NEW ORDINANCE ENFORCED

STREET STORAGE OF EQUIPMENT PROHIBITED

Orders have been issued by the police for the enforcement of the new city ordinance which prohibits the use of the public streets for the storage of automobiles, wagons, bicycles, tractors, and farm machinery and equipment. One local resident has already been requested to remove machinery that has been left on the streets in front of his place of business and announcement has been made that the new law must be observed. The ordinance provides that equipment or vehicles may be placed in the streets for repair during the day but must be removed at night and many local business establishments will be affected by the new ruling.
