TWO FIRES ARE REPORTED

ONE AT TRIANGLE LAKE AND OTHER AT NOTI
Both Said to Be in Green Timber But No Damage is Expected—Fire Situation Favorable

Two forest fires in the Coast range west of Eugene that have entered green timber were reported yesterday by the Slushway Timber company and C. V. Oglesby, supervising warden of the Western Lane County Fire Patrol association.

One of the fires is at Triangle lake. Warden Oglesby said that he heard from there yesterday at noon and it was expected that the fire would be under control before night.

The other fire is near Noti. The warden called up that place by telephone and ascertained that the blaze originated when the men at the new Larsen mill just west of Noti set fire to brush that had been cleared out of the new pond. It got away and spread up the creek for quite a distance. The flames are pretty close to green timber but no damage is reported.

The fire situation in Lane county is generally favorable. Officials of the two national forests here say that no fires have been reported in government timber and private timber associations say that very few fires are burning.

PINKERTON TELLS HOW GUMSHOE MEN SUCCEED

Detectives of Fiction "Bunk" Says Famous Man-Hunter

RADIO FLIVVER SCRAPPED

Machine Caused Much Excitement and Amusement During Shriners' Convention in San Francisco

(By the Associated Press)
SAN FRANCISCO, July 8.—Detective work consists mainly in using common sense, William A. Pinkerton, veteran chief of the great detective bureau which bears his name, declared here while attending the annual convention of the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

Gumshoe detectives of fiction were declared by Pinkerton to be "bunk, pure and simple." He declared he never had read a detective story that read like the person who wrote it knew what he was talking about.

"These stories about detectives tracing crime by secret watches and all that sort of rot gives people the wrong idea about the way we work," he said.

"Any man with good common sense can be a detective. Two picked up some of my men from street car jobs and other occupations and they usually have made good."

Luck has something to do with the work of detectives, Pinkerton said. "Some of the cases I have cleared up and for which I have been given credit as having done clever work came to me by pure accident," he added.

I certainly am protesting against this practice and responsible directors and producers have already promised that no such pictures will be made in the future."

An antenna of three strands, properly insulated, was strung on the top of the enclosed flivver and to all appearances the machine traveled through congested traffic districts without mishap at the steering wheel.

Traffic policemen and citizens generally attempted to stop the machine when it seemed to be moving without a driver. Many of them led up on the running board and attempted to use the brakes and steering gear but they refused to function.

The secret of the radio flivver was that a duplicate control had been placed in the enclosed radio flivver car and the driver was hidden behind a dark curtain so that he was invisible.

YANKS HAVE QUIT QUEST OF IMPRISONED ROYALTY

GRANADA, Spain, June 13.—Americans have quit coming to Spain in search of the beautiful and wealthy princess imprisoned in a dark, damp tower by a greedy uncle, who probably charged well for their services. Letters concerning the distressed princess are usually marked strictly confidential and instructions are given that nothing must be said to anyone lest the life of the princess be endangered. Most of the dupes are too much ashamed of their plight to confess openly that they have been gulled, but an occasional victim approaches some of the foreign consuls or seeks the aid of the Spanish police in trying to recover money advanced to the swindlers.

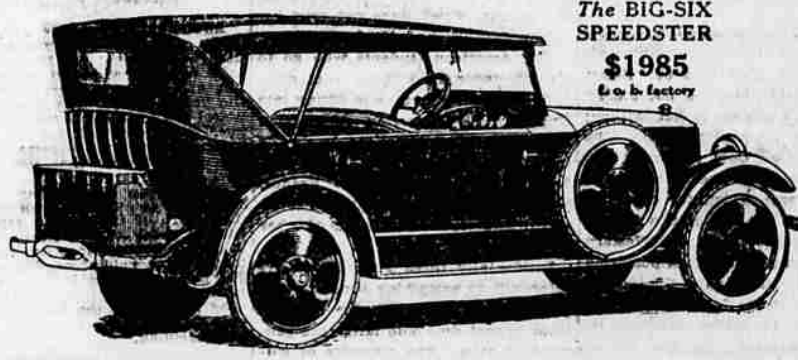

MACHINE SEEN PARKED NEAR SCENE OF BRUTAL DEED
Officers Seek Slayer of Pauline Grass and Alex Winter Near Sanger, California

FRESNO, Cal., July 12.—Upon the finding of a small touring car seen parked along the highway near the spot where Pauline Grass, 16-year-old Sanger school girl, and Alex Winter, her sweetheart, were brutally murdered Sunday night, hinges the solution of the gruesome tragedy, according to local authorities investigating the case.
