SUSPICIONS OF CLARA PHILLIPS NOT JUSTIFIED

SUCH IS ASSERTION MADE BY LILLIAN MEADOWS

Woman Who Worked in Same Bank Says She Usually Spent Her Evenings With Alberta

GRAND FALLS, Mont., July 15.—There is no justification for the belief that Mrs. Alberta Meadows, who was slain Wednesday near Los Angeles, was murdered because she annoyed the jealousy of Mrs. Clara Phillips, now under arrest charged with the alleged crime, according to Lillian Meadows, her sister-in-law, who is visiting her sister here.

"Mrs. Meadows and I met Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Phillips about three months ago at the home of Mrs. Julia McGro, 225 West Forty-Seventh Place, Los Angeles. Mrs. McGro was a mutual friend of my sister-in-law and the Phillips. We met again once or twice, but our acquaintance with the Phillips was never more than a speaking one. At no time to my knowledge did my sister-in-law come into intimate association with Phillips. Having lived with Alberta off and on for some time, I knew her habits and tastes about as well as any one could know them. There is absolutely no foundation for the belief that she was murdered because she annoyed the jealousy of Mrs. Phillips. Alberta was not that kind of a girl. She lived a simple, ordinary life, especially following the death of her husband, and she was a woman who took care in choosing and making friends.

Worked at Same Bank
"Alberta and I worked in the same bank during the time I lived with her. After completing the day's work, we usually spent our evenings riding in Alberta's coupe or else went to visit my two brothers. The fact that Alberta was not in her apartment on the night Mrs. Phillips is

supposed to have made a secret visit was not unusual for she quite often stayed at the home of her father or visited my brothers. Her married life had been very happy."

Her slight acquaintance with Mrs. Phillips Meadows said, made her believe that she was an emotional woman and one who lost her temper on the slightest pretext. It is her opinion that Mrs. Phillips, without any justification, conceived the idea that her husband was attentive to Mrs. Meadows and brooded over the thought until she was aroused to commit the alleged murder. Mrs. Meadows does not believe that the alleged slayer was insane at the time of committing the act.

TREK TO DESERTED HOMES

THOSE WHO FLED FROM HUNGER DEATH ARE RETURNING

SARATOFF, Russia, June 15.—This has been the little group of ragged children, and adults who fled from the hunger death of the Volga last autumn to provinces that promised bread, are now trekking back to the homes they deserted.
Daily they arrive at Saratoff, Samara, Kazan and other railway junction points in the famine belt. Some of them are in worse shape than when they departed. They found other provinces inhospitable and food scarce everywhere.

Many of the returning wanderers are being fed at American relief administration food kitchens.

1,000 CHILDREN VIOLATE FEDERAL LAWS EACH YEAR

SECRETARY OF LABOR DAVIS GIVES DATA IN REPORT

Study Shows 115 Juveniles Arrested in Two-Year Period for Postal Law Offenses

WASHINGTON, July 12.—Approximately 1,000 children under 18 years of age are arrested in the United States each year for violations of federal laws, Secretary of Labor Davis announced today in making public a report dealing with the procedure of federal courts and delinquent children, prepared by the children's bureau.

The report presents the results of a study of methods of dealing with children who have violated postal and other federal laws. The portfolio department and the department of justice assisted the labor department in its investigations by making available their records. The study showed 115 children arrested during a two-year period for violating postal laws and 211 arrested for other federal offenses.

A measure authorizing federal prohibition, the report said, was passed by congress in 1917, but was not signed by the President. A similar bill is pending in the present congress, and the proposed legislation, the report suggested, would enable the United States courts to deal much more effectively with children's cases. It was probable, the report pointed out, that the simplest, most practicable, and least expensive plan for the proper handling of children's cases involving violation of federal laws would be the development of a definite system of reference to state juvenile courts at least in certain types of cases.

WOMAN SET UPON AND BEATEN BY CRAZED LAD

MRS. A. P. WATTERSON, WIFE OF RANCHER, IS VICTIM

Pacific Rosa, Assailant, Decries Something Told Him to Beat Her With Iron Bar

THE DALLAS, Ore., July 15.—Mrs. A. P. Watterson, wife of a poultry rancher living three miles southeast of The Dalles, was brought to a hospital here today terribly injured as a result of an attack alleged to have been made by Pacific Rosa, a 14 year old youth, believed insane.

Rosa is charged with having struck Mrs. Watterson over the head with an iron bar about three feet long as she was bringing home cucumbers from her garden about 200 feet from the house. After knocking her down, he struck four or five blows to her face and body with the bar. He was arrested by Sheriff Christian at the ranch of his father, Roman Rosa, about one half mile from the scene of the crime. He made no effort to fight or resist.

"Something told me to hit her with that bar," the youth said from his cell in the county jail this afternoon. "I didn't mean to do it. The bar was lying on a bench near the gate. As she was walking towards me something forced me to take up the bar and hit her over the head. I don't know why I did it."

Suffering from a broken arm, a fractured skull, eight or nine bad cuts about the head and bruises about the body, Mrs. Watterson dragged herself the 200 feet to her home and telephoned to the police. She then collapsed and was found there lying in a pool of blood by the authorities upon their arrival.

MAY PUT BAN ON BULLFIGHT

FUTURE OF MEXICO'S NATIONAL SPORT IN DOUBT

MEXICO CITY, June 26.—The future of bullfighting in Mexico is not as certain as its most ardent devotees would wish, as the result of a series of newspaper and other attacks against it as the national sport.

Protests that the spectacles are "barbarous and uncivilized" have been frequently expressed by contributors to local newspapers and the Council of Culture and Arts recently engaged in heated debate over their continuation. At the last session of congress a bill was introduced in the lower house asking for the abolition of bullfighting, but it was pigeon-holed and never came up for discussion. Assurance is given, however, that the bill will be revived at the next session of congress opening in September with absolute certainty that it will be called up for debate.

Several clubs and societies in Mexico City have gone on record as opposed to the sport, and all protestants are finding a ready champion in the newspaper El Universal, whose editor, Felix P. Palavicini, is unalterably against it. On the contrary, Rafael Alducin, editor of Espectador, is one of the most enthusiastic followers of the games.

taken in custody while aboard an east-bound Sunset Limited, admitted today that her real name was Mrs. Clara Phillips. The woman was placed under arrest on advices from Los Angeles which stated that she was wanted in connection with the killing of Mrs. Alberta Meadows.

The following is a statement which the prisoner signed in the presence of peace officers and newspaper men: "What is it all about? That is the question I ask myself as I sit in this strange place which they call a jail and wait for Sheriff Traeger and his wife to take me back to Los Angeles."

"I am eager to return to Los Angeles, for it is unbearably hot here and the little plaza with its busy Mexicans lounging in front of my window is not an inspiring view."

"Why as I here? I don't know. I was on my way to visit relatives in El Paso. When the train from Los Angeles stopped in Tucson, a coastman of bulky figure pushed his way through the car and came up to my berth.

"He said he was a detective and told me I was wanted. I didn't know what it was all about, but I went with him to this city jail. I was locked in this room, where I sit looking out through the heavy screen at my own window, still wondering what it is all about."

"I have been well treated in the jail. The army cot on which I try to sleep while the desert heat tortures
