SHIPS GET SOUND BUSINESS BOARD MEMBERS TOLD 50 PER CENT GOES BY WATER

SEATTLE, July 12.—Statistics to show that American ships are carrying more than 50 per cent of the foreign commerce of Puget Sound were submitted to the United States shipping board's special investigating committee at a hearing held here by J. D. Lowman, representing the Seattle chamber of commerce.

The committee, composed of three members of the board—Former Senator George E. Chamberlain, Admiral W. S. Benson and Meyer Loomis—is conducting hearings to determine the feasibility of the enforcement of section 25 of the Jones shipping act. Hearings were held in Portland, Ore., Monday and yesterday.

Chairman Chamberlain said he hoped to finish the Seattle hearing today and to depart tomorrow for an inspection of foreign trade facilities here. The committee plans to leave tomorrow night for San Francisco and Los Angeles.
