HARRISBURG, Ore., July 25.—(Special to the Register)—The people of the community were awakened Sunday night shortly after midnight by the shrieking of the fire siren.

Fire had broken out in the R. J. Conkley pool hall, a wooden structure on Main street, and it was found necessary to sound the alarm several times in the effort to get the fire department out so that the blaze might be extinguished. Owing to the delay in getting the apparatus to the scene the fire had obtained quite a start when the water began playing on the blaze. But with the company's chemical engine in action it was not long until the fire was brought under control.

The building was quite badly damaged, especially the inside. The pool tables were also damaged. There was \$400 insurance on the building and \$2000 insurance was carried on the stock. The origin of the fire is not known.

DAILY MARKET REPORT

OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., July 25.—While there is still a surplus of the better quality creamery butter here at this time, the market's position is far less secure, and a cut of about one cent is anticipated for the trade within the next 24 hours.

Monday's sharp decline in the California trade created adverse sentiment in the cube market and with an accumulation of offgrade stuff here for a number of days past, some effect has at last been shown upon the better class offerings.

Seattle interests appear to be of the same opinion as local traders and for that reason the decline in the price is expected at any time.

The cut in the price of butterfat will likely be either the same as that in butter, or a little additional. The matter will be adjusted later in the day.

Print stock has not been moving freely since the previous advance.

EGG SITUATION INTENSIFIED SLOW
Market for eggs is inclined to show a slightly easier feeling, although no change in current prices is indicated. There has been a disposition among the trade generally to keep supplies cleaned up.

CHICKEN MARKET IS STILL SLOW
Chicken market continues to reflect a very slow tone, but with the exception of heavy weight hens no further price change is indicated. Supplies of chickens are again quite liberal.

BEERRY MARKETS SHOW STRONG
Somewhat better feeling was indicated in the berry trade, with loganberries around \$1.25-\$1.50; blackberries, \$2.00-\$2.25; raspberries, \$2.25, and currants, \$2.00-\$2.25 per crate.

ONION PRICES ARE BEING SHADED
Price of Walla Walla onions is being shaded here. While the general quotation is around \$2.25, sales are being made as low as \$1.75-\$2.00 in lots and even \$1.50 business has been reported.

POTATO SITUATION EASIER OFF
Generally easier situation is showing in the potato market throughout the country, and local quotations are being shaded fractionally. Home grown stock is showing incline in action it was not long ago, but the quality is not yet good enough to seriously compete with outside stuff.
