



WISCONSIN'S POLITICAL CAMPAIGN IS HARD FOUGHT

Republicans Are Engaged In
Factional Struggle

LA FOLLETTE IS OPPOSED

Independent Progressive Republicans
Organize First Time Since Primary
Law Enacted

MADISON, Wis., July 29.—Wisconsin is in the midst of a political campaign which promises to culminate September 5 in the most hard-fought election since the state primary law was enacted in 1911.

While the republicans are engaged in a factional struggle between the La Follette forces and the anti-La Follette forces for control of the state government and of the U. S. senate, the democrats are preparing to fight a contest in their ranks over the nomination for governor on a wet and dry issue.

The candidacy of Senator Robert M. La Follette for re-election at the head of a complete state ticket, which bears his name, is bringing strong opposition from the other republican faction in Wisconsin. This wing, the independent progressive republican party, has organized for the first time since enactment of the primary law for choice of U. S. senator.

Ganfield Opposes La Follette
Opposed to Senator La Follette is Le. W. A. Ganfield, president of Carroll college, Wausau, Wis., a new member in Wisconsin politics. Dr. Ganfield was named to head the opposition ticket by the Citizens republican state conference, which met at Milwaukee, June 1. This organization was created by the committee of forty-four, a representative group made up of two men and two women from each of the 11 Wisconsin congressional districts. Dr. Ganfield opened his campaign early in July and reports from throughout the state say that he is being well received. In Madison his speech was against radicalism.

Senator La Follette has returned to Wisconsin and is in the center of one of his most intensive campaigns for re-election. Other members of the ticket which bears the name of the La Follette progressive republican party are: Gov. J. J. Blaine, and Lieut. Gov. George F. Comings, candidate for re-election; Fred Zimmerman, candidate for secretary of state.

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LAWYERS AND JUDGES IN LARGE NUMBERS TO MEET

MORE THAN 2,000 EXPECTED TO
BE IN SAN FRANCISCO

National Bar Association and Other
Organizations Gather August
2 to 12.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 29.—Lawyers and judges to the number of more than 2,000 are expected to come to San Francisco early in August to attend the 1922 convention of the American Bar association, the national conference of commissioners on uniform state laws and the annual meeting of the California State Bar association. The commissioners meet August 2-9, the state body convenes August 7 and the national association on August 9-12.

Several noted speakers are to address the organization, names on the program including William Howard Taft, chief justice of the United States, Vice President Calvin Coolidge, Chief Justice Lucien Shaw of the California supreme court, George W. Wickersham, former attorney general, Cordell A. Severance, president of the American Bar association, and Governor Henry J. Allen of Kansas. It is hoped that Elihu Root, former secretary of state, also will speak.

Addresses are also to be made by two distinguished visitors, the Right Hon. Lord Shaw of Dundermire, representing the bar of Great Britain and Henri Aubepin, representing the bar of Paris.

Two committee reports, in which a great deal of interest is being taken, will be presented. One is the report of the committee on promotion of American ideals, which will be presented by Martin J. Wade, of Iowa. The other is the report of the committee on law enforcement, prepared by W. H. Swaney of Tennessee.

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PORTLAND BANKERS RAP GRANGE INCOME TAX BILL

Claim It Will Drive Out Capital
If Approved

AN ANALYSIS IS PREPARED

Whitfield and Whitfield of Portland
Have Set Forth Workings of
Graded Measure

(Special to The Register.)—The graduated income tax measure placed on the ballot by the Oregon State Grange has aroused Portland bankers and business men, who declare that a tremendous amount of capital will be driven out and kept out of the state if the proposal is approved by the voters. But the mere fact that the measure provides for the man with an income of \$1000 to pay \$10 while the man of \$50,000 would pay \$2500 may have something to do with this opposition.

