HARRISBURG, Ore., July 21.—(Special to the Register)—Miss Ollie Cunningham died at her home in this city Wednesday morning at about nine o'clock. She had been in failing health for some time.

Miss Cunningham was born on the farm near this city October 30th, 1874, and was educated in the school here with the exception of one year which she spent in the St. Margaret's college at Boise, Idaho. She resided in Eugene and Albany for three years after leaving the farm. Miss Cunningham had been a devoted member of the Christian church since childhood. She was also secretary of the local chapter of the Eastern Star for three consecutive years.

The funeral services were held in the home this afternoon at two o'clock because of the feebleness of Ollie's mother, Rev. T. H. Appleby, of Jefferson, formerly pastor of the Christian church here, conducted the services. The remains were laid to rest in the Masonic cemetery at the Eastern Star lodge having charge of the burial.

She leaves to mourn her loss, besides her mother, two sisters, Mrs. P. M. Miller of Albany, and Mrs. Valentine of Springfield; and four brothers.

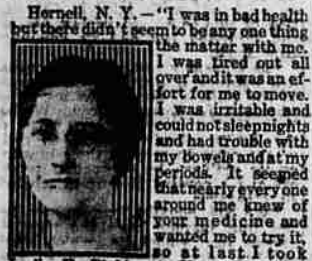
