Landux Mill Is Sold—Dave Burnett, of Seattle, yesterday completed a deal whereby he acquired possession of the Landux Lumber company's sawmill at Signal, on the akridge branch of the Southern Pacific railroad. The mill will begin operation in a few days under the name of the Burnett Mills & Timber company. Sidney Burnett, a brother of the purchaser and formerly a mill operator in Washington, will manage the plant. The mill has a capacity of 2000 feet of dry. It is understood that the dockage will be increased and that the Southern Pacific will likely build a spur branch to the mill.

Gillette, J. A. McLean, and Walter Griffin. If a party of 250 can be organized to make the trip on September 15, a reduced rate of \$3.32 will be granted by the Southern Pacific.

Wheat Yield Below Normal—Although wheat harvest has started in Lane county it is the fear of farmers that the yield this year will fall far below normal due to the fact that many of the spring sown fields were burned up by the dry weather and much of the grain was shriveled before it got its full growth and filled out.
