GRASS FIRE DOES DAMAGE

FLAMES BURN HAY IN FIELD, FENCE, CATTLE GUARD

HARRISBURG, Ore., July 17.—(Special to the Register)—Fire caused the alarm here to be sounded for that purpose Saturday afternoon at about 2:30 for the first time in over a year.

It was found that the fire was just in the north edge of town. The fire had got a start in the dry grass along the Oregon Electric track close to the stock yards, burned some tim and spread so that it consumed a couple shocks of hay in an adjoining field on that side of the track and burning some fence. It crossed the track and in so doing burned out a cattle guard. On the other side it went into the H. R. Sherrill hay field and burned quite a wide swath until it reached a ditch a short distance from the fence. Here the fire was checked. A special Oregon Electric train pulled in at the time of the fire and was halted for some minutes because of the burning cattle guard. The fire was fought by the section crew and others and when the special happened along the crew joined in fighting the flames. The local fire company's truck responded but its usage was not found necessary. It is believed that the fire started from a lighted cigarette thrown from the 2:30 Oregon Electric as it was passing by. A heavy breeze was blowing which was carrying the fire toward town, and the prompt work of the firefighters saved a serious fire from getting started.

FERRY DECLARED UNSAFE

HEAVY TRUCKS BARRED AT HARRISBURG CROSSING

HARRISBURG, Ore., July 17.—(Special to the Register)—The ferry's condition at this place has become such that Thursday the ferryman de-

clared that heavy trucks could no longer be transported in safety and so from now on until the ferry is fixed again all heavy trucks will have to be satisfied to stay on this side.

As to fixing the ferry it is not yet definitely decided just what will be done. Commissioners Pierce and Thomas of Lane county and Commissioner Harlow of Lane county were here Monday and with the city council agreed that piling should be used in making an approach for the ferry to land. Some of the commissioners as well as council members think a temporary approach into the river could be constructed which could be removed when the river rises again.

The idea of cutting down the street to make a ferry landing is not favored by the city council if an approach can possibly be made in any other way.
