feet and deepen the channel two feet.
The petition points out that such an
outlet would keep the waters of the
lake at a constant level and avoid
flooding.

Extension of Time Granted—An ex-
tension of time of six days has been
granted the defendants in the case of
Oswald West, former governor of Ore-
gon, against the county of Coos. The
order has been handed down by Judge
H. H. Holt. Governor West was
awarded a judgment of \$20,000 here
recently which involved the collection
of local fees from the county.
Ben S. Fisher and John D. Goss re-
presented the county in the action.

Old Paper Destroyed by Fire—One
of the many valuable relics lost in
the university fire yesterday after-
noon was a copy of the New York
World containing the news of the
assassination of President Lincoln.
This copy had been framed and was

hanging in the office of Dean Eric
Allen, of the school of journalism,
whose headquarters were in one of
the structures destroyed in the cam-
pus conflagration.

Eight Prisoners Work on Roads—
Eight prisoners serving time for mis-
deamors in the Lane county jail are
now at work on the county roads
receiving \$2.00 per day that will ap-
ply on their fine. The working of
the inmates of the jail on county
projects was started this week.
Seventeen prisoners are now confined
at the jail but only those on minor
charges are allowed to work on the
roads.

Warned About Stolen Autos—
Warnings sent out from San Francisco
to local police state that two auto-
