

MOTION PICTURE URGED AS HELP TO EDUCATION

Slowness to Use Films Noted
By Earl Kilpatrick

VAST POSSIBILITIES SEEN

Cinema History Told at Assembly
Dr. Richardson to Discuss
"Taste for Dirt" Today

Slowness of adaptation of the motion picture to educational needs was deplored by Earl Kilpatrick, director of the university extension division, in an address at assembly at Guild hall yesterday morning. "Moving pictures in the classroom," Kilpatrick declared to be at fault; the producers, for the most part, are both ignorant of educational needs and indifferent to them as lacking in profit, while the educators have no knowledge of either the technique or the method of the motion picture. Illustrative of the producer's attitude the speaker quoted two titles which were sent out some time ago as educational films; one was "Early's Revenge," and the other was "Old Maid's Love."

Mr. Kilpatrick went into the historical development of motion pictures from the beginnings of photography. The tremendous shortening of the time of exposure necessary for photographs from the five hours in the day of Daguerre, the French pioneer photographer of the nineteenth century to the one-fiftieth of a second needed under the latest French process, was cited as giving untold possibilities in the motion picture.

Early Experiment Told of
One of the forerunners of the motion picture of today, as cited by the speaker, was Edward Muybridge, who

50 years ago in California took 24 simultaneous photographs of black running horses against a white background to settle the question whether a running horse has all four feet off the ground at the same time. The photographs, all taken by separate cameras from different angles, proved that the horse does have all four feet off the ground at once. The so-called "slow movie," the speaker pointed out, analyzes the movements of animals by the use of one camera from one position, through the great speed at which the separate pictures can be taken, to be later run slowly on the screen.

The first actual motion picture involving the principle of separate pictures taken from a single point of view and flashed on the screen to produce the effect of motion, was credited to C. Francis Jenkins, of Richmond, Ind., a stenographer in the national treasury department, whose invention was actively referred to by his home paper as "perhaps the greatest made to date by any Wayne county man." This was in 1894. Two years later, the invention having in the meantime been absorbed and taken over by the Edison interests, the first motion picture theatre was opened in New York City.

Utility Is Shown
The utility of the motion picture for instruction in geography, history, and several branches of science was brought out by the speaker, who emphasized their importance in obtaining views from the sky and of the

marine life. Pictures of things the eye cannot see because they move too fast, of others which move too slowly, and the things that are too small, which the combination of the microscope and the film make available, all are now available for educational purposes, it was declared.

Mr. Kilpatrick urged educators to take more interest in this great agency for education. The University of Oregon, he said, has been trying to be a pioneer in this work in the state, and the development he characterized as slight in comparison with the possibilities.

At the assembly today the address will be made by Dr. Otto Richardson, professor of English literature at the University of Idaho, on the subject, "American Literature and the Taste for Dirt."

SIUSLAW FIRES DANGEROUS

POSSIBILITY THAT BLAZE NEAR
PASSES BROKE AWAY

Careful Watch Is Necessary on Account of Constant Danger of Spreading in Dry Weather

Although all the fires in the Siuslaw country are now under control, several of them require careful watching, according to E. G. Muir, custodian of the Siuslaw timber company. The blaze in the vicinity of Notti got away from people who were burning brush but was checked by the fighters who were rushed to that locality Wednesday.

Belief that there was a possibility of the blaze between the high and low passes having broke away from the road workers in that district was expressed by Mr. Muir yesterday afternoon. Dense clouds of smoke had been reported from that part of the timber, but Mr. Muir received no notification from his lookouts concerning a dangerous fire in that place. The road men have taken upon themselves the task of fighting any fires which may break away from them.

This morning the Siuslaw country to see how the fire fighters are coping with the blaze which is giving the men considerable work keeping in check.

LUMBER OUTPUT IS SHORT

FOURTH OF JULY HOLIDAYS ACCOUNTS FOR IT

Due to the customary mid-year repair season and July holidays, lumber production, west of the Cascade mountains in Oregon and Washington dropped off 35 per cent below normal for the week ending July 8.

One hundred and twenty-three mills, reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association, manufactured 54,544,318 feet of lumber, a decrease of 25,946,482 feet compared with the previous week.

New business totaled 87,145,564 feet, or a decrease of 17 per cent compared with the previous week. New business, however, was 25 per cent above production.

Shipments, at 56,491,176 feet, decreased 41 per cent compared with the previous week. Rail shipments dropped off 46 per cent.

Of the total of all shipments 45 per cent moved by water, including 20,835,923 feet eastwise and inter-coastal and 5,163,148 feet export. Rail shipments were 1,943 cars as against 1,942 cars for the previous week.

