr. Harding. "He anticipated the modern in many things; he glimpsed the modern world from afar; but he was not of the modern world. He was the culmination of the best things of the middle ages."

Many signs in Dante's life of a break with the old traditions were noted. For instance, it was pointed out, he wrote in the Tuscan vernacular; therefore, all the writing had been done in Latin. In his independent attitude of perfecting his own personality and in his passion for personal fame, he was also a man of the Renaissance; but, with all his superiority to Petrarch as a poet, his spirit is that of the medieval rather than the modern.

Petrarch, on the other hand, was more decidedly modern. He was one of the first men, according to the speaker, to climb a mountain for the sake of the view, though, in medieval fashion, he moralized about it on the way down. Four points of Petrarch's career stood out in relief. Dr. Harding asserted: First, he was the leading collector of the lost and forgotten works of Latin antiquity; second, as a critic he was the founder of serious scholarship; third, he was a Latin author, and, fourth, he was a noted Italian poet. As a critic, Petrarch, it was pointed out, picked out the fallacies in astrology and punctured the pretensions of many pseudo-scientists and scholars of that day.

In the promotion of the modern spirit, the speaker went on to say, Petrarch had a worthy coadjutor in his contemporary, Boccaccio, author of the Decameron, the first writer of Italian prose. Though, as critics have pointed out, his "Intercourse" is a masterpiece of a fluent, easy, entertaining writer, who got himself read. Under the influence of Petrarch he also made a close study of the works of classical antiquity and was the first of the medieval Italian scholars to learn the Greek language, the study of which he proceeded to promote in Italy, opening the ancient treasuries to the modern spirit of curiosity.

SCREEN TO BE DISPLAYED

NEW TYPE OF SHEET TO BE USED FOR FILMS

A demonstration of a new type of motion picture screen as a means of increasing the efficiency of the use of the films in educational work, will be presented this evening at Friendly hall before the members of the school-masters' club, a group of educators attending the annual summer session of the University of Oregon. Alfred Powers, of the extension division of the university, assisted by Low Tyrrell of the visual instruction department, will demonstrate the screen. By the use of the screen the films can be displayed by daylight which will be of great benefit to students as the handicap of taking notes in a darkened room will be eliminated.

CONCERT WELL ATTENDED

BAND ENTERTAINS IN FIRST OF SUMMER SERIES

That the efforts of the recently organized Eugene concert band to provide a series of weekly musical presentations is appreciated by the local public is indicated by the crowd of several hundred that attended the first event on the program held last evening at the city park. The local organization under the direction of Albert Perfect offered a well selected concert program that drew a heavy

response from the large audience that gave evidence that this form of summer evening entertainment is popular among local music lovers.

The second concert will be presented next Friday evening and officials of the band are hopeful that through the co-operation of the people of Eugene the series will be continued through the summer months.

RADIO STATION TO START

NEW EQUIPMENT TO BE ADDED FOR BROADCASTING

With the installation of a new motor generator and additional equipment the radio broadcasting station operated by Garrett Lewis here, will start sending out aerial concerts within two weeks for the benefit of the many radio enthusiasts that have receiving instruments in this vicinity, according to Lewis, who states that the work on the station has been held up while waiting for the apparatus.

Lewis holds one of the two federal broadcasting licenses that have been issued for this district and states that with the opening of the station that plans are being arranged for special programs of instrumental and vocal concerts. The station is being equipped through the co-operation of the Excelsior Manufacturing company and the Eugene Radio company.

TWO YOUTHS ARE PAROLED

BEAMAN AND RUSSELL SENTENCED FOR VAGRANCY

Robert O. Beaman and George Michael Russell, the youths arrested on the night of July 3 by Policeman W. G. Judkins when he found them loitering in the rear of the McNeig market on Ninth avenue east, yesterday were given an examination before Justice of the Peace Jesse G. Wells and were sentenced to serve 30 days in the county jail on a charge of vagrancy but sentence was suspended pending good behavior.

Judge Wells admonished the young men who reside here, to go to work and keep off the streets or they would have to serve their sentence. They were in trouble once before, say the officers, when they were riding in a car with another man who had liquor in his possession.

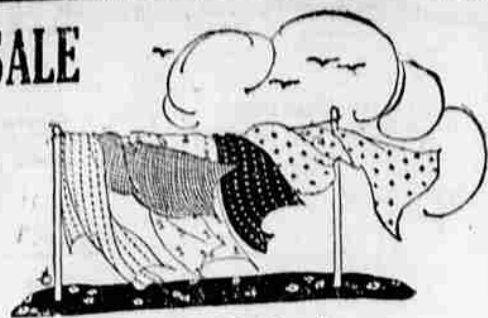
