DAILY MARKET REPORT
OREGON JOURNAL MARKET SERVICE
PORTLAND, Ore., July 26.—Market for butter is in very bad shape at this time. Prices here and on Puget Sound are the highest in the entire country, a condition which cannot forever continue in face of the surplus of the ordinary quality. In fact, at the moment there is but little movement in any sort of butter.

Puget Sound interests appear to control the situation at the moment. Some of the trade there is said to be determined to hold the price of fresh stock at the high mark in an effort to unload short held storage to the best advantage. It appears that some enterprising money and is willing to hold up the public by charging an extreme price for the product; a price that is utterly out of line with the actual worth of the commodity as compared with any other market in the United States.

It is idle to believe that butter is worth 12 to 14 a pound more in Portland or Seattle than in New York or Chicago, or

that it is worth 1 to 2 a pound above California grades.

Part of the butter is that little butter is being sold at the present price here. The movement is restricted to every quarter. Therefore an early sharp break in the price is generally expected.

DOG SITUATION BECOMES WEAKER
Market for dogs is weaker and with a further slackening of the demand generally for both private and association sales. Receipts continue in excess of current offerings all over the country.

SUGAR ADVANCE AGAIN POSTPONED
Further advance of 10c per hundred pounds is announced by Pacific Coast sugar refiners, following Tuesday's rise to the East. Portland wholesale growers will put the advance into effect Thursday, but none of them appear to be charging full price.

IMPROVED HOGS VERY SCARC
Great scarcity of country-raised hogs is shown in the front street trade, with general lack of top quality at 10c per pound. There are in good supply, but demand is slow for anything except strictly No. 1 quality of the most favorable size.

TOMATO MARKET OVERLOADED
Tomato market is overloaded. Merced, Cal., has selling a 20c, with San Pedro, Cal., at \$1.25, while offerings from The Dalles are showing neglect and top stuff as low as \$1 per box. Several cars shipped to the North.

PICNIC AFFECTS HERRY TRADE
Grocers' picnic Wednesday affected the market for herring and those sold at \$1.15 on the Farmers' market and as high as \$1.40 along Front street. Currents are down to \$2 per lb.
