

CAMP FIRE PERMIT PLAN GOES INTO EFFECT HERE

Will Be Means of Checking Damage Is Belief
MAY BE PERMANENT LAW

Officials of Cascade Forest Issue Eleven of the Grants on First Day of the New Regulations

All persons who desire to build camp fires in the national forests of Oregon are required to obtain permits, according to the recent ruling of the forest officials, which went into effect yesterday. Eleven permits were issued the first day for the Cascade national forest, according to the reports of officials of that district, who report that at the present time the entire reserve is free from fire, and that the permits will be issued as the need arises. Those who apply for the camp fire permits are required to state where the fire is to be built and this data will be on file at the office of the forest reserve and will provide a ready means of checking up on whether the fire was the result of carelessness on the part of the camper. Whether the permit plan will be maintained when the fire period hazard is at an end has not yet been determined, according to the forest officials.

Will Check Fires Is Belief
As the majority of the forest fires are the direct result of camp fires, it is the belief of forest officials that the plan of issuing the permits and requiring each applicant to give exact information as to the place or places that the fire is to be built will be a valuable means of ascertaining where the blaze originated and to whom the blame can be attached. Those who desire the permits for the week-end must obtain them before Saturday noon as the local office will not be open after that time. The announcement from the forest headquarters.

Between 20 and 25 miles of new telephone line are to be installed in the Cascade reserve as soon as the wire arrives. The placing of the new line was to have been started July 1, but owing to a delay in receiving the equipment the work has had to be postponed. Many of the lines will follow existing trails through the reserve.

PART OF OLD PORTION OF MARSHFIELD DESTROYED

LOSS IN FIRE ESTIMATED AT \$200,000

City Records Burned When City Hall Goes Up In Smoke—One Man Believed Dead

MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 24.—Fire which caused a loss estimated at \$200,000 swept both sides of the blocks along Front street Sunday, burning 28 buildings.

The razed section was in the old part of the city and the heavy losses will be felt more because the fire razed prevented the business men and real estate men from carrying insurance.

Some of the records of the city were burned when the city hall, engineer's office, city jail and first department went up in flames. Coos county records, held by G. A. Bennett in his office, were also destroyed.

The scientific research accumulation of Dr. W. Hayden, covering the efforts of a lifetime including literature, medicine and foreign and domestic curiosities, went with the rest.

One man, Dutch Henry, little known, was supposed to have perished in the Portland lodging house, over the Glidewell junk store, where the fire originated at about 8:45 A. M. Another man, name undetermined, an inmate of a lodging house and a cripple, was rescued as the fire was eating up his trousers legs. Henry Lee, fireman, was injured in a fall and required 14 stitches in his leg just above the knee to close the wound.

A dozen residences on First street were burned. The North Bend fire department responded to the alarm and took charge of the first street section.

Bend Has Fire
BEND, Ore., July 24.—Fire, believed to have started from a short circuit in an automobile, caused \$6000 damage Saturday night at the Bend garage and threatened a loss of more than \$100,000. The blaze was extinguished in an hour's time by the Bend volunteer fire department, five lines of hose being used in combating the flames. Water pressure in the mains was increased 80 pounds by use of pumps at the Brooks-Seaton mill.
