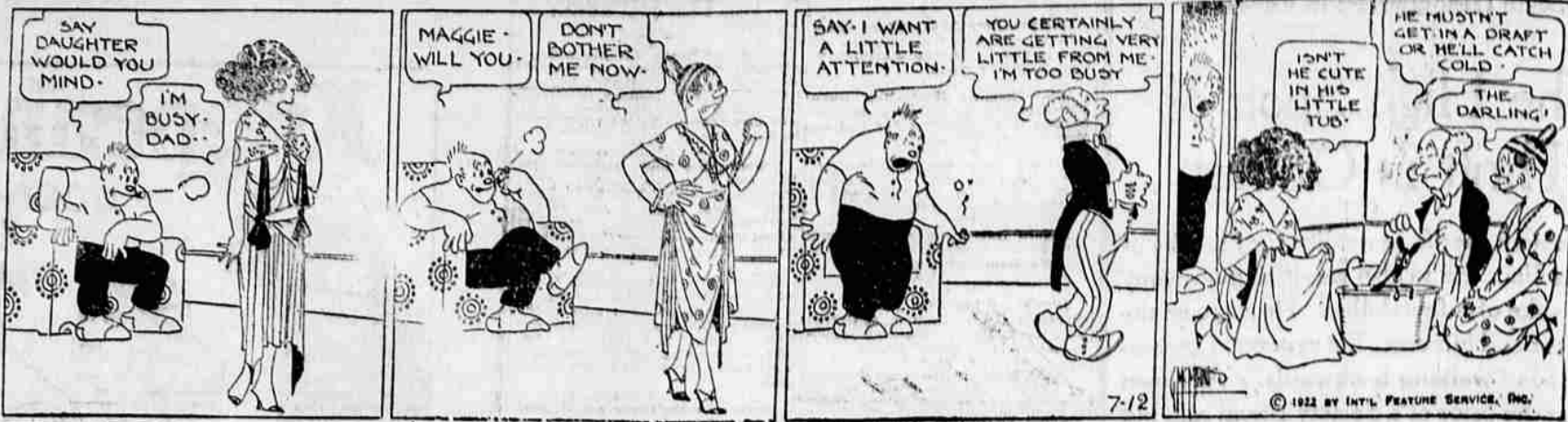
GARAGEMEN, POSTOFFICE PLAYERS WIN IN TWILIGHT

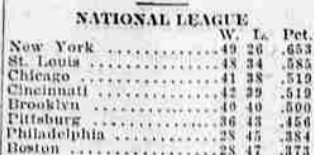

POWER PERMITS GRANTED
 FEDERAL SANCTION IS GIVEN NUMBER OF PROJECTS

WASHINGTON, July 12.—The federal power committee announced today preliminary permits for power projects had been issued affecting various sections of the country.

The Washington Water Power company was granted a permit for a project at Kettle Falls, on the Columbia river, Washington. The ultimate installation to produce 153,400 horsepower.

The power sites on the Mississippi river at Otzgo and Monticello, Minnesota, are provided for under permit granted the Northern States power company of Minnesota, to develop 10,300 horsepower.

The St. Cloud Public Service company was granted a permit for development of 4,500 horsepower near Clearwater, Minnesota, while the Fort Klamath Meadows company, of Fort

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
