Road Traffic to Be Rerouted
(Register Lane County Special)
COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., July 20.—North and south traffic through this city will be rerouted through the city after July 23, an order effective that day having been made by which traffic will enter the city from the west rather than from the north over the Ninth street bridge. This order, which will be in effect until about August 20, pending the reopening of Ninth street, on which construction of 1000 feet of paving is just being completed, throws the traffic through the business section of the city rather than on the outskirts.
