ROCK CRUSHER IS BLASTED

MACHINE ON LOW PASS ROAD HIT BY HUGE BOULDER

An unusually heavy blast of dynamite on the low pass road work almost destroyed the rock crusher and bunched yesterday, says the Junction City Times.

It seems they had been having poor success with the blasting owing to light charges and decided to put in a charge that would get action. It did.

The blast lifted one rock about the size of a good sized house and let it down on top of the rock crusher, almost completely demolishing it. Another rock crashed through the bunched tearing them to pieces.

Fortunately everyone was out of the way and no one was hurt.

The loss will be quite heavy and work will necessarily be suspended for about six weeks pending the arrival of a new crusher.

CAMP FIRE PERMITS FREE

NO CHARGE MADE BY NATIONAL FOREST SERVICE

Camp fire permits in the national forest are free, says Nelson F. Macduff, supervisor. He said that one man applying for a permit yesterday asked how much it was, but the regulations provide for issuing them free of charge, the object of the permit being a personal reminder at all times to be careful of fires. The federal regulations provide a penalty for failure to obtain a permit.

Mr. Macduff advises those who contemplate going to the national forest either up the McKenzie or Willamette, to be gone over Sunday, to apply for a permit Saturday morning, as the national forest office will be closed at noon Saturday, for the remainder of the day. Those going as far as McKenzie Bridge or Reserve or Oakridge may obtain the permits there at any time.

BEND, Ore., July 21.—Fire fighters from the Shelvin logging camps were today opposing a blaze of considerable proportions which at one time threatened Shelvin park in the Tumalo canyon and also the Tumalo fish hatchery. It was believed that the flames would be controlled tonight.

Tales of Those Who Tour

The municipal auto camp is spoken of nightly by many visiting tourists as the best camp on the whole coast, a fact that should be realized by more Eugene people. With the green-banked Willamette flowing on one side, and a dense wood of cool, shady fir on the other, the camp is generally cannot be surpassed. Tents are pitched on the grassy center flat, and from the time a tourist arrives his every want is cared for. He is furnished with good water plenty of wood, a stove, tables, benches, and best of all, a good shower bath awaits him in the over-cast and attractive roof cottage. It is also interesting to know that the Eugene chamber of commerce has a representative on the grounds every evening who distributes auto maps and information, and tells of the advantages to the home-seeker and tourist held forth by the city and county. The city papers are also furnished by the chamber of commerce every morning and evening. Good news travels fast and far, and thus the 60 or 70 tourists' parties that partake of the service and comfort of the park are accounted for.

Through the courtesy of Mr. N. F. Macduff, forest supervisor of the Cascade national forest, the attractiveness of the rest cottage was added to by the presentation of a large handsome frame containing about two dozen excellent views of the Oregon skyline trail in Lane county. The photographs are the work of E. N. Clouston, recreation engineer of the forest service, who had charge of the skyline trip from Mt. Hood to Crater lake last season. The collection attracts a great deal of favorable comment from visiting tourists, and arouses considerable interest in Lane county's scenic possibilities. A sign bearing the legend "Permits are required to build campfires in national forests," has been posted by the forest service, and all campers are cautioned to be extremely careful with fires in forests due to the unusual dryness of the woods.

IRVING WAREHOUSE OPENS

KLUSMAN RECEIVES INSTRUCTIONS FROM PORTLAND

William G. Klusman, merchant and warehouseman of Irving, yesterday received instructions from the Portland Flour Mills company to reopen the company's warehouse at Irving Monday for the reception of grain. Mr. Klusman manages this warehouse and each year receives a large quantity of wheat from that portion of the county to be shipped to the flour mills in Portland.

Threshing has already been started by one outfit near Irving and it is expected that wheat will begin to arrive at the warehouse by Monday or a few days thereafter.

The Eugene Mill & Elevator company is also prepared to receive this year's wheat. None of the warehouse managers expect a heavy crop of wheat this year.

McKENZIE ROAD IS NOT BAD

HARRY HAYS SAYS TRAVELING NOT DIFFICULT

Harry G. Hays, packer and guide of McKenzie Bridge, who arrived in Eugene yesterday, said that the report regarding the McKenzie road being impassable is erroneous in the extreme. The only detour around construction work is being fixed up so that it is much better than it was and big trucks are passing over it every day.

The road is dug up for some distance above Waltersville, and while it is dusty and disagreeable on that account, there is no stoppage of traffic. Mr. Hays said that a large number of tourists are now seeking out the pleasure resorts on the upper McKenzie and quite a number are crossing the summit of the Cascades.

GOVERNMENT READY TO BACK COAL EDIT

chico gunners are moving into Cambodia, Indiana, Somerset, Washington and West Moreland counties in the southwestern part of the state today to prevent disorder when bituminous mines are reopened. The whole power of the state government is being massed behind them. State police in the affected districts will act with the soldiers.

While the cavalrymen and gunners are going to the strike districts, more than four thousand men will be moving toward Mount Gretna in the center of the state, to be the first of the two periods of active service of the summer encampment and five thousand men are at home stations ready to be called out.

Movement of the soldiers to the soft coal districts is the first to be made as a preventive measure. Many of the men on active duty were overseas veterans and they are equipped like regulars.

This is the first time units of the national guard have been placed on coal strike duty since 1902, when the guard was ordered into the anthracite fields. It is the first time that guardsmen have been ordered on coal strike duty since the state police force was organized.

LANRING, Mich., July 21.—Governor Greenback today asked the striking miners in Michigan to return to the mines, either under public or private control. In a message to T. Leo Jones of Saginaw, president of district 24, United Mine Workers of America, the governor asked that the miners go back to work and produce coal sufficient for municipal and state purposes. He gave the miners until Monday night to reply.

The governor has received no word from Washington regarding his suggestion that the mines be placed under public control.

BANK ROLLS HIT PAST YEAR

PER CAPITA CIRCULATION OF MONEY DROPS OFF

WASHINGTON, July 21.—Everybody's pocketbook was lightened by nearly \$3 during the past fiscal year, according to the statement of money in circulation on July 1, issued today by the treasury.

Per capita circulation of money on July 1 was \$29.37, compared with \$44.78 on July 1, 1921.

The treasury's per capita figures were based on total circulation of \$4,375,553,653 on July 1, and a total population of 109,743,000 persons as compared with a total circulation of \$4,824,113,851 on July 1, 1921, with a total population of 108,087,000.

The figures excluded from money in circulation all forms of money held by the federal reserve banks and federal reserve agents whether as a reserve against federal reserve notes or otherwise.