An analysis of the measure has been prepared by Whitfield, Whitfield & Co., of this city, as follows:

Analysis of Measure Given
Rates provided in the bill are graduated and range from 1 per cent on \$1000 to 15 per cent on \$50,000 of taxable income, with the provision that the rate for each bracket applies uniformly to the entire amount of taxable income. Tax on \$1000 is 1 per cent, or \$10, while tax on \$2000 is 1 1/2 per cent of the entire amount, or \$30. Tax on \$50,000 is 15 per cent of the entire amount, or \$7500. Rates apply to incomes of individuals and corporations without consideration of invested capital. Accordingly, all corporations with net income of \$50,000 or over are subject to a 15 per cent state income tax on entire net income. This is in addition to the 12 1/2 per cent federal income tax, making a total tax on such corporations of 27 1/2 per cent.

The incomes of all forms of business except co-operative and mutual associations are taxed alike, whether corporation, partnership or individual. The tax is upon all income received from rentals, stocks, bonds and other evidences of indebtedness within or without the state, and from such portion of other incomes as is from sources within the state.

Exemptions Are Specified
Exemptions are these: (a) Corporations taxed on net income without any specific exemptions other than those.

Camp Grounds Bring New Residents;

PORTLAND, Ore., July 29.—The Portland chamber of commerce has opened an information booth at the municipal auto camp where general information regarding city and state will be dispensed, and the Oregon tourist and information bureau will assist in giving data of conditions of highways, camp sites and tourist hotels.

A card index will be kept of all tourists and the particular feature of the state in which they are interested, and after they return to their homes the chamber will open a follow-up campaign to induce them to make their permanent homes in Oregon.

BIG STADIUM TO GO UP

CONTRACT AWARDED AT
GONZAGA UNIVERSITY

SPokane, Wash., July 27.—Contract for the field work on the Gonzaga university stadium here has been awarded. The work is to be completed within 60 days or by the opening of the fall college term. The contemplated field work calls for a five-layered base on the field. The contract was awarded on a bid of \$15,278.

The stadium is to cover a site 607 by 437 feet. The present field will be excavated several feet. The base of the new field will be of tile, forming a sub-drainage system to carry off water. From the base the field will be built of rock, gravel, sand, loam, ash and chinders in a five-layer bed. It is expected that the field will absorb any amount of water and offer a dry, fast surface.

Preliminary work on the field has already been completed. The contract for the stands in the stadium will not be let for several weeks. Contract for a separate item of about \$2000, for a watering system, will be awarded later.

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School Census Figures Given

WALLA WALLA, Wash., July 28.—The school census of the city of Walla Walla shows a total of 5,094 children of the school age. Of this number 2504 are boys and 2590 are girls. There are 314 boys and 368 girls of a total of 682 of school age not attending school.

KING BORIS WARNED HE MAY REIGN, NOT GOVERN

People of Bulgaria Do All Work
Should Have Voice

SUCH IS PREMIER'S VIEWS

Stamboulsky Says World Tendency
Is Toward Democracy and Rule

SOFIA, Bulgaria, June 8.—"The people of Bulgaria do all the work, and then they elect a king to govern, and if he is a tyrant, the dominant voice in its government," Premier Alexander Stamboulsky said today to the correspondent of the Associated Press who questioned him as to Bulgaria's future. The occasion followed the recent Peasants' congress, when Stamboulsky warned King Boris he could reign but not govern, and that if the intellectuals secured control of the government a republic would be declared.

The present tendency of the world, continued the leader of the Agrarian party, "is toward democracy and rule by the people, as you have it in America. Old Bulgaria with its tyrants and oppressors is dead. The people now rule. It may be that Bulgaria one day will have a republic, and if so we shall make King Boris its first president. He is a very democratic, modest and earnest young man, and I think he would like the job. He is held in great affection and esteem by the people and would have their entire support."

Premier Man of Energy
Stamboulsky is a man of massive frame and tremendous energy. He has a large round face, ruddy complexion, an upturned moustache, a great shock of uncombed, curly black hair, and small dark eyes that expand only when his sensibilities are aroused. His critics say that in his formidable physique and thundering voice lies his strength rather than in his brain. However, he must have a great fund of native common sense, practical wisdom and unusual constructive ability, for he has guided his country for three years through the most precarious period in its history.