Unfilled rail trade orders are 7,217 cars. Unfilled cargo orders are 111,761,660 feet. Unfilled export orders, 66,863,728 feet.

For the twenty-seven weeks of the current year, mills reporting to West Coast Lumbermen's association, have manufactured 2,106,847,749 feet of lumber; accepted business totaling 2,139,469,384 feet and shipped 2,139,462,395 feet.

Schooner Master Wanders About
NOGALIER, Ark., July 13.—H. Gordon Glone, Nogalee contractor, whose fishing schooner sank in a gale in the Gulf of California last week, was found today by a searching party, wandering aimlessly along the barren Sonora coast about 75 miles west of here, according to a telephone message received here tonight. Glone was clad only in pajamas and had not tasted food in seven days.

FRANCE TO INQUIRE INTO GERMAN CRISIS

Insists on Probe of Cause for
Moratorium Plea

PAYMENT TO BE DEMANDED

Officials Hold That Testimony Will Be
Required to Meet Duty Obligation
Unless Duties of Commission
Is Placed in Minority

(By the Associated Press)

PARIS, July 13.—France will insist upon a full investigation into the causes which precipitated the present crisis in Germany leading to the German government's request for a moratorium in each payment for two and one half years before any respite is granted by the reparations commission. This stand, it was indicated in official circles today, also applies to the payment due July 15, which France holds should be made and unless President Fubini, French representative on the commission, is placed in a minority the 22,000,000 gold marks will have to be forthcoming.

The committee on guarantees, which has been investigating conditions in Germany, has been asked to hurry its report.

The French hold that it is impossible to hold the German government blameless for the present crisis. The reparations commission today notified the German government in reply to the demand for a moratorium for reparations payments that it would give a definite answer only when it has in hand the full report of the committee on guarantees which went to Berlin a short time ago to supervise reforms to which the German government gave its consent.

Germany's attitude on the reparations question "has brought into question the entire peace of Europe," says the Times today in commenting on the latest developments. It demands that the French government inform the British government that France can pay nothing on her war debts, either interest or principal, so long as the French treasury has not received the amounts due her for reparations.

The French delegate on the reparations commission, the newspaper thinks, should oppose any discussion of a moratorium until France is assured she will receive the sums she needs for reconstruction.

"And if there is any attempt to override France," the newspaper adds, "the French government can do nothing else than recover its liberty of action—as our British friends say, 'upset the apple cart' as she has the means to do so."

La Liberté says a moratorium for Germany will do no more solve the question "as payments in kind will necessitate the same default in paper money."

The Journal des Debats takes the view that Germany will never have a government disposed to comply with the Versailles treaty until she has compliance forced upon her.

The French government has replied to the British note concerning the proposed conference with a view to bringing about peace in the near east, to which the Greeks and the Turkish nationalists would be invited to send representatives. France accedes in principle the plan for holding the conference, the details of which are to be settled upon later.

IMPORTED SHOP WORKERS ARE DRAGGED FROM BEDS

SIXTY MEN BADLY BEATEN BY
AUTOMOBILE RAIDERS

Heavy Guard to Be Placed at Rail
Roundhouse as Result of the
Raid at Oroville

OROVILLE, Cal., July 13.—Sixty imported shop workers, brought from Arizona and started to work in the Western Pacific railroad shops here yesterday, early today were dragged from their beds in their sleeping quarters by automobile raiders, estimated to number from 50 to 75, and beaten severely. One man, Roadmaster Tom Wilkinson, was so badly beaten by clubs that the outcome of his injuries is doubtful.

The raiders, who arrived in Oroville in automobiles, said to have numbered about a dozen, dispersed the suddenly awakened strike-breakers, who fled in all directions, after which the attacking party descended in force on the roundhouse, where the guards were stationed. One report says 200 shots were exchanged between the guards and the raiders, but early today no reports of bullet injuries had been received.

next few days as a result of the raid on the Oroville roundhouse last night, according to an official announcement by the company today.

"The Western Pacific has done nothing to occasion such disturbances," the statement said, "but we now intend to hire all of the guards necessary to protect our properties. We believe that last night's raiders came from Sacramento, but have been unable to actually identify them."

The raiders cut the telephone wires leading into the roundhouse and it was not possible for the men on guard there to summon help. The raiders confined their activities to beating up the trainmaster and four other men and shooting the windows out of the roundhouse. They apparently made no effort to shoot any of the guards.

The company said that it could not confirm the reports that four men were kidnapped from the roundhouse. The company said it had appealed to Sheriff J. B. Webber of Butte county for adequate protection.
