Battery Plant Is to Be Established—William Horsfall, of Eugene, and Miss Jakway, also of Eugene, arrived in Roseburg yesterday and are installing a sales agency for the Mac-Dry battery, for which Mr. Horsfall has an agency in both Lane and Douglas counties. The sales agency will be located in the store building with the Maxwell agency and will be in charge of Miss Jakway. The battery which they handle is a new departure in automobile batteries and it is stated that it eliminates many of the inconveniences of the old type of storage battery. Mr. Horsfall will work between the Eugene and Roseburg sales agencies, having an agent in both places. The new agency will open Monday—Roseburg News-Review.

Hot Weather Brings Pests—The excessive drought and hot days of this summer are particularly favorable to the development of insect pests. The red spiders are especially serious on

beans and garden crops, horticultural and field crops may suffer serious injury. Sulphur in some form is the standard insecticide for the red spider. For limited areas dust sulphur, using if possible superfine dusting sulphur, will prove the easiest and most practical treatment. For hops, fruit trees, etc., where liquid sprays are being applied, self-choked lime sulphur, "atomic sulphur" or very dilute (1-100) lime sulphur may be used, says the Oregon Agricultural college experiment station.

A. C. Dixon Returns—A. C. Dixon, manager of the Booth-Kelly Lumber company, returned yesterday from a trip through the Northwest in company with R. E. Danaher, president of the concern. The mill at Wendling will probably be rebuilt, starting within 30 days, states Mr. Dixon, who with the president, has been inspecting other plants in order to obtain data on the best type of building to erect.

Drainage Project Planned—Professor George W. Kable, drainage expert of the Oregon Agricultural college, accompanied by Ira P. Whitney, county agricultural agent, yesterday were at Cottage Grove to inspect the feasibility of draining a tract of land near that city. The plan if it goes through will be financed locally states Mr. Whitney as it is not a county project. Mr. Whitney reported on his return last night that the O. A. C. expert had recommended the drainage of the district and the matter will be taken up by the property owners concerned.

Rudd Is Round-Up Publicity Man—One of the daily papers published in the remote eastern part of the state bears the information in prominent headlines that Art Rudd, who is a university student, is now very busy telling the people of several of the western states about the 1922 Pendleton round-up. Mr. Rudd, who is a sophomore in the university school of journalism and one of the associate editors of the Daily Emerald next year, is publicity man for the Pendleton Round-Up association. The eastern Oregon paper says that at present Mr. Rudd is spreading the good word about the big western show in central Idaho.
