WEST LANE MEN ARE FINED

SETTLERS ALONG COAST HAVE DEER MEAT IN POSSESSION Deputy Game Wardens Return from Yaquina, Heceeta Head and Yachats

H. E. Mead and F. A. McDaniel, deputy game wardens from Portland, have returned from an investigating trip into the Yaquina bay and Heceeta head country, where complaints were made against the killing of deer out of season.

The wardens said their trip into the coast country revealed to them that along that particular coast region the deer are plentiful. The place is wild and isolated so that it is no wonder that there is killing of deer out of season, they said. Huntmen in the country had formerly defied the law and hoped that they would make it uncomfortable for any warden coming to enforce the law.

McDaniel ignored the threat and succeeded in making several arrests which resulted in the fining of the offenders.

"We have never seen such a fine deer country anywhere in the state," said the wardens, "and the streams have by no means been fished out. Only a few go in there from the surrounding country during the open season. The roads are fairly good, making the places accessible by automobile."

The wardens said they apprehended an old-time Indian inhabitant of the country who, they reported, had been found with deer meat in his possession once or twice before out of season. His name is Henry Carl and

he lives at Otis. The wardens caught him with spotted fawn and green hides in his possession, they said. He failed to report at Otis for trial on July 16. A warrant is out for his arrest.

H. C. Larson, of Heceeta, was arrested July 14 at Bob's creek for having deer meat in his possession out of season. He was fined \$50 by Judge W. G. Sherman, of Heceeta. Larson was known to have sold deer meat in Curvalla in exchange for dental work. Last winter he was fined \$125 for the same offense.

Frank White, of Yachats, was arrested at Yachats river on July 12 for having deer meat in his possession out of season. He was tried at Waldport on July 12 and fined \$50 by Judge E. Atwater. Claude Marks of Yachats was arrested on Yachats river for hunting without a license and for having deer meat in his possession. He was fined \$50 by Judge Atwater on July 12.

VERY HOT AT BLUE RIVER

TEMPERATURE REACHES AS HIGH AS 108

The temperature at Blue River on the upper McKenzie river has been up as high as 108 this summer, according to word received from Mrs. Lylah Bushnell, member of the forest fire patrol stationed at that place.

Mrs. Bushnell says that last year the highest point reached was 102 and that this year everything is correspondingly dryer than last year. She says that Smith E. Taylor, chief ranger in the Cascade national forest in that district predicts that this season promises to be the worst for forest fires in many years.

PLANES FOR EMERGENCY

PATROL WILL NOT BE SO EXTENSIVE THIS YEAR

A. O. Wahn, assistant forester of Portland, who has been here conferring with aviation officers regarding the air patrol of the forests, says that the patrol will be operated on a more or less emergency basis this season. "On account of the scarcity of planes, the service will be carried on only when there is urgent need. At present, on account of the prevalence of smoke, no regular routes will be designated," said Mr. Wahn.

forest service men will accompany the fliers. The eight planes are to be equipped with radio sets, so that upon securing information it can be transmitted to patrol headquarters and relayed to the fighters. To operate the radio equipment at Eugene, Salem, and Roseburg, liaison officers will be employed. Otherwise the work will be entirely in the hands of the forest service men.

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