On the question of foreign relations the peasant premier said Bulgaria was sincerely anxious to have a closer understanding with Yugoslavia and more intimate contact with her other neighbors, Rumania and Greece. Referring to the rapid recovery of his country from the war he declared Bulgaria had no unemployment problem.

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PALESTINE UNDER JEWS NOW MAKING PROGRESS

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT IS
MAKING PROGRESS

During Past Year 4,000 Licenses Issued
for New Trades and
Industries

JERUSALEM, June 12.—The industrial development of Palestine under the Jews is moving forward in leaps and bounds, and this in spite of the many trade quarrels that have sprung up of late between employer and employee.

During the past year no less than 4,000 licenses were issued for new trades and industries in Palestine. The extent of this development can be judged from the fact that prior to 1921 only 2,500 licenses were registered by the government. This means that nearly two-thirds of the enterprises in Palestine were started within the last year.

The capital invested in each of these new ventures ranges from \$20,000 to \$50,000, but with such notable exceptions as the Silicate company, of Jaffa, with a capital of \$500,000 and the Standard Oil company, now exploiting the Dead sea basin.

A tract of 500 acres of land has been bought by British Jewish interests and will be devoted to home and factory building, while American interests are starting a building and loan association and a savings bank. A casino, two bathing establishments and electric lights are among the attractions of an "American" seaside resort which has sprung up on the sands stretching north of Jaffa.

In reality this is a Jewish township and its local name is Tel Aviv, but to a visitor it appears a go-ahead American town with a spirit that overcomes all obstacles. It has more than 12,000 inhabitants and an immense brick factory working night and day.

TRADESMEN ARE SCARCE

DEMAND IN CALIFORNIA CAUSES
SHORTAGE IN WASHINGTON

TACOMA, Wash., July 26.—The demand for building trades craftsmen in California has resulted in a shortage of these workmen in western Washington, local contractors declare. It is said that California contractors have sent agents here and craftsmen have been induced to go to California with promises of as much as \$3.00 a day above union scale.

"There is a shortage in the building trades," R. M. Grant, speaking for local contractors recently stated. "On many building jobs here men are now being paid more than the scale."

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HENRY FORD PLANS TO PUT MEXICAN PEOPLE TO WORK

Says It Is Best Way to End All
Conflict

PLANT TO BE ESTABLISHED

Automobile Manufacturer Expects to
Make It Possible for Peons to
Get Education

DETROIT, July 25.—Development of Mexico industrially and agriculturally to a point where it will take its place as one of the leading powers of the world is the plan of Henry Ford.

This has been learned by the Associated Press from sources close to the manufacturer. Mr. Ford, it was learned, proposes to end forever the internal strife in the southern republic by "putting the people to work," as he expresses it, by making it possible for the peons to obtain education, and by devious ways elevating the masses in the country to the highest possible standard.

The motor manufacturer wants to keep the hands and minds of the Mexican common people occupied so "they will have no time for fighting." This, it became known, is the substance of Mr. Ford's theory, one that he hopes to carry out in the near future by erection of a number of factories through the more important states. In short, it was said, he hopes to reveal to the people of Mexico how they can help themselves.

Plant to Be Put In

The first step in this program may be taken soon with establishment of a Ford motor assembling plant in the state of Coahuila, probably in Saltillo. Business interests of that city and the governor of the state are known here to be eager to bring about the industrial development. Mr. Ford, it is known, would enter upon his development program immediately upon erection of the necessary factory buildings. Similar enterprises would be established by Mr. Ford in other parts of the country if the plan is carried out, it was intimated.

Mr. Ford is said to believe that if the Mexicans once are taught the value of industry, better methods of agriculture and their possibilities individually and as a nation, the advance of the country will prove to be one of the most notable in history.

The manufacturer is known to have an abiding faith in the people of the country. He announced his idea several times recently.
