## THIRD SHIFT TO GO ON AT SPRINGFIELD JULY 12

Arrangements Made By Booth-Kelly Lumber Company

GIVE WENDLING MEN WORK

Crew Thrown Out of Employment by Big Fire Will Lose But Little Time

Arrangements have been made for putting on the third shift at the Springfield mill of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company, July 12, according to A. C. Dixon, manager of the company, upon his departure for Portland yesterday afternoon.

About a hundred men thrown out of work in the destruction of the mill at Wendling Thursday will be given places on this shift and the manager said that the company's production of lumber will be kept up to standard under this arrangement as the Wendling mill was operating under only one shift.

Arrangements have been made for additional electric power from the plant of the Mountain States Power company adjoining the mill at Springfield.

No logging crews will be laid off as a result of the fire as it will require the same force of loggers to get timber out for three shifts for the Springfield mill as it did for two shifts at this plant and one at the Wendling mill.

The Eugene firemen who were called to the Wendling fire devoted most of their attention to saving the dam at the foot of the mill pond, according to William Nussbaum, chief of the local department, who headed the crew of four men taking the big pumping engine to the scene of the blaze. Chief Nussbaum said that the company's fire hose would not reach the dam and as the mill hands had everything else under control the local firemen were called upon to save the dam which had been afire for some time before they reached there. Manager Dixon expressed high appreciation of the work of the local fire fighters.

Chief Nussbaum said yesterday that the big engine was at work on the blaze for three and a half hours and that about 35 gallons of gasoline were consumed besides the tank full with which the machine started out from Eugene.

## THEFT SUSPECTS ARE HELD

THREE MEN THOUGHT TO HAVE STOLEN AUTO

Machine Owned by Seattle Japanese and Has Been Missing Since July 5

Three men who said they were from Montecito and Cosmopolis, Wash., are in the local jail, held on suspicion of having stolen a Japanese machine owned by Seattle Japanese and has been missing since July 5.

The driver gave his name as Earl C. Fellows and said his age is 26. Vernon L. Spring is the name given by another and his age 21, and Charles Frederick is the name claimed by the third, an older man.

The men had a dirty camping outfit in the car and said they were headed for Eugene where they expected to get employment and falling here, would go on to California.

Sheriff Stickels ascertained last night that this car is owned by I. Kodama, a Japanese residing at 1408 Sixth avenue, Seattle, and that it was stolen on the night July 5.

Joe Keller, head of the auto theft department of the Portland police, telephoned to the sheriff here to hold the men at all hazards and that they will be arrested on a charge of transporting a car from one state to another.

George Croner, deputy sheriff, and a number of other deputies, accompanied by two state fish detectives, Matt Ryckman and Tom Craig, effected the arrest of the three men.

## NEARLY FULL CREW OF CAR REPAIRERS NOW EMPLOYED

New Men Put on at Eugene Yards By Southern Pacific

ALL TAKEN FROM THIS CITY

Superintendent King Sends Word That False Propaganda Is Being Spread

Nearly a full force of car repairers and inspectors went to work in the Southern Pacific yards here yesterday, stated Ernest Stroud, trainmaster.

"You may say that our roundhouse forces are intact and have been all the time, except for one man and our car forces are almost complete," said Mr. Stroud. "We have taken on nearly a full force of bread winners from this city."

The strikers seem to be under the impression that they will sooner or later get their old jobs back but the company officials deny this.

Mr. Stroud yesterday received the following message upon that subject from E. L. King, superintendent of the lines in Oregon:

"It comes to my attention that strikers and their paid leaders are spreading false propaganda to the effect that our shop crafts men now at work will be displaced later on by men on strike. Nothing could be further from the truth. Our shop craft employees have my promise that there will not be at any time any understanding or agreement reached with anybody that will require their displacement by men now on strike. You have my assurance that shop craft men who remained loyal, those who returned to service in response to my notice of July 2, and new shop craft employees will be positively protected against displacement at all times. So that our present employees and our trainmaster, who are the seniority rights you should immediately arrange to start your new seniority lists and post them in shops, round houses and car yards, adding to the list the names of the men entering the service in order of their employment."

## CHURCH HAS GREAT YEAR

FUTURE VIEWED BY REV. E. V. STIVERS WITH OPTIMISM

Eugene Minister Re-elected Head of Oregon Christian Missionary Convention

Viewing the outlook for the church here in Oregon with optimism, Rev. E. V. Stivers, of Eugene, re-elected president of the state board for the fourth time in the business session of the convention of Christian churches being held at Turner, said he fully expected to see the church in the West because of the permanence of our location at Turner.

"In particular," said Dr. Stivers, "we wish to emphasize the part which we are desirous of having the laymen of the church take in future conventions. We feel that the outstanding convention of the West because of the permanence of our location at Turner."

The report of State Secretary C. F. Swander showed a total of \$14,000 raised, 14 missionaries employed and a considerable number of additions to Oregon churches. He reported that in 1921 the churches in Oregon would celebrate their diamond anniversary, as that year would mark the 75th anniversary of the Oregon country, and his recommendation that the intervening five years be spent in a diamond anniversary campaign, with an objective of \$75,000 for Oregon missions, to close with a diamond jubilee convention, with hearty approval. The convention also approved the report of the future work committee, which recommended the adoption of the state secretary's report and particularly emphasized the cooperation of all the Oregon Christian churches in the simultaneous evangelistic campaign planned to begin November 25.

