

COAL DISTRIBUTION IN HANDS OF STATE OFFICERS

Have Charge of Parceling Fuel to Individuals

CONSERVATION NECESSARY

Secretary Hoover Says Principles Enforced in Plan Commenced to Governors

The Coal Situation

Government activities in coal distribution to be limited to interstate question, according to announcement in Washington. Five steel furnaces were closed because of lack of coal at Youngstown, Ohio. Supply of coal for home consumption practically exhausted. Several hundred shots fired during a mine clash in Jefferson county, Ohio. J. L. Lewis, mine strike leader, repeated former statement that an interstate wage conference would soon be arranged.

WASHINGTON, July 29.—Control of emergency coal distribution to individual consumers is entirely in the hands of state authorities, except for railway coal, Secretary Hoover, chairman of the federal coal distribution committee, announced tonight. The federal government, he stated, will limit its activities in coal distribution entirely to interstate questions. Principles embraced in the administration plan of coal distribution, Mr. Hoover explained, have been communicated to the governors of the states who are to adopt plans of

their own in co-operating with the president's committee. Distribution problems, he added, vary in different groups of states, while the intermountain and Pacific states are to look after themselves and "are not embraced in active administration."

Conservation Necessary. Conservation of the nation's coal supply within its boundaries will be necessary, he declared, and bunkering concerns along the Atlantic seaboard have been asked to bunker ships only to the west port of call and after August 1 to require foreign ships to bunker abroad for the round trip. Although coal is cheaper in American ports than abroad it could not be spared out of the country.

Coal exports, he asserted, would be held to a minimum during the emergency, no priorities being granted for the movement of coal to people who can supply themselves.

Price Levels Maintained. Price levels will be maintained, he explained through the purchase of all coal under interstate commerce commission priority orders administered out of Washington and coal cars will be available only for fuel bought at fair prices. Henry B. Spencer, the newly appointed federal fuel distributor, is to supervise coal distribution between the states, while the methods of handling coal for railways responsible to the interstate commerce commission will be determined directly from Washington in maintaining interstate commerce.

KHENSBURG, Pa., July 29.—Union leaders, addressing a mass meeting of striking miners at Carrollton today declared that the "end of the coal strike is in sight."

John Brophy, president of district No. 2 of the United Mine Workers, said the struggle would be over in a few days. He predicted victory for the workers.

"It has got to be settled," said Brophy. "The public is beginning to feel the pinch."

Sheriff Richards of Indiana county attended the meeting and served injunctions on Brophy and seven or

sanitizers. The defendants are to appear in Indiana county court Tuesday.

SPECIAL RATE IN EFFECT

STUDENT FARE TO SPRINGFIELD IS REDUCED

The special half-fare rate for students of the university between the campus and Springfield is now in effect by the local street railway line although the school now being closed it is not expected that there will be any demand for the special tickets before the re-opening of the institution in October.

The books are to be sold only to bona fide students registered at the university, and an order from the college officials will be necessary for those who desire to take advantage of the special reduction. The local six-cent fare tickets in books of fifty and stripe of five will also be ready for distribution, according to rail officials.