Traverse Harrison, of Cincinnati, was added to the staff of teachers in the leadership training school and will conduct classes for the young people's division. A. F. Henney, Congo missionary, told of the seven missionaries who have gone to Africa from Oregon after being trained in the Eugene Bible university.

## HIGHWAY DEEDS ARE FILED

RIGHT - OF - WAY OBTAINED BY LANE COUNTY

Farmers Along River Bottom Between Junction City and Harrisburg Transfer Land

Deeds to right-of-way for the new Pacific highway through the river bottom between Junction City and Harrisburg were filed for record in the office of the county clerk yesterday.

In changing the route of the highway along the bottom the county court and state highway commissions have in mind the erection of the proposed bridge across the Willamette to replace the present ferry and at a different location than the ferry. The bridge will be some distance above the ferry.

The grantors of land for right-of-way, the amount deeded to the county and the sum paid are as follows:

There is now in mind the erection of the highway between Junction City and Lancaster but no work has yet been done in the river bottom section.

## BUSINESS FALLING OFF

LUMBER PRODUCTION ABOVE NEW ORDERS IS REPORT

One hundred and twenty-one mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association for the week ending July 1, manufactured 36,360,753 feet of lumber valued at \$0,954,375 feet and shipped 95,278,120 feet.

Production for reporting mills was seven per cent above normal. New business was six per cent below production. Shipments were 18 per cent above new business.

Forty per cent of all new business taken during the week was for future water delivery. This amounted to \$2,384,373 feet, of which 23,819,373 feet was for domestic cargo delivery, and \$65,000 feet for river-sea shipment. New business for delivery by rail amounted to 1,619 cars.

Thirty-nine per cent of the week's

lumber shipments moved by water. This amounted to 36,388,120 feet, of which 23,819,373 feet moved coastwise and inter-coastal, and 12,568,747 feet export. Rail shipments amounted to 1,943 cars.

Unfilled domestic cargo orders totaled 114,643,774 feet. Unfilled export orders, 66,176,233 feet. Unfilled rail trade orders, 6,387 cars.

In twenty-six weeks production has been 2,112,403,422 feet; new business 2,132,323,820 feet; shipments 2,082,371,129 feet.

## SLUGS BOTHERING CHERRIES

SPRAY NOW FOR PESTS THAT EAT LEAVES

Slugs are bothering cherry trees and giving considerable worry to orchardists. Fruit Inspector Stewart states that they can be easily controlled by spraying. For trees which are in bearing, the lime-sulphur solution should be used at the rate of one gallon to 100 gallons of water.

Where there is no fruit on the trees, use one pound of lead arsenate to 50 gallons of water. The second brood will be coming on soon and will take every vestige of foliage from the trees unless spraying is done at once. If the slugs are permitted to remove the foliage the trees will bear no fruit next year.

## DE MOLAY CLUB TO INITIATE

TENTATIVE PLANS MADE FOR CEREMONY HERE

Local Boys' Organization to Install Large Class Later in Summer, According to Local Officials

Plans for the holding of a ceremony here later in the summer at the initiation of a large class into the ranks of the Order of De Molay are being discussed by officials of the organization, which is composed of the sons of members of the Masonic order and their friends. The local unit of the Order of De Molay was organized in this city last spring and at present there are 32 members on the registration rolls and many petitions for membership are expected to be ready for action at the next meeting of the order, to be held early next month.

No definite date has yet been set for the initiation ceremony, but the tentative plans already arranged, according to the officers of the local group, include the presentation of a flag to the club by the Al Kader temple of the Order of the Mystic Shrine of Portland. The delegation of Portland Shriner will join with members of the Al Kader temple from this city in the presentation ceremonies, is the announcement.

There are at present 600 local units of the De Molay in the United States, according to a report of Eugene officers of the order, and 200 of the groups have been organized since last March. The Oregon chapters of the national organization are at Eugene, Salem, Marshfield, Medford, Portland, Baker and Corvallis.

## OPENING 59 NEW STORES

J. C. PENNEY COMPANY ADDING EXTENSIVELY TO CHAIN

The J. C. Penney company, who have operated a successful store here for a number of years, are opening 59 new stores throughout the country. When this has been accomplished, the nation-wide organization will have 371 stores. The present expansion policy of the company contemplates still more stores next year.

The growth of the company has been remarkable. The first store was opened 20 years ago, 1902, doing a business of \$28,828.11. Last year, 1921, it had 312 stores and the gross volume of sales amounted to \$46,641,928.20.

J. C. Penney, the founder of the company, is still active in the affairs of the organization, being chairman of the board of directors.

## NEW SCHOOLS ARE PLANNED

BUILDINGS AT BLUE RIVER AND BLANCHY TALKED OF

The voters of Blue River and Nimrod school districts, which were consolidated a year or so ago, will meet at Blue River July 15 to ballot upon the question of the erection of a modern two-room school house for both the high school and grade school, according to Mrs. Cora Neal, clerk of the consolidated district.

E. J. Moore, county school superintendent, and his assistant, J. G. Swan, expect to go to Blachly Tuesday to attend a meeting of the taxpayers there to talk over plans for a fine new school to be erected at Blachly for the five consolidated districts in that locality. There has been talk of a four-room building and of the establishment of a high school.
